CHUGIAK: The Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company, after fifteen years of public service has voted to disband, according to Fire Company President John E. Boyles.

The reason given for the above action was quoted as "...the lack of interest expressed by the majority of the people in the area served."

Boyles said that it was after repeated pleas for new members and financial assistance went unnoticed that the remaining members voted to disband.

Boyles said that according to the population of the area served (reference the 1966 Community Directory) only 28% of the families listed were CVFC subscribers. This is a total of 147 families, of which 60 were delinquent in their subscription fee at the time the figures were compiled.

The total possible members in this area would be 515.

The date given for the disbandment is April 1st, 1968.

COMMITTEE MEET WITH OFFICIALS

ANCHORAGE: Members of the local school advisory committee met with representatives of the Borough School Administration last Friday afternoon at the school administration building in Anchorage.

The purpose of this meeting was to present to the Administration the resolution which local residents had voted at a recent public meeting. This resolution called for immediate upgrading of the high school facility at the present Chugiak site, with the aim of eventually building a senior high to accommodate an enrollment of 500 or 600 students at this location. Also a part of the resolution was the endorsement of the needs of the military students, and the recommendation that the borough give first priority to the construction of a high school on or near the military reservation to accommodate these students along with those from neighboring civilian communities.

Mr. John Fridley, associate superintendent of Anchorage schools, stated that the administration was already

Charles, who was sponsored by Lenhart Masonry of Anchorage, entered in the Class G, and was first place in his class, with a time of 4 hours 7 minutes and 11 seconds the first day and 3 hours, 11 minutes 16 seconds the second day.

Charles is a veteran in local motor mushing circles, having finished first in the E Class in last year's Talkeetna to Anchorage race, and only last weekend having won the Marathon race sponsored by the Ski Benders Club of Kenai. This race started at Soldotna and went from there to Homer and back to Kenai. Charles was sponsor-

OLD CHUGIAK: Patrons at the Chuglak Post Office are having a lot fun playing the "guessing game" lately.

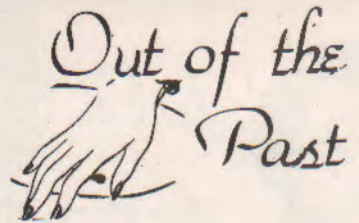
It began when Chuglak Postmaster Paul Swanson added a picture of himself taken years ago in his navy uniform to the gallery of young men presently in service.

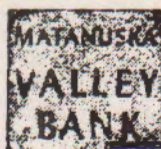

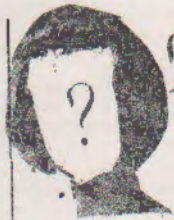

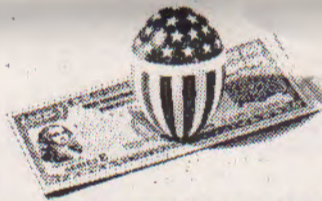
The boy was taken to the office of P. Thomas Green in Eagle River.

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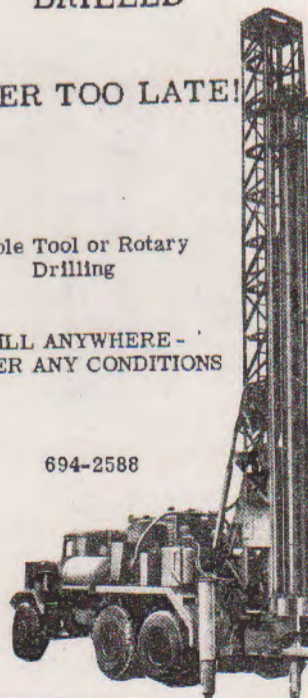
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TIPS FOR MILADY

Chugiak high will have a big part in the parade, and all local residents who plan to watch the parade either over TV or live are asked to be on the lookout for the kids and to give them a big hand.

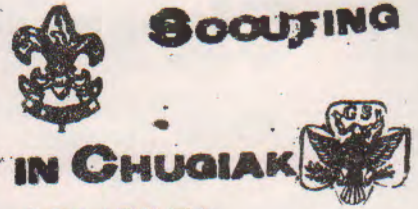
**NEW 4H CLUB

Participating in a Thinking Day ceremony is a requirement for the badge of "Sign of the Arrow."

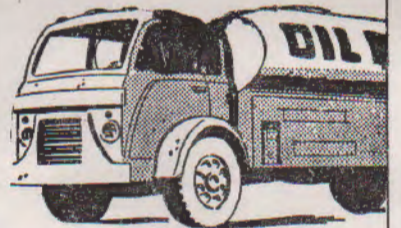

Cadette Scouts of Troop 54 will conduct the flag ceremony. Following the ceremonies refreshments will be served. Parents are invited to attend.

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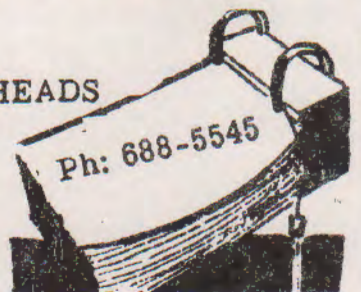

Washington Report

Senator ERNEST GRUENING



I was very happy to be in Alaska last week to announce the very good news that the U.S. Forest Service at my urging has successfully negotiated a preliminary award for a massive timber sale in the southeastern part of our state.

The sale, to be the biggest by volume ever made will be a tremendous boon to the entire state. Hopefully, this sale can be finalized by July 31.

The contract between the Forest Service and U.S. Plywood-Champion Papers, Inc., allows a fifty-year cutting period for the timber, mainly Sitka spruce and western hemlock. It is all located in the Tongass National Forest, on portions of the mainland south of Juneau, the west side of Admiralty Island and two areas near Yakutat.

One of the best features of the contract is that a major pulp manufacturing plant must be built in or near the area by July 1, 1973, providing 1,200 jobs in the area. I expect that other facilities for the manufacture of wood products will also be in operation by that time. The scope of the operations is indicated by the fact that under the contract the total facilities must require at least 175 million board feet annually.

This is the third such fifty-year timber sale made in

Alaska in the last 16 years. The others were at Sitka and Ketchikan and they resulted in the development of substantial industries.

Development programs which utilize our great natural resources start a chain reaction which results in secure jobs and big payrolls all over the state. This is why I fight so hard for development programs. We're going to have more of them in the next few years.

* * *

The Corps of Engineers has issued a favorable report for further improvement in the Tanana River Basin in the Fairbanks area.

The plan calls for the construction of a multiple-purpose dam on the main Chena River, and other dams and levees on the Little Chena and Tanana rivers.

This plan must be speedily implemented. We can't afford the staggering cost and human misery of another major flood in the Fairbanks area.
