

CHUGIAK WOMAN KILLED



PRIZE WINNING FLOAT BY CHUGIAK HIGH SCHOOL DEPICTS THE CREMATION OF SAM MCGEE.

FT. RICH: Mrs. Carl C. Taff of mile 18 1/2 in Old Chugiak, died in Providence Hospital of injuries she received in a head on collision which took place last Sunday, February 25th at 6:35pm at mile 12.1, at the entrance to the Eagle River Dump.

Mrs. Taff was the passenger in a 1963 Plymouth driven by her husband Allan Taff.

According to the State Troopers, the Taff vehicle hit head on with a 1966 Ford Thunderbird driven by Beatrice G. Earthfield of Anchorage.

Both cars were totally demolished in the crash. Mrs. Earthfield suffered lacerations and glass cuts. Mr. Taff also suffered lacerations of the head and legs.

The victim sustained two broken legs and numerous other injuries. She died in the hospital shortly after being admitted.

Mrs. Taff was born in Plamondon, Alberta Canada on May 23, 1911. She came to Anchorage in 1957 from Vancouver Washington. She and Taff were married in 1964 at Valdez. In addition to her husband she is survived by a sister, Mrs Jeanette Johnson of Anchorage, six brothers and two sons, Gordon Harle and Warren Harle of Forest Grove Oregon.

Funeral arrangements are pending at Forest Lawn memorial chapel.

CHUGIAK HIGH WINS PRIZE WITH FLOAT

ANCHORAGE: Chugiak High School walked away with the second highest overall award in the Fur Rendezvous parade with their float which depicted the cremation of Sam McGee.

This was the first year that the local high school entered a float in the parade, and for this they won the coveted Mayor's award, the second highest trophy given for any entry in the entire parade.

The float was created by Varsity basketball coach Don Sanders, and cheerleading sponsor Mrs. Flory Vinson. It was a replica of an early sternwheeler, complete with wooden paddlewheel and smokestacks. The float was built with the help of nearly seventy-five students after school. It was in keeping with the theme of the parade, which was "Alaska's Legends."

Much of the work on the float had to be done outside the main door entry, since the trailer was too large to go through the doors into the building.

The plaque, presented to Mr. Graham Saturday night will be on display in the trophy case this week and will be engraved with the school's name next week. According to Mr. Larry Graham, Chugiak High School Principal, this was the first time as far as he had

CHUGIAK TO GET PRIVATE PHONES

PALMER: The Matanuska Telephone Association has announced that after a one year trial improved service will be provided to all subscribers in the Chugiak exchange.

The new exchange building on the Birchwood Loop is now completed and new dial equipment is on the way.

This new exchange and the associated cables, installed underground last fall were designed to provide the Chugiak exchange with all one party service. This is the first time in Alaska that an exchange has been designed for all one party service.

Existing subscribers are being offered the choice of one or four party service initially. However within two years, all subscribers will be required to upgrade to one party service.

Subscribers have been sent cards to be filled out indicating their preference in service to be returned at an early date. The upgrading will require new phone numbers for all subscribers.

The rates for the service will be; 1 party business \$16.50 per month, 4 party business, \$12.50 per month; 1 party residence \$11.00 per month, 4 party residence, \$7.75 per month.

MEETING TO ASK CHOICE OF SCHOOL SITE

CHUGIAK: The Chugiak School Advisory Committee announces a public meeting to be held at Chugiak High School at 8:00pm on March 5th, 1968. The purpose of the meeting is to obtain an expression of the feeling of the people of the community as to their choice of a school location.

The committee wishes to determine if the people of the community prefer;

1. To retain the high school at its present location to serve only students from the local area. This would involve upgrading of the present facility as much as feasible as soon as possible, and at some undetermined time in the future would be a Junior-Senior High School complex, but would remain a small high school for many years.
2. To support construction of a high school, specifically in the vicinity of the East Gate of Fort Richardson, which

exhibit we saw two intricately inlaid game tables by Chuck Carter of Little Peters Creek. The ceramic display had several lovely pieces by Gloria Wilcon of Eagle River and by Earleen Bendel, also of Eagle River. The junior art show had a great many entries from the Chugiak High art students, while at the Mall, Mr. and Mrs. Harvey Goodale, of Fire Lake conducted an exhibit in the space next to the main Rendezvous art show. Two young rock hounds, Rick Pyles and Rick Steeby, of Birchwood came away with a third place ribbon for their rock collection in the junior division and also an honorable mention. Down at the Trave Fair many of her friends stopped to chat with Gini Barber, of Gini's Knit Shop in Peters Creek who was demonstrating knitting machines.

In the athletic competition, the Chugiak YMCA Basketball All Stars competed in the YMCA tournament.

There was even a familiar name in the Miss Alaska competition. Deborah Frank-

fourth, Miss Ketchikan, was the cousin of Jack Frankfourth of Eagle River.

Only one honor was missing. There was no "Miss Chugiak" riding on the hood of an auto in the parade. 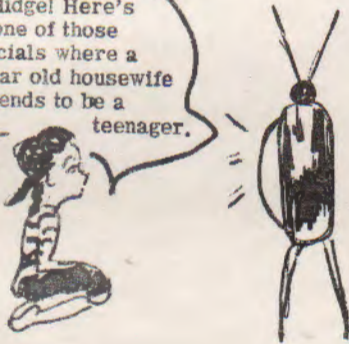

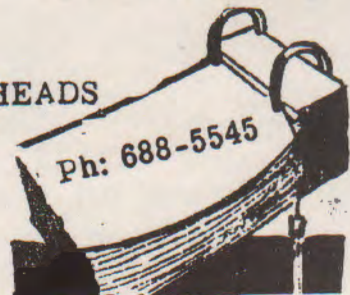

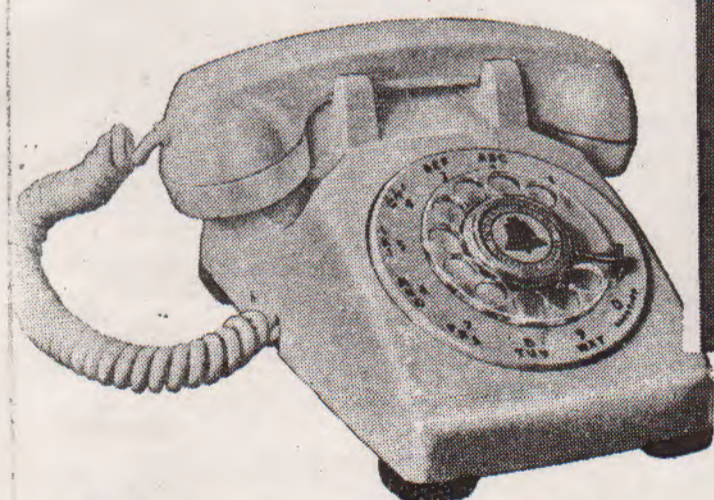

The damage to the San Felice car was estimated at \$300. There was no estimate on the damage to the Wilbur car.

Wilbur was cited in the accident.

Refreshments carried out the international theme, each representing a foreign country.



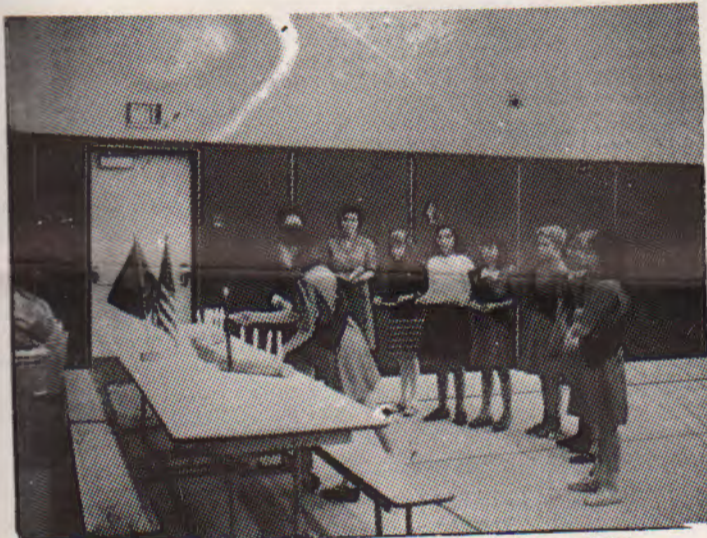

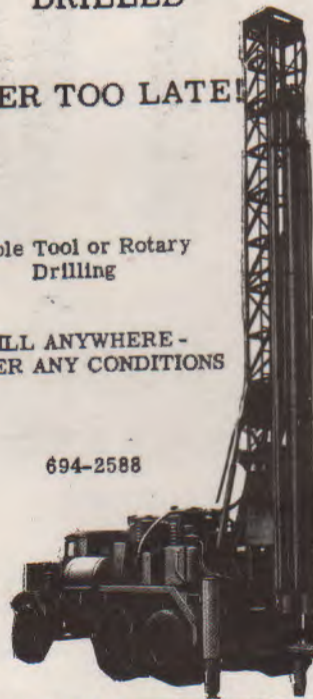

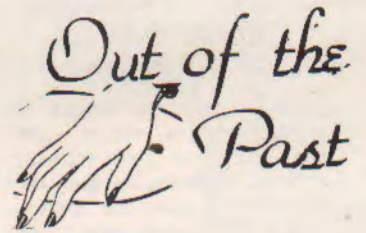

Washington Report

Senator ERNEST GRUENING



I am very happy to announce that we have been able to work out a unique partnership arrangement between several federal agencies and the State of Alaska which will bring the benefits of electric power to 20,000 Native Alaskans in 67 remote villages.

The vehicle for doing the job will be a statewide electric cooperative with a board of directors made up of representatives of the villages to be served.

Under this plan, the first of its kind anywhere, the Office of Economic Opportunity will finance the first phase. That will be conceived with central administration, special technical assistance, program development, and village organization and education.

The Rural Electrification Administration will finance the actual construction under its regular loan program. About three or four million dollars will be required for the construction. The Labor Department, the Bureau of Indian Affairs and the State of Alaska will supply supplementary services needed to complete the project.

This is not a project that is "way off in the future somewhere." An estimated 10 villages, each having its own generator, will be served by December, 1968; 30 more will be operating in 1969, and the remainder during 1970.

This is a tremendous step forward in terms of the human needs of the people, and it will be a great boost to the overall development of our state.

ample, five high-ranking officials of the Agency for International Development (AID) have resigned as a result of an investigation by my Subcommittee.

It is clear that just in the cases we are now examining, the United States has lost millions of dollars. This is a tragic waste of money badly needed for programs here at home.

Even when AID operates efficiently there is considerable doubt about the value of pouring money into many of these countries. The more we do for some of them, the more they insult us.

Not all foreign aid programs are bad, and some are vital to our national interest; but I find the inefficiency with which they are administered is incredible.

* * *

At long last we are close to ending the inconvenience many Alaskans who travel abroad have experienced because of the long distances between their home and the passport offices.

At my request, the State Department has sent letters to officials in 26 Alaskan towns inviting them to serve as passport agents. The officials, who are magistrates and clerks of court, will be authorized to execute passport applications.

The cities affected by this action are: Anchorage, Barrow, Bethel, Cold Bay, Cordova, Dillingham, Fairbanks, Galena, Glennallen, Haines, Homer, Juneau, Kenai, Ketchikan, Kodiak, Kotzebue, Naknek, Nome, Palmer, Petersburg, Rampart, Seldovia, Seward, Sitka, Valdez, and Wrangell.
