WRECK WIPES OUT GUARD RAIL

POLICE ARREST TWO JUVENILES

EAGLE RIVER: State Police arrested and took into custody two juveniles on Saturday, June 22nd.

The arrest took place at 3:00am at mile 13 on the Glenn Highway.

The pair, a boy age 17 and a girl 16, were in a car which the State Trooper had stopped for questioning.

As soon as the car stopped, the two jumped out and attempted to escape by running in different directions. They were later arrested and charged with being in possession of alcoholic beverages. Both gave Anchorage addresses.

WALK KALLENBERG WORKS TOWARD WINGS

OLD CHUGIAK: A recent Chuglak High School graduate is well on his way to earning his private pilot's license.

Walter Kallenberg, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Kallenberg of Ptarmagin Valley Road in Old Chuglak, is taking flying lessons at Aero Tech at Merrill Field through a \$750 Anchorage Pilot's Association scholarship.

Walter was awarded the scholarship as a result of an essay competition on the subject of "Why I want to learn to fly."

The scholarship will enable him to obtain his private pilot's license. Walter has already soloed and is presently building up the necessary time and experience he needs to qualify for the license.

EAGLE RIVER: The driver and three passengers were injured in a one car accident which took place at mile 13 1/2 last Monday, July 24.

The car, a 1967 Chevrolet sedan, went out of control while traveling north at high speed and wiped out 100 foot of guardrail before going over the bank and coming to rest upside down.

The driver, David James Tibbets of Anchorage, and the three passengers, Marjorie Joan Fairbanks, and Dorothy Marie Walker also of Anchorage, and Merlvin Keith Underhill of Eagle River, all were suffering from facial laceration and bruises. They were taken to the 5040th Air Force Hospital by the Eagle River Volunteer Fire Company Ambulance. The vehicle was judged a total loss.

The police have not issued any citation pending investigation.

POST OFFICE BIDS ASKED AGAIN

EAGLE RIVER: Postmaster General R. F. O'Brien, today advised Postmaster Lucille M. Fly, of the Eagle River Alaska Post Office, that during the period July 21, through August 17, 1967, bids will be solicited for construction of a new postal facility in Eagle River on a site owned by Thomas J. Take Jr. and Vernon Burger of Eagle River, which will be sold to the successful bidder.

The property is located on the Northeast corner of Glenn Highway and Cornado Road, and comprises approximately 25,275 square feet.

The facility desired will contain 4,250 square feet of interior floor space with a 216 square foot platform and 18,336 square feet of parking and maneuvering area.

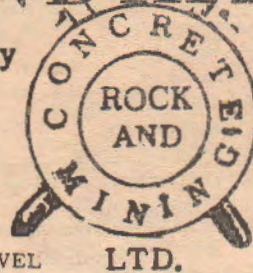

BIDS ASKED FOR CLEAR JOB

Sealed bids are invited for an Air Force contract for a project at Clear Air Force Station, Alaska.

The work in schedule "A" will include constructing a multipurpose recreation building, airmen's dormitory, an Air Police operations building, and a warehouse addition. Schedule "B" will include constructing an auto maintenance shop while schedule "C" consists of constructing a concrete second floor mechanical penthouse and an air ventilation system in each of the two dormitory buildings.

GUIDE EXAMS GIVEN NEXT WEEK

The quarterly written and oral guide examinations for prospective big game guides will be given at the Anchorage office of the Alaska department of fish and game during July 31 through Aug. 4.

Southcentral regional game supervisor Loren W. Croxton has announced that applicants should make an appointment for the examination any time prior to July 25.

In order to qualify for the test, the game official said an applicant must be at least 21 years of age, a legal resident of Alaska, in sound physical condition; have practical field experience in handling firearms hunting, judging trophies, field preparation of trophies, first aid, and photography; and be familiar with the terrain and transportation problems in the district for which application is made.

Croxton said a high percentage of applicants usually fail the tests because of inadequate preparation.

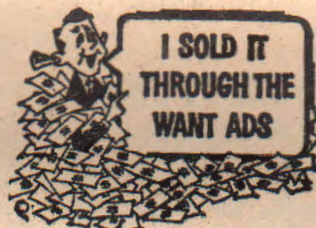

JUNEAU: —A \$323,750 fund for financing the VISTA Volunteer program has been approved by Gov. Walter J. Hickel, it was announced this week.

Hickel explained that the funding will provide for a statewide Vista force of 100 volunteers for the year. They will work in communities throughout Alaska. The projects are aimed at upgrading living conditions with emphasis on remote areas.

Hickel said the program was "one of great importance to Alaska—one, in fact, which has more impact here than in other states because of our great need to improve the living conditions faced by our rural citizens."

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SENATOR TELLS OF FUND CUTS

The House Appropriation Committee recently cut fund for three programs important to Alaska, Senator E.L. (Bob) Bartlett has reported.

In reducing budget requests for the Environmental Science Services Administration, a branch of the Commerce Department, the House Appropriations Committee in effect eliminated funds to finance weather bureau observers at 17 Alaska flight installations, including that at Palmer, and Coast and Geodetic Survey studies of the Continental Shelf.

The House committee also refused to allow the Air Force to change the operation of the Alaska Communications System into an industrial fund. The effect of that decision could mean elimination of all or most ACS funds

slated for capital improvements, a Defense Department spokesman said.

Senator Bartlett, a member of the Senate Appropriations Committee, said that he would support efforts to appeal these cuts in the Senate, but added that it was "becoming increasingly difficult to restore all the items which are reduced in the house."

The House committee allowed a small increase in the ESSA's budget, but the entire increase was taken up by rising costs and program which the committee directed ESSA to fund fully.

If the House bill is allowed to stand, there will be no weather observers at Dillingham, Farewell, Haines, Minchumina, Palmer, Aniak, Bettles, Homer, Iliamna, Nenana, Sitka, Big Delta, Gulkana, Talkeetna, Unala

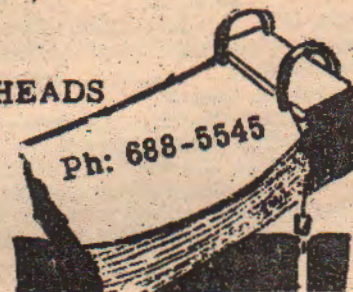
kleet and Summit. Federal Aviation Agency personnel handling air traffic control at these installations have been making weather observations for ESSA. Responsibility for the observations is reverting to ESSA as the FAA consolidates its air traffic program and withdraws personnel from these installations.

"Not only are these weather observers important to the pilots using flight facilities in these areas, but they are an intricate part of the weather-data gathering operation so vital to commerce, agriculture, science and life in general in Alaska," Bartlett said.
