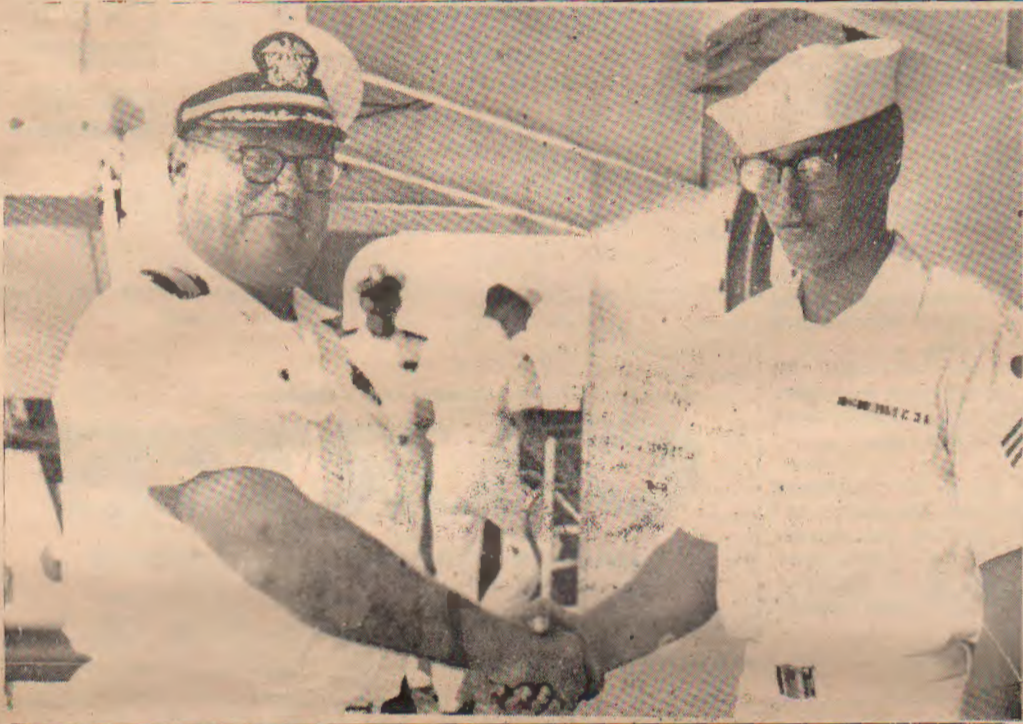


CHUGIAK SERVICEMAN GETS CITATION



CAPTAIN D.E. WHITMIRE OF THE U.S.S. NAVARRO CONGRATULATES RICHARD JONROWE ON RECEIVING A CITATION.

FPO SAN FRANCISCO: A Chugiak man, Richard D. Jonrowe, Electrician's Mate Fireman, serving with the United States Navy aboard the Attack Troop Transport U.S.S. Navarro, last month received a citation for "Outstanding performance of duty as a member of the crew of a rescue boat assigned to remove survivors from a stricken British merchant ship.

In a letter to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Roger Jonrowe of Old Chugiak, he told how his ship received the S.O.S. from the stricken ship while they themselves were running from Typhoon Emma. Although it meant returning six hours into the storm, the Navarro, being the ship in the area which was closest responded.

When they arrived they found the freighter broached on a reef near the Phillipine Islands. At that time the waves were 15 to 30 feet high. The Navarro carries two big steel rescue boats on the aft part of the ship. Jonrowe was assigned to the second boat, the M-2. The other boat, the M-1 was put in the water, but because the ramp had come undone it started to sink. He said that the M-2 was then launched and after determining that the M-1 would be able to recover from its difficulties, they tried to reach the freighter.

Jonrowe reported that the seas were extremely rough, and they were able to proceed at the rate of 30 yards in a half hour. When they reached the ship, he said it was sitting on the bottom with 25 feet from the water line to the main deck. He said all waves were crossing the main deck. The M-2 was on the leeward side, and had taken about 10 of the 44 people aboard the ship into their boat when the first wave went over the bridge of the freighter and put about a foot of water in the boat. They continued to take the survivors aboard as waves continued to fill their boat. He said that they had approximately three feet of water in the boat and were "bailing like mad", when he looked up and saw a wave that was filling the stack of the freighter. He said "I figured this was it". He remembered that he removed his glasses with his right hand and hanging on with his left. "I was smashed flat with the weight. I thought it would never end." When that wave passed, there was 5 1/2 feet of water in the boat and they were within inches of sinking. The men started bailing, and one of the crew jumped off to save one of

Although there have been more people failing to pay the annual subscription fees to the local Volunteer Fire Companies, that have supported them, there has never been any case where a situation such as the following took place.

In an article reprinted from the Houston Texas Chronicle, we read:

FIREMEN LET HOUSE WITHOUT 'TAG' BURN

HOUSE SPRINGS, Mo. (AP) Volunteer firemen from nearby High Ridge, Mo., watched the home of Mr. and Mrs. John Akers burn to the ground Monday because the family had not purchased a \$7 fire protection tag.

Fire Chief Julius R. Petry said the department's bylaws firmly state, "No tag, no service."

The area has no full-time fire fighters. Volunteer de-

partment funds are raised entirely through the sale of tags.

Petry said if firemen extinguished a blaze at one house which does not have a tag, other might be encouraged to stop buying protection.

Three trucks and about 10 volunteers responded to the Akers alarm, but when they saw the house did not bear a fire tag, the refused to put out the blaze and began wetting down a nearby house which did have a tag.

Petry said he recalls two other houses have been permitted to burn because owners did not but fire tags.

Now we do not recommend that the local Volunteers resort to anything that drastic to gain wider support from the people, but it does give one something to think about

TEACHER UNHURT IN WRECK

EAGLE RIVER: A Chugiak High School teacher was un-hurt in a two car collision which took place at mile 15.3 last Friday morning.

Mrs. Patricia Cahill was trying to slow for a school bus that had the lights flashing, when she lost control of her car on the icy road.

She collided with a 1968 Chevrolet Pick-up, driven by James D. Wells of Birchwood, inflicting \$250 damage to it.

Mrs. Cahill's 1966 Pontiac was damaged an estimated \$175. Neither Mr. Wells nor the three children riding in Mrs. Cahill's car were injured.

The State Trooper cited Mrs. Cahill for driving too fast for conditions.

Rick Jonrowe, son of Roger and Dorothy Jonrowe, of Chugiak has received a citation for outstanding performance of duty while stationed on the Navy ship the U.S.S. Navarro. As a member of the crew of an LCM (rescue boat) Rick, Electrician's Mate Fireman, was sent to aid a merchant ship stricken by thirty knot winds and twenty foot seas caused by Typhoon Emma. Shallow water and huge waves made it difficult to stay along side the ship. As the crew lifted survivors from the vessel, they bailed with battle helmets while standing in waist deep water.

The citation reads in part, "Fireman Jonrowe's determination, initiative and devotion to duty greatly aided in the success of the rescue efforts and reflected great credit upon himself."

The concert will take place in the multi-purpose room of the high school. Tickets are \$1.00 for adults, 75¢ for students, and grades 1 through 6 are 25¢.

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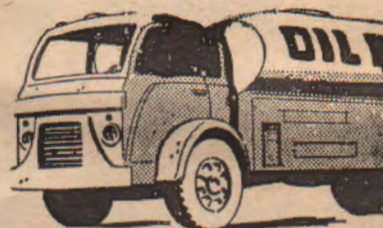
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Tell it to Martha

two men who had been washed off the bridge of the freighter. They managed to rescue this man, but then had to leave or sink themselves. By that time the M-1 arrived, but since there was only one path through the reefs, they had to come through one at a time. The M-1 went ahead to rescue the remainder of the crew, while the M-2 returned to the Navarro with their load of survivors. By that time a second British freighter had arrived and dropped anchor near the Navarro. Jonrowe concluded by reporting that only one man had been lost in the rescue operation.

38 of the survivors were put aboard the second British freighter, and five were put in the sickbay of the Navarro. Jonrowe himself was ordered to the sickbay for a shot, and found to his joy that it was a shot of Scotch!

He mentioned that after the rescue was completed that the M-2 had two holes in the bottom. "I'm glad I didn't know this while we were in the water!" he said.

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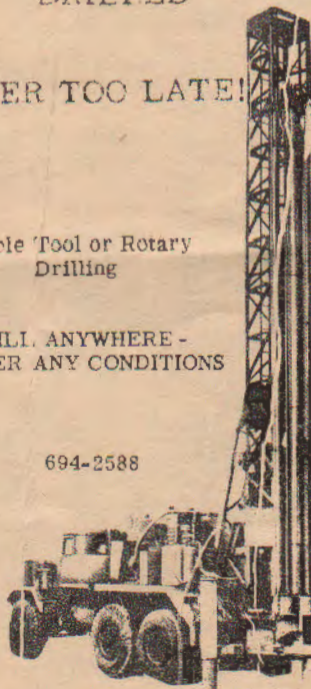

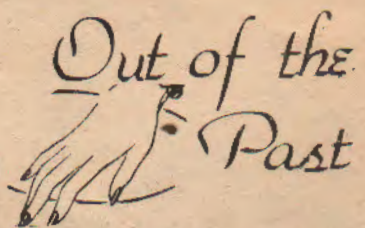
SHOP TO OPEN BRANCH

LADIES CLUB TO PRESENT TEA

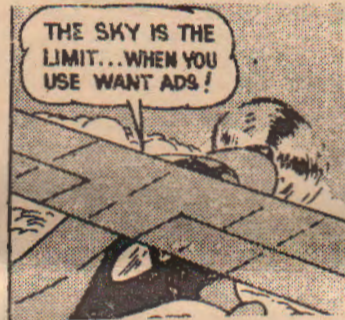

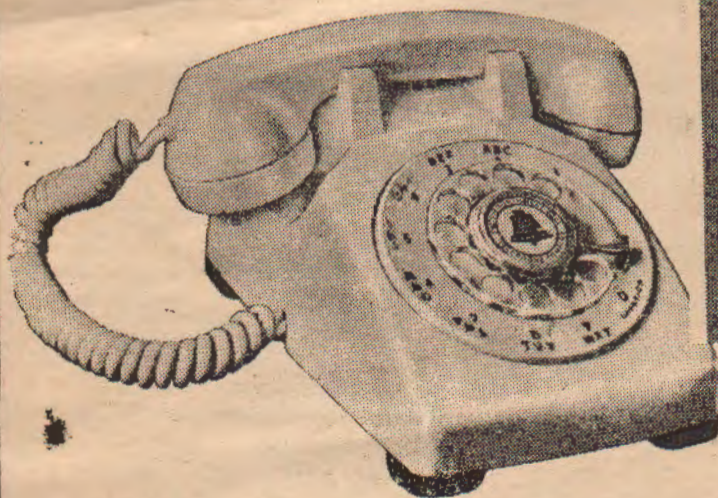
MOOSE MISSED

ed and paid for the damage.

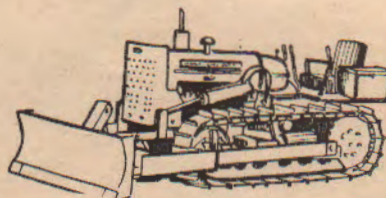

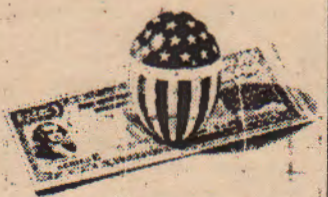
