

HUTICHISON BURNED OUT AGAIN

EAGLE RIVER: An Eagle Rivfamily for the second time in less than a month has been left homeless by fire.

left homeless by fire, A house trailer, belonging to Roy Hutchison of Artillery Road, was gutted by a fire which broke out at about 10am on Christmas Day.

The trailer was located on the same property on which the Hutchison house which was completely destroyed by fire on November 28th had been standing.

A neighbor, Gene Benito, who had spotted and reported the first Hutchison fire, noticed the smoke pouring from the trailer and called the Eagle River Volunteer Fire Company. Benito said he rushed over to the trailer to see if anyone was inside, and found no one there. He attempted to remove some of the furniture from the trailer while waiting for the Fire Company to arrive.

The fire was extinguished but not before inflicting approximately \$7,000 damage to the trailer and contents. -The Hutchison's had hot yet

The Hutchison's had hot yet moved into the trailer, which they were in the process of buying. They are living temporarily near mile 18 in Old Chugiak, it was believed that they had planned to move into the trailer withing the next few days. Apparently they had uot yet moved all of their personal belongings into the trailer.

The loss was not covered by insurance. The cause of the fire was


The cause of the fire was believed to be a defective oil heater, according to Tom Take, Eagle River Fire Chief.

LIGHT SNOW CAN **BE DANGEROUS**

A light or moderate snowfall may well be as dangerous as a blizzard, motorists were advised today by the Alaska State Troopers,

When blizzards develop, no one is fooled. Safety becomes a matter of real concern and dri-vers stay off the highway if at all possible. But light snow is deceiving and many drivers fail to realize just how treach-erous snow and ice can become ...until they are stalled or

caught skidding into a ditch. caught skilding into a ditch. Safe driving rules for s n o w conditions include: get to know the feel of the road by gently pumping brakes intermittently when first starting out. The n, drive at conservative speeds. Follow other vehicles at safe distances, giving yourself plenty of margin for braking and other maneuvers if the car ahead sud-

distances, giving yourself plenty of margin for braking and other maneuvers if the car ahead sud-denly stops or goes into a spin as well. The end of the year is or skid.

Use tire chains in addition to snow tires when traveling on ice or hardpacked snow.

If it's necessary to stop sud denly, don't slam on the brakes. Pump them down gently inter-mittently. A fast stop will throw you into a spin or skid.

Always keep windshields clear of snow, frost and ice. If vision is obscured, pull off the traveled portion and clean away snow and ice. Periodic checks of de-frosters and windshield wipers will help you avoid losing a clear picture of the road ahead Remember, too, that you must

clear your windshield before you start moving. Driving while looking through only a "Peep hole" in the windshield can zero you in on a tragic mishap.

PRE-SCHOOL EYE TESTS PLANNED

CHUGIA: Members of the Chugiak Health Council wish to remind parents of preschool children in the Greater Chugiak Area of the Amblyopia (Eye) Clinic to be held here in January.

Beberly Glenn, local Pub-lic Health Nurse explains that Amblyopia, or "Lary Eye" is a condition that if untreated in children under the age of six can lead to partial blindness.

Mrs. Glenn said that often parents are unaware of this condition because a very young child is himself unaware they he is not seeing properly, and the amblyopia properly, and the amblyopia is not discovered until the child has started school, at which time it may be to late to correct it.


