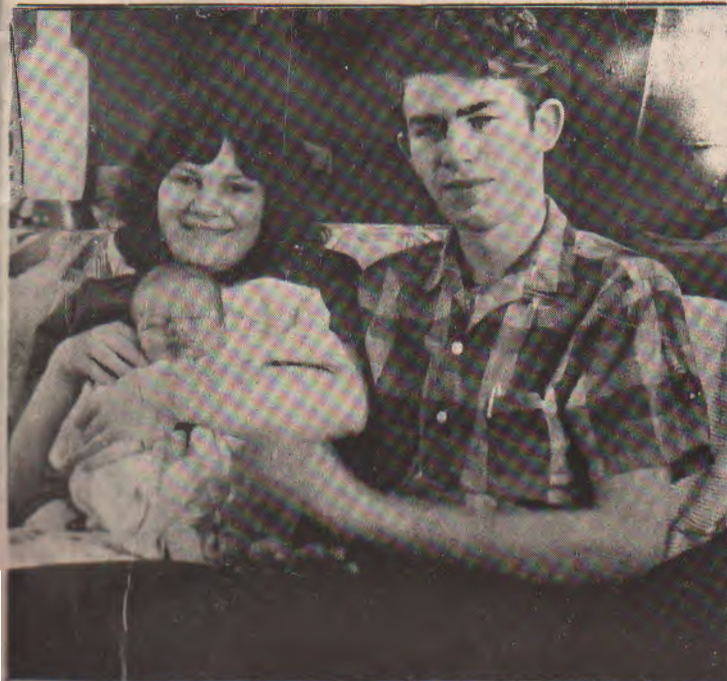

PRE-SCHOOL EYE TESTS PLANNED

CHUGIAK: Members of the Chugiak Health Council wish to remind parents of pre-school children in the Greater Chugiak Area of the Amblyopia (Eye) Clinic to be held here in January.

Beberly Glenn, local Public Health Nurse explains that Amblyopia, or "Lazy Eye" is a condition that if untreated in children under the age of six can lead to partial blindness.

Mrs. Glenn said that often parents are unaware of this condition because a very young child is himself unaware they he is not seeing properly, and the amblyopia is not discovered until the child has started school, at which time it may be late to correct it.

The clinic will test all pre-school children for amblyopia at no charge to the parents. The date for the clinic has been set for January 13th, a Saturday. It will be held in the Health Center, located in the basement of the Eagle River Baptist Church between the hours of 11:00am and 4:30pm.

The Health Council is asking women from the community to assist in conducting this clinic.

DECALS TO BE PLACED ON TAXED ITEMS

ANCHORAGE: Local Borough Assemblyman Ed Willis today reminded local residents that Borough Ordinance No 218 has been passed.

This calls for the placement of decals on certain objects subject to personal property tax, these items being airplanes, cars, trucks, snow-vehicles, mobile homes, boats, pick-up campers, trailers etc.

These decals will be issued upon receipt of the filing and must be affixed to the subject property no later than March 15th of each year. A penalty for failure on the part of the individual or business to affix the decal will be levied of not less than \$25.00 nor more than \$100.00 for each vehicle involved.

The decals are not transferrable when the vehicle is sold.

Willis said that he had voted against the ordinance for the reason the the opinion of those attending the public hearings was overwhelming against the decals, and that the majority of local residents whom he had interviewed also were not in favor of it.

REGRET RAISE IN RATES

This week the Knik Arm Courier must take a step which we deeply regret, and one which we have put off taking in the ten years that we have been in publication.

We refer to the fact that the new increase in postal rates makes it necessary to raise our rates for mailed subscriptions.

When the present subscription rate was established, the rate for mailing a copy of the Courier was three cents.

When the rate was increased to four cents a copy, we still did not raise our rates, preferring instead to absorb the cost of the increase. However the latest hike has raised the mailing rate to six cents per copy, a 100% increase over the rate that we started out paying. Because of this, it will now be necessary to raise the yearly subscription rate from \$5.00 per year to \$6.00.

The rate for a six month subscription will go to \$3.00.

However, despite the increased cost of paper and ink, the price per copy on the stands and from carriers will remain at 10¢ per copy. We point out that to date the Courier is one of the very few weekly newspapers in Alaska to still sell for 10¢. Most have gone up to 15¢ a copy and some even sell for 20¢ each.

RECREATION PROPOSALS ARE BEING ASKED

Proposals for preparation of statewide comprehensive outdoor recreation plan are being requested by the Alaska Division of Lands, Department of Natural Resources. The plan, which is not expected to exceed \$50,000 in cost, is necessary for Alaska to retain its eligibility under the federal Land and Water Conservation Fund.

The plan is to be completed by July 1, 1969, and must meet all standards established by the federal Bureau of Outdoor Recreation, said Ted Smith, chief of parks and recreation for the Division of Lands.

Proposals will be accepted by the Division of Lands, 344 Sixth Ave., Anchorage, until 5 p.m. Jan. 31. The proposals will be used as the basis for selecting one or more planners for further discussion and negotiation of a contract. Additional information is available from parks and recreation, Smith added.

JAN. 15 DEADLINE FOR ESTIMATED INCOME TAX

Monday, January 15, 1966, is the due date for the final payment of 1967 estimated Federal income tax, according to Lewis Conrad, District Director of Internal Revenue for Alaska. An amended declaration of 1967 estimated income tax may be required by January 15, from taxpayers who have had changes in income or exemptions during the last quarter of 1967 that cause substantial increase or decrease in income tax. The amended declaration form printed on the notice of installment received by taxpayers may be used to amend the original estimate or Form 1040-ES (Amended) may be obtained from any IRS office.

FOUR HURT IN COLLISION

OLD CHUGIAK: Four passengers in a 1968 Ford station wagon suffered minor injuries when the vehicle collided with the trailer of a Riteway Auto Carrier that had slid partially off the road into the ditch at mile 18 1/2 recently.

The tractor portion of the rig was stuck in the ditch, but the trailer pas protruding into the lane of traffic when the accident took place.

The driver of the Ford, John A. Nagy of Copper Valley School, had swerved to avoid two cars that were in the opposite lane of traffic, and ran into the trailer.

The four of nine passengers in the Ford who were injured were, Stanley D. Rudger age 22 Cecilia A. Jorgenson age 18 and Jean A. Ellerthrope age 19 all of Copper Valley and Doris J. Nagy age 24 of Cleveland Ohio.

ERIC BERGSTROM SUFFERS HEART ATTACK

ANCHORAGE: A Birchwood man is presently in serious condition in Providence Hospital following a severe heart attack.

Eric Bergstrom, who is employed as day man at the Birchwood Elementary school became ill while at work last week.

Latest report is that he is showing slight improvement, but still in serious condition.

STUDENTS MAY HAVE REFUND COMING

Students who worked part-time or during the summer may have a refund coming on their 1967 federal income tax returns. Lewis J. Conrad, district director of Internal Revenue, said this week.

Students are required to file a tax return if they earned \$600 or more. If they earned less than \$600 and taxes were withheld from wages by their employers, they should file a return of the tax withheld from their wages.

Unmarried students who earn less than \$900 will not owe any federal income tax. They are entitled to claim the usual \$600

personal exemption, plus a \$300 minimum standard deduction.

Students are entitled to claim their own personal exemption when filing a tax return, Mr. Conrad said. Parents who furnish more than one-half the cost of support for their child who is a full-time student may also claim him as an exemption on their tax return, unless the child is married and is filing a joint return with his or her spouse.
