FPO SAN FRANCISCO: Chugiak man, Richard D. Jon-rowe, Electrician's Mate rowe, Electrician's Mate Fireman, serving with the United States Navy aborad the Attack Troop Transport U.S.S. Navarro, last month received a citation for "Outstanding performance of duty as a member of the crew of a rescue boat assigned to remove survivors stricken British from British merchant ship.

In a letter to his parents, r. and Mrs. Roger Jonrowe of Old Chugiak, he told how his ship received the S.O.S. from the stricken ship while they themselves were running from Typhoon Emma. Although it meant returning six hours into the storm, the Nav-arro, being the ship in the area

which was closest responded. When they arrived they found when they arrived they found the freighter broached on a reef near the Phillipine Is-lands. At that time the waves were 15 to 30 feet high. The Navarro carries two big steel rescue boats on the aft part of the ship. Jonrowe was as-signed to the second boat, the M-2. The other boat, the M-1 was put in the water, but because the ramp had come undone it started t sink. He sald that the M-2 was then annched and after determining that the M-l would be able to recover from it's dif-

ficulties, they tried to reach the freighter.

Jonrowe reported that the seas were extremely rough, and they were able to procede at the rate of 30 yeards in a half hour. When they reached the ship, he said it was sitting on the bottom with 25 feet from the water line to the main deck, He said all waves were crossing the main deck. The M-2 was on the leeward side, and had taken about 10 of the 44 people aboard the ship into their boat when the first wave went over the bridge of the freighter and put about a foot of water in the boat. They continued to take the survivors aboard as waves continued to fill their boat. He said that they had approximately three feet of water in the boat and were "bailing like mad", when he looked up and saw a wave that was filling the stack of the freighter. He said "Ifig-ured this was it". He rem-membered that he removed his glasses with his right hand and hanging on with his left. "I was smashed flat with the weight, I thought it would never end." When that wave passed, there was 5 1/2 feet of wate. In the boat and they of wate. in the boat and they were within inches of sinking. The men started bail-ing, and one of the crew jumped off to save one of

In an article reprinted from the Houston Texas Chronicle, we read:

FIREMEN LET HOU WITHOUT 'TAG' BURN

HOUSE SPRINGS, Mo. (AP) Volunteer firemen from nearby High Ridge, Mo., watched the home of Mr. and Mrs. John Akers burn to the ground Monday because the family had not purchased a \$7 fire protection tage.

Fire Chief Julius R. Petry said the department's bylaws firmly state, "No tag, no service."

The area has no full-time fire fighters. Volunteer department funds are raised entirely through the sale of tags.

Petry said if firemen extinguished a blaze at one house which does not have a tag, other might be encouraged to stop buying protection.
Three trucks and about 10

volunteers responded to the Akers alarm, but when they saw the house did not bear a fire tag, the refused to put out the blaze and began wetting down a nearby house which

did have a tag.

Petry said he recalls two
other houses have been permitted to burn because owners did not but fire tags.

Now we do not recommend that the local Volunteers resort to anything that drastic to gain wider support from the people, but it does giv one something to think about



The M-l went ahead to rescue the remainder of the crew, while the M-2 returned to the Navarro with their load of survivors. By that time a second British freighter had arrived and dropped anchor near the Navarro. Jonrowe concluded by reporting that only one man had been lost

in the rescue operation.
38 of the survivors were put
aboard the second British freighter, and five were put in the sickbay of the Navarro. Jonrowe himself was ordered to the sickbay for a shot, and found to his joy that it was a shot of Scotch!

He mentioued that after the rescue was completed that the M-2 had two holes in the bottom. "I'm glad I didn't know this while we were in the water!" he said.






