the Eagle River Elemental, School and in the classrooms which have been vacated by the seventh grade which has been transferred to Chuglak High School.

Harry L. Wimmer, Principal of Birchwood Elementary, has a long record of teaching in Alaska. He came here for his first teaching assignment in 1952 upon completion of his training at Kansas State University at Manhattan Kansas where he received his B.S. and M.S. degrees. He taught high school English and math at Palmer in 1942, and in 1942-43 he taught at the Agricultural School in Eklutna. He returned to Palmer in 1943, where he continued to teach until 1956, when he left Alaska to teach at Elderato Junior College in Kansas.

He returned to Alaska in 1959 to teach at Central Junior High School. He has been with the Anchorage School District since that date. Before coming to this area he has been Principal at Scenic Park Elementary School, and Assistant Principal at Wendler Junior High School.

The new principal at Eagle River Elementary School will he Dave C. Crowell who was Assistant Principal at Lake Otis Elementary School last year.

Mr. Crowell, who is replacing Robert (Sam) Hayes, received his B.A. and his M.A. at Washington State University at Cheney Washington. He

came to Alaska for his first teaching assignment where he taught Physical Education at Ft. Richardso from 1961-62. In 1962-63 he taught P.E. at Wendler Junior High, and then returned to Cheney Washington where he taught the sixth grade. He returned to the Anchorage School District in 1966, where he taught the sixth grade at Turnagain and was an administrative intern. In 1966-67 he was Assistant Principal at Lake Otis Elementary School.

Laurence N. Graham, who replaces Barney Sabo as Chugiak High School Principal, has been at East Anchorage High School since 1961. He was the Assistant Principal at East in 1965-66. He received his B.A. at St. Olas College in Northfield Minnesota, and his A.M. at Colorado State in Greely Colorado. Prior to coming to Alaska he taught High School English and speech at Eldora Iowa for two years. (cont page 7 col 2)

ASSEMBLYMAN CALLS PUBLIC MEETING

BIRCHWOOD: Ed Willis, Borough Assemblyman from Section 1, (the Greater Chugiak Area) has called a public meeting for Wednesday, August 16th at Chugiak High

The meeting will be held in the multi-purpose room beginning at

Mr. Willis said that the purpose of the meeting is to report to the residents of this area on the items which may appear on the ballot at the coming election; namely library services, fire protection, police powers, sewer bonds etc.

He is also anxious to discuss the possible effects of re-approtion-ment on this area. The Borough has considered comb' ug the Greater Chuglak Area 1 some precincts of the Muldoon area in order to conform with the reapportionment as called for by State Law. Willis said that it is his belief that this would be unfair to local rasident as well as those in the Muldoon area. He doesn't think the two areas share common problems, and that one assemblyman would have difficulty in loing a

good job of representing everyone.
Willis will also invite those uteuding the meeting to bring up any problems they may have and will at-tempt to answer ail questions.

SHEEP AND CARIBOU SEASONS OPEN

ANCHORAGE: The Dall sheep and caribou season opened August 10 in all units of Southcentral Alaska except Units 7 and 15 which are closed to caril 1 hunting, reported Loren W. Croxton, Southcentral Regional Game Supervisor in Anchorage,

Fourty-four caribou were trans-planted to the Kenai Peninsula by the of Fish and Game in Department 1965 and 1966 in order to establish a huntable caribou population. Since that time the caribou have scattered over a large area. Several caribou cows with calves have been seen, Croxton said, indicating the animals have been reproducing normally.

At this time the outlook for a future caribou herd in Units 7 and 15 appear quite good. All hunters and fishermen are requested to report any caribou observations from the Kenai Peninsula to the Department of Fish and Game office in Anchorage.

Sheep hunters should remember to pick up their harvest tickets before venturing afield, Croxton said, and these may be obtained from the Fish and Game office or the various license vendors.

There is one new regulation this year that all sheep hunters should be aware of, Croxton said, which deals with the use of aircraft for trans-portation of hunters to their field camps. Anyone who is airborne through the day must wait until after mid-night to take or assist in taking

Dall sheep.
The post card portion of the sheep harvets ticket must be returned within 15 days after a ram is taken or for those hunters who are unsuccessful, the harvest ticket must be mailed within 30 days after the close



OBEDIENCE CLUB TO HOLD NEW CLASSES

OLD CHUGIAK: The Obedience Training Club of Chugiak has announced the beginning date of their next class of dog obedience training.

The class is scheduled to start on September 10th, at the Chugiak Community Hall at mile 21.

Classes will be held every Sunday from 6:00pm to 7:00pm, and the course consists of ten sessions. Entry fee is \$15.00 per dog. Both mixed breeds as well as pure bred dogs are eligible.

7th GRADERS TO GAIN ADVANTAGES

BIRCHWOOD: The advantages which would be offered to seventh grade students upon being transferred to Chuglak High School were outlined to parents by school administration of ficials at a meeting held at the high school last Wednesday evening.

The seventh graders, who have previously attended classes at the Eagle River Elementary School, will be housed in re-locatable classrooms which were constructed behind the

high school this summer.

Some of the advantages outlined were that each seventh grade boy will be able to take a quarter (9 weeks) of woodshop and each seventh grade girl will be able to take one quarter of Home Economics. Also each seventh grade student will be able to take one quarter of general music and one semester of Physical

Education. This will in no way cut into the time allocated for high school students in these subjects.

It was also pointed out that a special reading teacher has been hired for the seventh grade, and she will conduct a non graded reading program, with a special speed reading course for those with above average abilities.

The high school will have two seperate lunch shifts to accommodate the additional students. One shift will feed the seventh and eighth grade soutend, while the 9th, 10th, 11th and 12th graders will eat during the second shift.

Larry Graham, Chugiak High Principal, stated, that at present, he could see no alternative to having the students shift from one of the detatched relocatable classrooms to the other for the changing of classes. The possibility of having the teachers move from one classroom to the other while the students remained in one place has been ruled out at not being workable.

Mr. Graham aosl said that the library at the High School will be much improved. He said that at the close of the school year last June, there were a total of 3,000 books in the library. Since that time an additional 1,000 books have been ordered which will be a permanent addition to the library, and 500 books will be on loan, making a total of 1,500 more books this fall. He said that he ha requisitioned a micro-film reader and a number of current periodicals on micro-film.

He added that the seventh grade students will be transported on the same bus as the high school students.
