BURNED CHILD IN HOSPITAL



ANDY KNAPP PAUSES IN CHUGIAK DURING HIS 8,500 MILE BICYCLE TRIP THROUGH ALASKA AND CANADA

EAGLE RIVER: Eight year old Norma Rankin, of Eagle River, who was severely burned last week is in satisfactory condition in the Anchorage Community Hospital.

Norma, who is the daughter of James Rankin of Aurora Street, had been helping her older sister burn trash. The trash barrel was burning, when Norma dumped some additional refuse into it additional refuse into it. Apparently there was included in this refuse some gasoline soaked rags which had been used to clean paint brushes. This caused the fire to blaze up, and ignite a synthetic sweater the child was wearing. Linda, her older sister managed to tear the burning clothes from Norma, but not before she had sustained second and third degree burns over 30% of her body from chin to waist and on both arms and legs.

A neighbor summoned the ambulance of the Eagle River Volunteer Fire Company, and Norma was transported to the Anchorage Community Hospital.

The accident took place on Monday, July 31st. Norma's father reported that she is recovering slowly and will probably be hospitalized for several months. Prior to arriving in Chugiak, he had spent three days in Fairbanks as the guest of A-67. He was presented with a special plaque, and a gift certificate for A-67, and had his toe painted purple by "Hippy" the A-67 clown an honor awarded to all celebrities who appear at A-67.

TWO DIE IN CAR MOTORCYCLE CRASH

OLD CHUGIAK: Two men died instantly following the crash of a motorcycle and a car on Peters Creek hill last week.

The cycle, a Honda, driven by Edwin Earl Woolverton of Seattle (age 41) was proceeding north on the Glenn Highway approaching the Peters Creek bridge.

The car, a 1965 Pontiac sedan, driven by Royce S. Kayton of Anchorage, was southbound, and had pulled out over a double yellow line to pass another car, when it ran headon into the cycle which was traveling without lights.

The driver of the cycle and his passenger, Rick R. Smith (age 25) of Homer Alaska, were both thrown in excess of 40 feet from the cycle. Woolverton was thrown through the windshield of the car and partially decapitated.

When Andy arrives home he expects he will have covered 8,500 miles on this trip. He is majoring in history at the University of Minnesota, and will return there the end of September as a junior. He is keeping a diary of his trip, and may someday write an account of this and other cycle trips he has taken.

His parents keep track of him and his brother on a map they have on the wall at home. His father is in business in St. Paul.

His trip from Fairbanks to Chugiak took him five days. After proceeding to Anchorage, and sight-seeing around the city, he planned to bicycle to Seward, and from there take the ferry to Valdez. He then would proceed back to Tok and from there to Haines. He then would take the ferry to Prince Rupert and proceed from there to a rendezvous with his younger brother and two other friends who were touring in Canada on bicycles. The four had started their trip together, but had parted at Dawson Creek, when it turned out that Andy was the only one who was willing to travel the Alaska Highway.

Andy has made several long trips by bicycle during the past few summers, mostly through Canada. His bicycle is a custom built ten speed racing bike. He can pedal up even the steepest hills with it. He carries all the necessities of life in four saddle bags and in packs on the rear fender and on the handlebars. His gear consists mainly of a small nylon tent, sleeping bag, mess kit

and a single burner gasoline stove. He has spent most of his nights camping out, but on several occasions, in particularly bad weather he has accepted offers to spend nights indoors. On one occasion he was a guest in an unoccupied cell of a county jail, and on another he was forced by stormy weather to check into a hotel. He was invited to spend the night with the Flemings when he dropped in to see them at the request of a friend of their who he had happened to meet while camping at Lake Creek on the Alaska Highway. This friend, Helen Haugh, has made several trips to Alaska, and had a number of friends in the Chugiak Area.

Andy said that he has had very few problems either mechanical or otherwise on his trip. He has met several bears, but none have ever threatened him. He had to send for a new wheel while at Beaver Creek in Canada, but this arrived in a few days from Anchorage.

LIONS CLUB SELLS CENTENNIAL BOOKS

EAGLE RIVER: The Eagle River Lions Club has taken on the man-sized job as Alaska distributor of Marjorie Roberts 432 page Alaska Centennial Pictorial.

The 5000 book run, which arrived in Anchorage from the printers July 1st, has been distributed to retail outlets throughout the State and is being handled as Club projects by five Lions Clubs in the Anchorage Area and by one Club each in Palmer, Copper Valley, Kenai, Dillingham, Point Barrow and Kodiak.

A rerun of 5000 books is scheduled to arrive in Anchorage about August 18th to resupply retail outlets and Clubs. There is strong indication that Alaskans will be purchasing the books to mail to friends and relatives as Christmas gifts. Convenient and attractive individual book mailers will be available. The books are retelling at \$4.95 per copy.

The Book Committee of the Eagle River Lions Club plans to use a portion of the profit from the project to complete and improve the two Little League and the Babe Ruth baseball fields and dugouts. The need of a third Little League field is anticipated.

ASSEMBLYMAN CALLS PUBLIC MEETING

BIRCHWOOD: Ed Willis, Borough Assemblyman from Section 1, (the Greater Chugiak Area) has called a public meeting for Wednesday, August 16th at Chugiak High School.

The meeting will be held in the multi-purpose room beginning at 8pm.

Mr. Willis said that the purpose of the meeting is to report to the residents of this area on the items which may appear on the ballot at the coming election; namely library services, fire protection, police powers, sewer bonds etc.

He is also anxious to discuss the possible effects of re-apportionment on this area. The Borough has considered combining the Greater Chugiak Area with some precincts of the Muldoon area in order to conform with the reapportionment as called for by State Law. Willis said that it is his belief that this would be unfair to local resident as well as those in the Muldoon area. He doesn't think the two areas share common problems, and that one assemblyman would have difficulty in doing a good job of representing everyone.

Willis will also invite those attending the meeting to bring up any problems they may have and will attempt to answer all questions.

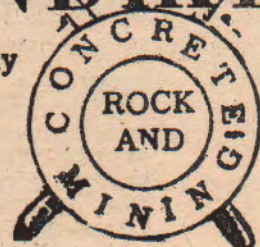

POST OFFICE BIDS STILL BEING ASKED

EAGLE RIVER: Postmaster General R. F. O'Brien, today advised Postmaster Lucille M. Fly, of the Eagle River Alaska Post Office, that during the period July 21, through August 17, 1967, bids will be solicited for construction of a new postal facility in Eagle River on a site owned by Thomas J. Take Jr. and Vernon Burger of Eagle River, which will be sold to the successful bidder.

The property is located on the Northeast corner of Glenn Highway and Cornado Road, and comprises approximately 25,275 square feet. The facility desired will contain 4,250 square feet of interior floor space with a 216 square foot platform and 18,336 square feet of parking and maneuvering area.

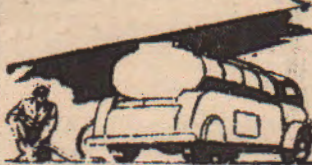

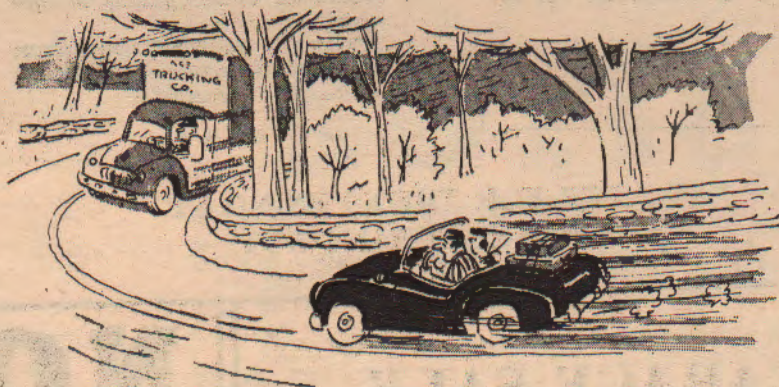

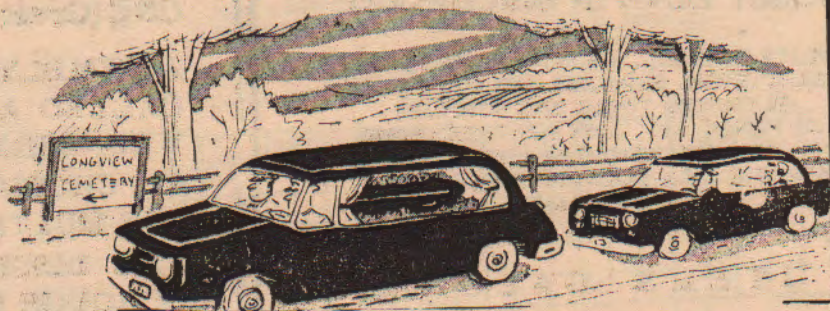
