

LOCAL YOUTH WINS ACADEMY APPOINTMENT

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDS UPGRADING

BIRCHWOOD: Local residents gave the school Advisory Committee their vote of confidence as they voted without opposition to accept the recommendation of the com-mittee to upgrade and expand the existing high school fac-

ility at Chugiak. The committee in its report recognized the needs of the students from the military bases, and recommended that the School Administration plan for and built a new Senior High School at a suitable location to care for the students from the military bases, those in surroundplus plus those in surround-ing areas. A suitable site for this was that proposed by General Breitweiser, but the committee indicated that final decision on the location should be by agreement between school officials, military of-ficials and residents of the areas involved.

The recommended date for both the upgrading of the local facility and the construction of a high school for the military was suggested at 1970-71, with the Southeast High School to be built in 1972-73.

The sentiment of those attending the meeting appeared to i.e in favor of keeping the high school in this area, but holding out for the upgrading of specified areas as needed. 11though a few parents felt

Dave Harper, chairman for the Southcentral District will be the first guest speaker of the evening. He will explain the reorg-


anization of the precincts in this area.

The School Advisory Committee apparently learned that most of the people in the Greater Chugiak Area were in agreement on one thing con-cerning our local high school problem.

After the first wave of excietment had passed, and there was time to look at the matter clearly, a large num-ber of local residents felt that it was more important to keep a high school in our own area rather than return to bus rides "across the river" to a large high school as had been envisioned by combining

with the military. The desire to retain what Dr. Kramer had referred to as our "own identity", out-weighed any advantages that might be obtained in the large might be obtained in the large school.

Also, there appears to be the feeling that we had better keep our "bird in the hand" rather than chance losing it for a fancier one that might be lurking in the bush.

To be realistic, we must see that as long as there is a

Chuglak High School at the present location, the school administration will have to provide adequate facilities at this school to serve the stu-dents attending there. Should the local residents

should the local residents ever compromise and allow the administration to start once again bussing onr stu-dents to a senior high out of this area, the chances of their ever building a high school in this area are nil. The present school was built by state funds through the ef-forts of Operation Churiat forts of Operation Chugiak High School. As we well remember this was a hard fought battle, one which took several years to win. Many feel that had not Operation Chugiak High School not succeeded just prior to the form-ation of the Anchorage Borough, Chugiak area stu-dents would now be attending East Anchorage High and would continue to attend there

indefinitely. With a high school in this area we have a strong point

VA LISTS COMPENSATION

'ine veterans Administration paid out in 1967 an estimated \$2,249,000 in compensation and veterans or their survivors, Michael W. McDonaugh, manager of the Juneau VA regional office, has announced.

Included in this estimate are increased pension and Viet Nam era wartime disability compenera wartime disability compen-sation payments provided by the Veterans' Pension and Readjustment Assistance Act signed by the President last signed by the President August, McDonaugh said.

Of the estimated \$7-billion of all VA expenditures nationally 1967, approximately was expended in \$3,800,000 Alaska, McDonaugh explained. Compensation and

pension benefits for approximately 4.5 million American veterans or survivors account for nearly \$4.4 billion of the \$7 billion total VA expenditures nationally of

this past year. The next highest VA expend-iture in 1967 was for hospital and medical services. To care for ill and disabled veterans in its the hospitals and 202 outits 166 hospitals and 202 out-patient clinics in 1967, Va spent more than \$1.3 billion.

NEW CABBAGE READY NOW

COLLEGE: Seed of two new cabbage varities specially de-veloped for Alaskan con-ditions is available to vegetable growers and home gardners this year, Dr. Horace

Drary, Experiment Station Direcor announced today. These varities, Alaska 6467 and Alaska 6469, were dev-eloped by Dr. Arvo Kallio at the University of Alask's College Farm. They have been widely tested in the Tanana and Matanuska Valleys. Commercial vegetable growers their farms report excellent results.

Both varieties produce compact heads that will stand in the field without splitting fro much longer than other var-ieties, a very desireable characteristic for home gardens as well as commercial fields. Both varieties keep

well in storage. The Alaska Crop Improve-ment Association, which is handling seed distribution, reports that adequate seed supplies are now being made with seed and farm stores to dis-play and sell the seed. The seed will be available in or gram packets containing an proximately 225 seeds and one ounce packages containin approximately 600 seed Commercial growers needing

larger quantities should contact the Alaska Crop Improvement Association directly.



INSURANCE NOW DECUCTABLE

Part of the cost of medical insurance may now be deducted on federal tax returns without regard to the three per cent limitation that applies to all other medical expenses.

Lewis J. Conrad, district director of Internal Revenue f or Alaska, said that one half the cost of premiums paid for medical care insurance up to a maximum of \$150 may be deducted by taxpayers who itemize. Conrad said the balance of the pre mium costs should be added to the taxpayer's other medic a l expenses and reduced by three per cent of adjusted gross in come.

The new treatment for hospit al insurance premiums t a k e effect for the 1967 tax year.

One half the cost of supplementary medical insurance under the Medicare program may be deducted under this new tax law provision. Insurance covering the loss of income due t o illness or injury is not a medical expense and the premiums paid are not deductible, Conrad said


