Mr. Saylor will explain how this area could become a Borough Fire Service district through a vote of the residents at the next election. Mr. Clary will tell the effect of disbandment on certain fire insurance policy rates.

The Fire Company, which announced it's proposed disbandment two weeks ago have received appeals from a number of local residents asking what can be done to keep this from taking place. It is the

LET'S KEEP CHUGIAK HIGH!

BIRCHWOOD: "Let's Keep Chugiak High School" was the overwhelming sentiment expressed by an overflow crowd at the public meeting held last night in the high school multi-purpose room.

The meeting had been called by the school advisory committee to determine whether local residents would be in favor of having senior high students from the Greater Chugiak Area transported by bus to a high school near the East gate of Ft. Richardson.

Of the over 350 persons who attended the meeting 35 voted to make the move to Ft. Rich- while 204 stated their desire to keep Chugiak High at it's present site to serve the students of this area.

The vote followed over an hour of debate during which various individuals were granted the floor to ask questions of the committee or to express their views on the matter. Because of the size of the crowd, each individual was limited to five minutes to make their point were requested not to for the floor more than

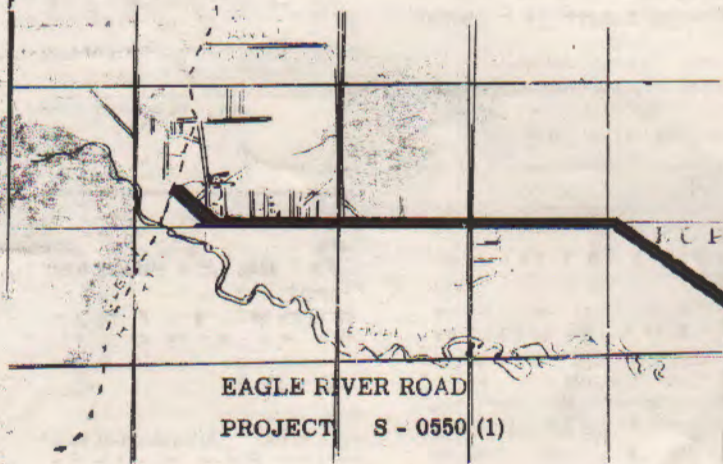

ANCHORAGE: Surveyors will begin work in the recently approved alignment for the Eagle River Road Highway project, a department of Highways spokesman said today.

Following completion of reconnaissance studies last year, a public hearing was held in the Eagle River Grade School on September 7. A great deal of interest in the project was evidenced by the large number of persons attending the public hearing to offer testimony.

The project which is estimated to cost approximately \$1,300,000 is 4.6 miles in length. The new highway will be in the vicinity of the Eagle River Cold Storage on the existing Glenn Highway, cutting diagonally southeast to the curve on the existing Eagle River Road. From that point the project follows the existing Eagle River Road for more than four miles easterly up the Eagle River Valley.

The new highway, which is anticipated to carry 2,600 vehicles per day by 1985, will consist of a bituminous concrete driving surface, 24 feet wide with eight foot shoulders.

SIGN UP FOR U.S. SAVINGS BONDS/FREEDOM SHARES

You will not automatically receive a refund of tax withheld from your wages unless you file a tax return, said Lewis J. Conrad, district director of Internal Revenue for Alaska.

A tax return is not required when the gross income received during the year is less than \$600 Conrad said, but a return must be filed to obtain a refund of any federal tax withheld. This advice applies particularly to students and other persons who worked only a part of the year.

Forms 1040 and 1040A must be filed by everyone under 65 years of age whose gross income for 1967 was \$600 or more. If the taxpayer is 65 or older, a return is required only if total income amounts to \$1,200 or more.

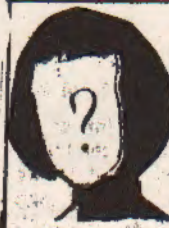
Steve has been evacuated to the Naval Hospital at Oakland California where he will be hospitalized for several months.

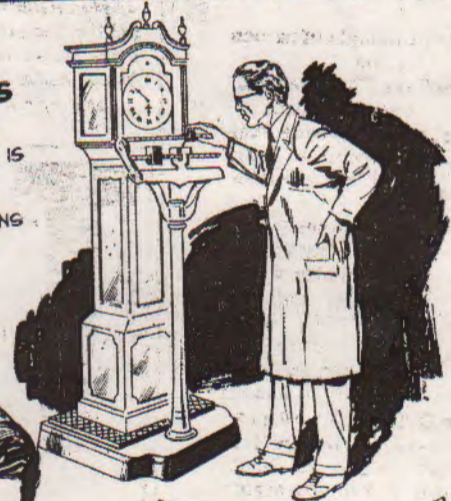

"THE LIBRARY"

On Friday of each week the third grade students at Chugiak Elem. enjoy visiting our library. Here, we are especially proud of our Title I Library. We choose to refer to it as the I.M.C. (Instructional Material Center).

We spend approximately 45 minutes (sometimes a little longer) in the library on Friday. We enter quietly, seat ourselves, and listen to a very well read story by our librarian, Mrs. Wamsley. After hearing the story we move about in reasonable quiet way seeking books that we are interested in reading. There are so many kinds of books on our level that make interesting reading material. We read: Family Stories; Adventure Stories, Familiar Every Day Experience Stories, Concept books, also modern imaginative stories.

Sometimes we have to get reports out on certain units. If the librarian knows this ahead of time, books are placed on reserve in the library for us. Students are given permission to go to this library during free or study time and work on their reports. This gives them a feeling of responsibility along with helping them to realize and appreciate silence in the library. They are permitted to go over in groups of 4 or 6 during less formal study time.

Students also have access to the library in the mornings before school begins. They may go in and listen to recordings by way of headsets.

Perhaps 8 students may have access to earphones at one time, others are using filmstrips, or reading books, or perhaps even recording.

We have helpful librarians in the persons of Mrs. Wamsley, Mrs. Montgomery and Mrs. Sawyer. They assist us in many ways.

Also in the library we have a model of the heart, the eye teeth and a flower. When we were studying about teeth, Mrs. Wamsley loaned us the model.

In Science we were learning about the eyes. During this study, Mrs. Wamsley came over and talked to us about eyes. She took the model eye apart. We learned about all parts of the eye, and the function of each part.

Come by and visit our library, you may find just the book that you would like to read.

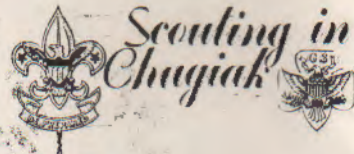

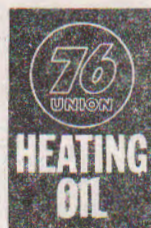
