ADVISORY COMMITTEE TO MEET TONIGHT

The committee has sent a letter to General Breitweiser formally asking the military to meet with the committee and to discuss possible alternatives to the location of the proposed new high school.

It is the aim of the committee to learn the wishes of the local residents and to determine if the majority favors the relocation of the present high school or if they favor some other solution.

The committee hopes to schedule another public meeting in the near future at which time they will inform the people of the progress they have made toward a compromise with the military and to try to determine what the people wish.

JUVENILE CAUGHT IN BREAK IN

BIRCHWOOD: A three month vigil finally paid off for Ray Emmons of Birchwood, when he caught a fourteen year old juvenile who was attempting to break into his home.

Emmons, whose home has been broken into five times, has had the place under 24 hour surveillance for three months.

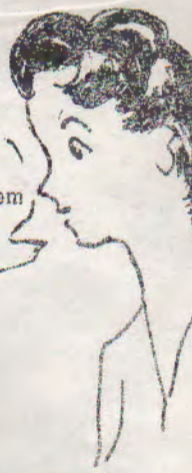

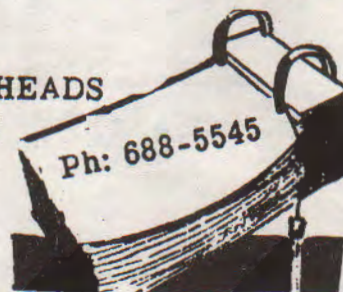

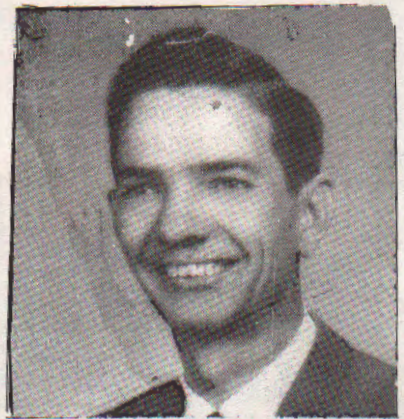
Dr. Leaming will speak on "New Life Missions" and Dr. Logan on "The Effectiveness of Small Groups."

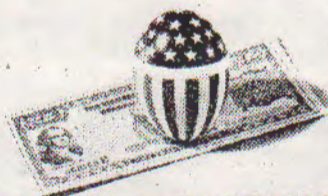

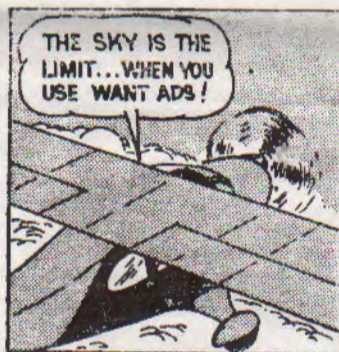
State Troopers estimated the damage to the Dodge at \$100, the Chevrolet was damaged an estimated \$200.

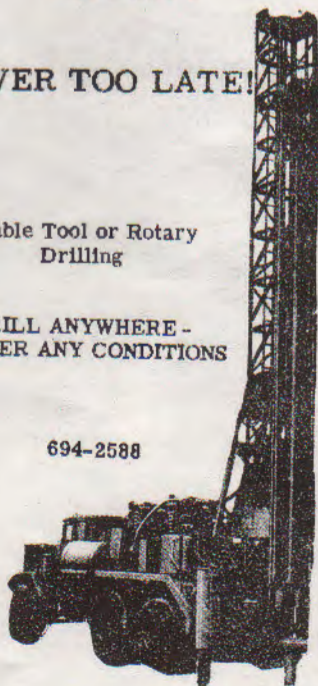

JOHNNA LONAS WINS BETTY CROCKER AWARD

BIRCHWOOD: Because she finished first in a written knowledge and attitude examination for senior girls December 5, Johnna Lonas has been named 1968 Betty Crocker Homemkaer of Tomorrow for Chugiak High School.

Johnna Lonas's achievement has made her eligible for state and national scholarship awards and also has earned her a specially designed silver charm from General Mills, sponsor of the Betty Crocker Search for the American Homemaker of Tomorrow program.

A state Homemaker of Tomorrow and runner-up will be selected from the winners of the schools in the state. The state winner will receive a \$1,500 college scholarship, and her school will be awarded a complete set of the Encyclopaedia Britannica by Encyclopaedia Britannica, Inc. The runner-up will earn a \$500 educational grant.

The Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow from this state, together with those from all other states and the District of Columbia, each accompanied by a school advisor, will join in an expense paid educational tour of Colonial Williamsburg, Va., and Washington D.C., next spring.

The national winner--the 1968 All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow -- will be announced at a dinner in Minneapolis, Minn., home of General Mills, Inc. She will be chosen from state Homemakers of Tomorrow on the basis

her original test score plus personal observation and interviews during the tour, and her scholarship will be increased to \$5,000. Second, third, and fourth ranking national winners will have their original scholarship grants increased to \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000 respectively.

This is the 14th year of the Betty Crocker Search, initiated in 1954-55 by General Mills to emphasize the importance of homemaking as a career. Approximately six million senior girls have participated in the Search program since its inception, and 1,358 winners will have earned scholarships totaling \$1,481,500 at the conclusion of the current program.

The 603,798 girls from 15,079 schools registering for the 1968 Search established a new record for the program.

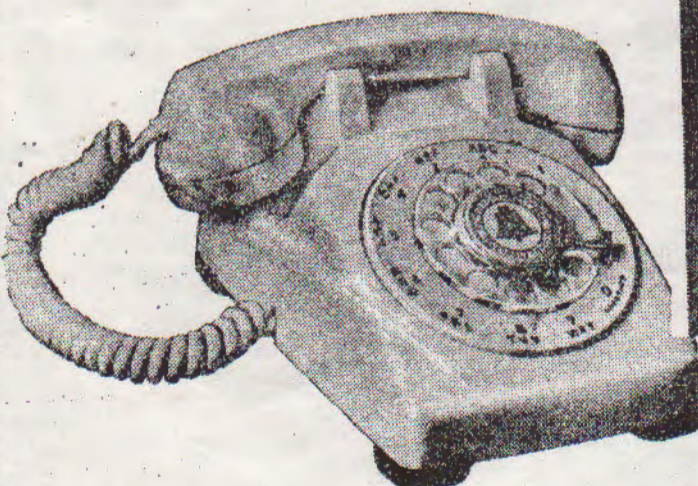
