## LAST CHANCE TO SAVE BOWLING ALLEY



**EAGLE RIVER:** A public meeting has been scheduled in what has been called as the last chance to save the Eagle River Bowl from going out of existence.

The meeting, which will take place Thursday, July 8th at 8:00pm in the 300 Room of the Eagle River Bowl, is to inform interested persons on what steps will be necessary to prevent the closure of the bowling alley and the removal of the equipment.

A group has been at work the past two months in an attempt to keep the owner of the property from foreclosing and putting the building up for sale.

An attempt to get sufficient pledges from prospective investors, and the formation of a local cooperation which could finance the balance through the Small Business Administration has been in the mill. The matter has progressed to the point where a definite indication on just how much cash will be put up by the local investors is needed before the SBA will approve or disapprove the loan.

The meeting will be to acquaint interested individuals of the details of what has been accomplished to date, and to find out if there is enough local interest to proceed with the project, or whether it is to be abandoned and the property to revert to the mortgage holder.

"This will be the last chance for saving the Bowling Alley" said a spokesman for the local group. "If we can't swing it now, they will just have to close the doors and let them chop the alleys up."

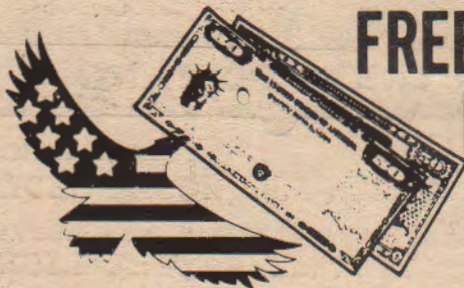

### PARENTS SHOULD HAVE VOICE IN SCHOOL PROGRAM

#### OPEN LETTER:

Should parents have a voice in determining the educational programs instituted by the Borough school administration? It apparently was the intent of the Borough Act that the elected School Board members would be attune to the views of interested parents and would convey that consensus to the school administration.

If a consensus can be obtained and is conveyed to the administration just how responsive is the school administration to the views and wishes of responsible parents and dedicated teachers familiar with educational needs and problems at the local level?

It is the intention of the Borough School Administration to inaugurate a full time kindergarten program throughout the Borough in the school year 1967-68 unless there is evidence of disapproval by the general public. There is considerable doubt that a majority of the tax-paying parents of our area would choose a kindergarten program as the greatest educational and training need of today.

A reliable consensus of the voting public whom they attempt to serve should be welcomed by the school board and administration. Such a consensus can be obtained at the polls in October.

The Borough Assembly will consider in the latter part of July all propositions to go on the ballot at the Borough election in October.

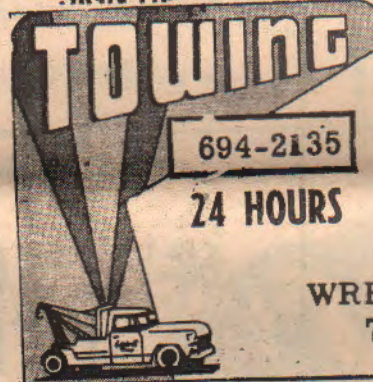
The proposition of whether or not a kindergarten program should be inaugurated in the 1967-68 and the cost in mills taxation of the program should be on the ballot.

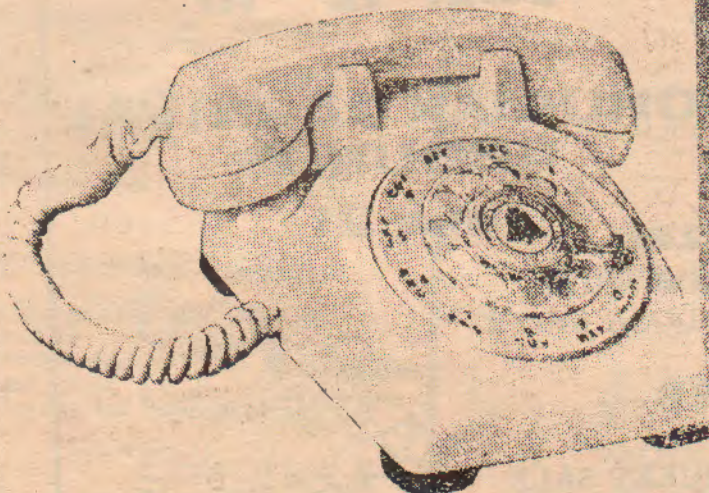

## LOCAL STUDENT AT UTAH STATE

LOGAN UTAH: Louis Leger, of Chugiak Alaska, is one of 38 high school students from across the nation selected to participate in a Mathematics Summer Science Training Program for High Ability High School Students, at Utah State University, July 6 to August 15.

Purpose of the program is to augment and broaden the training in science for capable students, many of whom don't have the opportunity for development in these areas in their high schools because of a limited curriculum, said Dr. Lawrence O. Cannon, USU assistant professor of mathematics and director of the program.

The mathematics program is being supported by a \$13,025 grant from the National Science Foundation.

The 38 students will receive individual and class mathematics instruction from the staff of the USU Mathematics Department and will also study independently in order to progress as rapidly as they can.

The students were nominated from their respective high schools and selected on the basis of their aptitude, grades, mathematic creativity and interest, said Dr. Cannon.

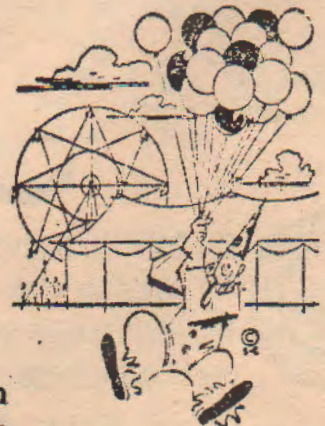

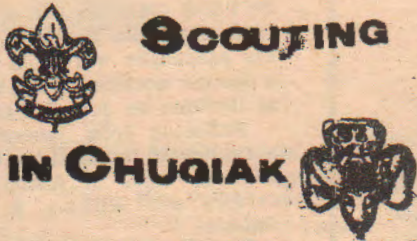
