#### EEUCATORS TOURING U of A CAMPUS


A group of noted educauus and representatives of national foundations will visit the University of Alaska campus July 24-27 as part of a tour of the "Middle North."

#### GUIDE EXAMS GIVEN NEXT WEEK

The quarterly written and oral guide examinations for prospective big game guides will be given at the Anchorage of-fice of the Alaska department of fish and game during July 31 through Aug. 4.

Southcentral regional game supervisor Loren W. Croxton has announced that applicants should make an appointment for the examination any time prior to July 25.

In order to qualify for the test, the game official said an applicant must be at least 21 applicant must be at least 21 years of age, a legal resident of Alaska, in sound physic al condition; have practical field experience in handling firearms hunting, judging trophies. field preparation of trophies, first aid, and photography; and b e familiar with the terrain and transportation problems in the district for which application is made made.

Croxton said a high percent-age of applicants usually fail the tests because of inadequate nror ation.

"Would-be guides planning to take these tests are welcomed at the fish and game office, where instructions will be given them on what to study," s a i d roxton. Those interested should contact the Alaska department f fish and game, and make an opointment for the tests.





In reducing budget requests for the Environmental Science S er v i c es Administration, æ branch of the Commerce Depart ment, the House Appropriations Committee in effect eliminated funds to finance weather bureau observers at 17 Alaska flight installations, including that at Palmer, and Coast and Geodetic Survey studies of the Continental Shelf.

The House committee also refused to allow the Air Force to change the operation of the Alaska Communications System into an industrial fund. The effect of that decision could mean elimination of all or most ACS funds

slated for capital improvements, a Defense Department spokesman said.

Senator Bartlett, a member of the Senate Appropriations Committee, said that he would support efforts to appeal these cuts in the Senate, but added that it was "becoming increasingly difficult to restore all the items which are reduced in the house."

The House committee allowed a small increase in the ESSA's budget, but the entire increase was taken up by rising costs and program which the committee directe ESSA to fund fully.

If the House bill is allowed t stand, there will be no weather observors at Dillingham, Farewell, Haines, Minchumina, Palmer, Aniak, Bettles, Homer, Iliamna, Nenana, Sitka, Big Delta, Gulkana, Talkeetna, Unala




