

LOCAL YOUTH WINS ACADEMY APPOINTMENT

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDS UPGRADING

BIRCHWOOD: Local residents gave the school Advisory Committee their vote of confidence as they voted without opposition to accept the recommendation of the committee to upgrade and expand the existing high school facility at Chuglak.

The committee in its report recognized the needs of the students from the military bases, and recommended that the School Administration plan for and build a new Senior High School at a suitable location to care for the students from the military bases, plus those in surrounding areas. A suitable site for this was that proposed by General Bretweiser, but the committee indicated that final decision on the location should be by agreement between school officials, military officials and residents of the areas involved.

The recommended date for both the upgrading of the local facility and the construction of a high school for the military was suggested at 1970-71, with the Southeast High School to be built in 1972-73.

The sentiment of those attending the meeting appeared to be in favor of keeping the high school in this area, but holding out for the upgrading of specified areas as needed.

Although a few parents felt that attending a larger high school outside the area might give students the advantages of being able to take courses not offered at a smaller school, most felt the disadvantages of long bus ride would outweigh this. It was brought out that those who wished to take courses not available at the local school had the option of attending any other school in the district where these courses were offered.

The committee meets again tonight (Wednesday, February 14th,) at 8:00pm at Chuglak High School.

They will firm up their recommendation in a formal form for presentation to the school administration officials.



FRANK MIELKE

BIRCHWOOD: Senator Ernest Gruening, in an address to the assembly at Chuglak High School this morning, announced the appointment of Frank Gustav Mielke to the Naval Academy at Annapolis for the class beginning in June 1968.

Frank, who is the son of Mr. and Mrs. John C. Mielke of Lower Peters Creek, will graduate from Chuglak High School in the class of 1968. He is a member of the first graduating class to have attended all four years in the local high school. He was a graduate of the Chuglak Elementary School.

Mielke will receive a principal appointment to the academy, which means that if he passes the physical examination and the ability test he is certain of being admitted.

Senator Gruening has also named him first alternate for an appointment to the Air Force Academy at Colorado Springs. He would qualify there if the principal appointee fails either the physical or the ability test.

SHRIVER TO SPEAK AT TESTIMONIAL

ANCHORAGE: Sargent Shriver, national head of the Office of Economic Opportunity, is scheduled to be main speaker for a March 29th testimonial dinner honoring the "Alaskan of the Year", according to Henry Hedberg, chairman of the program.

An outstanding Alaskan, whose identity is to be unknown until the testimonial dinner, is being selected by an award committee from nominations solicited from all Alaska newspapers and radio and TV stations.

Proceeds from the event, which is planned as a regular annual affair, will be used to create an Alaska Methodist University scholarship for an Alaskan student, according to Hedberg.

The award winner will be judged according to his or her contributions to "any or all aspects of Alaska life which have significantly affected its character and growth," with the qualification that the award recipient must be an Alaskan resident.

After the first wave of excitement had passed, and there was time to look at the matter clearly, a large number of local residents felt that it was more important to keep a high school in our own area rather than return to bus rides "across the river" to a large high school as had been envisioned by combining with the military.

The desire to retain what Dr. Kramer had referred to as our "own identity", outweighed any advantages that might be obtained in the large school.

Also, there appears to be the feeling that we had better keep our "bird in the hand" rather than chance losing it for a fancier one that might be lurking in the bush.

To be realistic, we must see that as long as there is a

Chugiak High School at the present location, the school administration will have to provide adequate facilities at this school to serve the students attending there.

Should the local residents ever compromise and allow the administration to start once again bussing our students to a senior high out of this area, the chances of their ever building a high school in this area are nil. The present school was built by state funds through the efforts of Operation Chugiak High School. As we well remember this was a hard fought battle, one which took several years to win. Many feel that had not Operation Chugiak High School not succeeded just prior to the formation of the Anchorage Borough, Chugiak area students would now be attending East Anchorage High and would continue to attend there indefinitely.

With a high school in this area we have a strong point

Although it has been done in other states, this will be the second such "company" enlistment for Alaska. The first "All-State" company was enlisted

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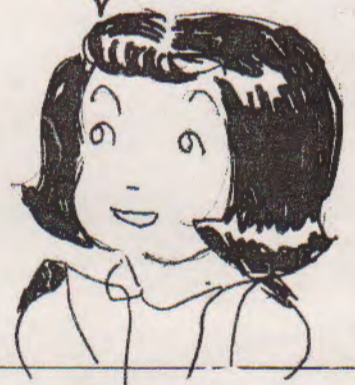

In P.E. the girls are learning to play basketball. We are practicing dribbling, passing and shooting.

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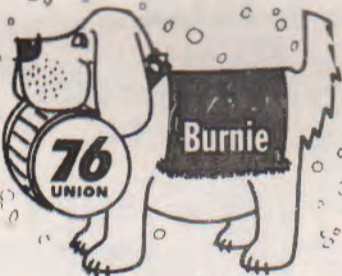
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MUSTANG EXPRESS News and Activities of Chugiak High School

VA LISTS COMPENSATION

The veterans Administration paid out in 1967 an estimated \$2,249,000 in compensation and pension benefits to 2,300 Alaska veterans or their survivors, Michael W. McDonough, manager of the Juneau VA regional office, has announced.

Included in this estimate are increased pension and Viet Nam era wartime disability compensation payments provided by the Veterans' Pension and Readjustment Assistance Act signed by the President last August, McDonough said.

Of the estimated \$7-billion of all VA expenditures nationally in 1967, approximately \$3,800,000 was expended in Alaska, McDonough explained.

Compensation and pension benefits for approximately 4.5 million American veterans or survivors account for nearly \$4.4 billion of the \$7 billion total of VA expenditures nationally this past year.

The next highest VA expenditure in 1967 was for hospital and medical services. To care for ill and disabled veterans in its 166 hospitals and 202 outpatient clinics in 1967, Va spent more than \$1.3 billion.

GUIDE PROPOSALS SOUGHT

The board of fish and game is soliciting proposals from the public for changes in the 1968-1969 state game and guiding regulations according to Loren W. Croxton, southcentral regional game supervisor. The board will meet in Fairbanks in mid-April to rule upon these proposals.

Proposals for regulation changes must be specific and should refer to the section number of the current regulation which the proposal seeks to change. Any proposal must be accompanied by an adequate explanation or justification for change in the regulations. Proposals should be addressed to the Board of Fish and Game, Support Building, Juneau, Alaska 99801; and must arrive before 5 p.m., February 23 to be printed and released to the public for comment early in March. April 5 is the deadline for receiving comments from the public on these proposals.

The proposals will then be considered.

NEW CABBAGE READY NOW

COLLEGE: Seed of two new cabbage varieties specially developed for Alaskan conditions is available to vegetable growers and home gardeners this year. Dr. Horace Drury, Experiment Station Director announced today.

These varieties, Alaska 6467 and Alaska 6469, were developed by Dr. Arvo Kallio at the University of Alaska's College Farm. They have been widely tested in the Tanana and Matanuska Valleys. Commercial vegetable growers their farms report excellent results.

Both varieties produce compact heads that will stand in the field without splitting for much longer than other varieties, a very desirable characteristic for home gardens as well as commercial fields. Both varieties keep well in storage.

The Alaska Crop Improvement Association, which is handling seed distribution, reports that adequate seed supplies are now being made with seed and farm stores to display and sell the seed. The seed will be available in one gram packets containing approximately 225 seeds and one ounce packages containing approximately 600 seeds. Commercial growers needir

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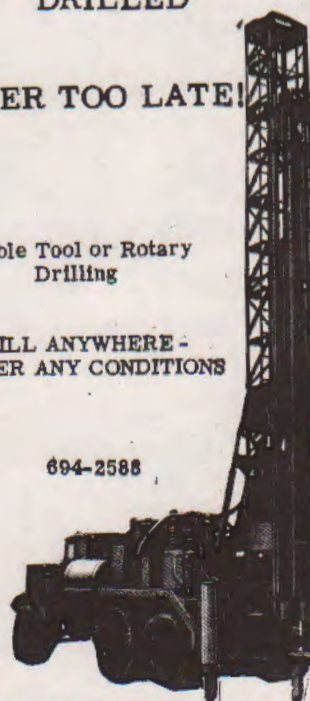

INSURANCE NOW DEDUCTABLE

Part of the cost of medical insurance may now be deducted on federal tax returns without regard to the three per cent limitation that applies to all other medical expenses.

Lewis J. Conrad, district director of Internal Revenue for Alaska, said that one half the cost of premiums paid for medical care insurance up to a maximum of \$150 may be deducted by taxpayers who itemize. Conrad said the balance of the premium costs should be added to the taxpayer's other medical expenses and reduced by three per cent of adjusted gross income.

The new treatment for hospital insurance premiums take effect for the 1967 tax year.

One half the cost of supplementary medical insurance under the Medicare program may be deducted under this new tax law provision. Insurance covering the loss of income due to illness or injury is not a medical expense and the premiums paid are not deductible, Conrad said.

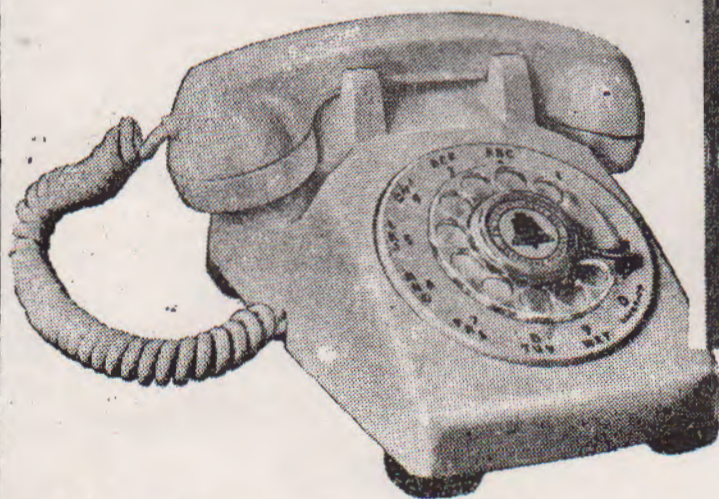
