

Following completion of reconnaissance studies last year connaissance studies last year, a public hearing was held in the Eagle River Grade School on September 7. A great deal of interest in the project was evidenced by the large number of persons at-tending the public hearing to

offer testimony.

The project which is estimated to cost approximately \$1,300,000 is 4.6 miles in length. The new highway will bein in the vicinity of the Eagle River Cold Storage on the existing Glenn Highway, cutting diagonally southeast to the curve on the existing Eagle River Road. From that point the project follows the existing Eagle River Road for more than four miles easterly up the Eagle River Valley.

The new highway, which is anticipated to carry 2,600 vehicles per day by 1985, will consist of a bituminous concrete driving survace, 24 feet wide with party feet. feet wide with eight foot shoulders.



"THE LIBRARY"

On Friday of each week the third grade students at Chugiak Elem, enjoy visiting our library. Here, we are expecially proud of our Title I Library. We choose to re-fer to it as the I.M.C. (In-structional Material Center).

We spend approximately 45 minutes (sometimes a lit-tle longer) in the library on Friday. We enter quietly, seat ourselves, and listen to a very well read story by our librarian, Mrs. Wamsley. After hearing the story we move about in reasonable quiet way seeking books that we are interested in reading. There are so many kinds of books on our level that make interesting reading material. We read: Family Stories; Adven-ture Stories, Familiar Every Day Experience Stories, Concept books, also modern im-aginative stories. Sometimes we have to get

reports out on certain units If the librarian knows this ahead of time, books are placed on reserve in the library for us. Students are given permission to go to this library during free or study time and work on their reports. This gives them a feeling of responsibility along with helping them to realize and appreciate silence in the library. They are permitted to go over in groups of 4 or 6 during less formal study time.

Students also have access to the library in the mornings before school begins. They may go in and listen to remay go in and listen to re-cordings by way of headsets. Perhpas 8 students may have access to earphones at one time, others are using filmstrips, or reading books, or perhaps even recording.

We have helpful librarians in the persons of Mrs. Wamsley, Mrs. Montgomery and Mrs. Sawyer. They assist us in many ways.

Also in the library we have a model of the heart, the eye teeth and a flower. When we were studying about teeth, Mrs. Wamsley loaned us the model.

In Science we were learning about the eyes. During this study, Mrs. Wamsley came over and talked to us about eyes. She took the model eye apart. We learned about all arts of the eye, and the function of each part,

Fishing is such a major Alaskan industry that hearings conducted recently by the Senate Government Operations Subcommittee on Foreign Aid Expenditures, of which I am chairman, are of interest to the entire State.

I called the hearings to investigate reports that Korean fishing fleets, subsidized by our government, were seeking use of Alaskan ports to help them compete with Alaskan fishermen.

Government witnesses at the hearings assured me that there would be no Korean fishing for salmon, halibut or king crab. I urged that Alaskan shrimp be added to that list and they agreed. They said the Koreans would only go after bottom fish.

I remain unalterably opposed to allowing the Koreans to do any kind of fishing in Alaskan waters. I made in clear that I did not want their fishing fleets to use our ports for any purpose. The government witnesses also agreed to reconsider plans to finance two large Korean refrigerator ships.

We have seen too many evasions of international understandings to take any needless risks of damaging our fishing industry.

\* \*

In mid-February it gave me great personal pleasure to welcome Senator Bob Bartlett back to the Senate following his illness, and to see him looking so well. He is a great Senator, and we have been a team for a long time. We work closely together on all matters of importance 10 Alaska.

I have co-sponsored legislation to restore cutbacks in federal aid to school districts in Alaska under Public Law 874, which provides assistance for schools in federallyaffected areas and major disaster areas.

My bill would amend a supplemental appropriations bill recently passed by the House of Representatives to restore the \$2.4 million cut from the amount Alaskan school districts were scheduled to receive.

The supplemental appropriation is an absolute must if many schools in Alaska are to provide quality education for their students.

During the debate on the fair honsing legislation now being considered by the Senate, I informed my colleagues of the great progress we have made in this area in Alaska.

When I was Governor of the Territory of Alaska, the territorial legislature, at my request, passed effective antidiscrimination legislation in the fields of housing and em-

ployment.

Prior to the passage of this legislation, there had considerable discrimin against Alaskan natives. lieve most of the people our State agree that Alask has benefitted from these huand forward-looking


