CHUGIAK: A proposal for a Head Start program in the Greater Chugiak Area has been submitted to the Office of Economic Opportunity by Anchorage Borough sch-

ool District.
This proposal calls for one class consisting of not more than 15 students to be housed in the Birchwood Elementary School.

If approved by the O.E.O., the program is scheduled to begin on January 15th, 19t

begin on January 15th, 1968 and continue until the end of the school term.

This proposal was submit ted at the request of the Anchorage Community Action Agency. The idea originally was conceived by the local Community Council G.O.A.L.

Head Start differs from the conventional kindergarten in that it is an enrichment program specifically designed for chidren from disadvantaged homes, It includes medical and dental care, as well as free lunches.

The appropriation for this program would be in the am-ount of \$20,000, which provides a teacher, a teachers aid, bus transportation, lunches and medical and dental services.

#### PRE-SCHOOL EYE TESTS PLANNED

CHUGIA: Members of the Chugiak Health Council wish to remind parents of preschool children in the Greater Chugiak Area of the Amblyopia (Eye) Clinic to be held here in January.

Beberly Glenn, local Public Health Nurse explains that Amblyopia, or "Lazy Eye" is a condition that if untreated in children under the age of six can lead to partial blindness.

Mrs. Glenn said that often parents are unaware of this condition because a very young child is himself unaware they he is not seeing properly, and the amblyopia is not discovered until the child has started school, at which time it may be to late to correct it.

The clinic will test all pre-school children for amblyopia at no charge to the parents. The date for the clinic has been set for January 13th, a Saturday. It will be held in the Health Center, located in the basement of the Eagle River Baptist Church between the hours of 11:00am and 4:30pm.

The Health Council is asking women from the community to assist in conducting this clinic.




