

CHUGIAK BOY DROWNING VICTIM

FORMER MUSTANG TOURS EUROPE

IN BRUSSELS, ON TOUR: A former member of the Chugiak Mustang Varsity basketball team is currently touring the European continent with the Alaska Methodist University Vikings.

In coordination with the "People-to-People" Sports Committee, an organization started by former President of the United States Dwight D. Eisenhower to promote better understanding, the Vikings were invited to travel in five European countries and play exhibition basketball.

The former Mustang is Butch Alan Phillips, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Phillips of Eagle River. He was a graduate of Chugiak High in the class of 1966.

The team left Anchorage on March 24th, and were in Copenhagen on March 25th and 26th, in London on March 28th, 29th and 30th, in Paris from March 31st through April 3rd and this week April 4th, 5th and 6th are in Brussels. From there they will travel to Amsterdam on April 7th and 8th before returning to Anchorage.

The trip was financed through efforts of many students at AMU, and from donations from Scandinavian Airlines, Alaska Airlines, Sears Roebuck Co., J.C. Penney Co. Northern Commercial Co., Action Vending Co. John Stepp's Friendly Ford, Weaver Brothers Inc. Danish Consul (Bill Scott) Swedish Consul, (Elmer Rasmuson), and Norwegian Consul, (Robert Atwood). CHUGIAK MAY PLAY JV FOOTBALL

BIRCHWOOD: Chugiak High Principal Larry Graham said that there is a definite possibility that the Mustangs may play Junior Varsity football next fall.

Graham stated that Chugiak has joined the Cook Inlet Football league so that in the event funds for a Mustang team are approved, they would be able to participate next fall.

Graham estimated that it would take around \$4800 to outfit a team for the Mustangs.

He went on to explain that the JV League was composed mainly of sophomores and some juniors, and was mainly for the purpose of learning the game. Since only a very few of the Chugiak boys had ever played football, he felt that at least one year of JV practice would be necessary before going on into regular Varsity football.

East, West, Dimond and Elmendorf all have JV teams, and these are the ones the Mustangs would be playing.

Graham said that Chugiak has an excellent athletic field, with good grass cover, and this could be developed into a football gridiron with little trouble. He also said that there are several teachers at Chugiak that are qualified to coach football, and some good prospects for players among the students.

The final decision of whether the program will go is mainly dependent on approval of funds, Graham concluded, and this should be known sometime within the month.

In addition to his parents, he is survived by a brother, Kenneth Wayne age 22, who is with the U.S. Navy at Jacksonville Florida, a sister Patricia Gee of San Angelo Texas and a sister Denise of Peters Creek.

David attended the first grade at the Chugiak Elementary School. He was a member of St. Andrew's Catholic Church at Eagle River.

PALMER: A tragic drowning accident last Sunday afternoon took the life of a six year old Chugiak boy.

The victim, six year old David Lee Cates had been with his parents Mr. and Mrs. Aden Cates of Mt. Eklutna Drive in Peters Creek, while the latter were visiting with a friend Mrs. George Allen at her home on Niclason Lake eight miles northwest of Palmer.

The Allen's had been former neighbors of the Cates, and they had gone to see Mrs. Allen when they had learned that Mr. Allen was hospitalized with a heart attack.

According to the Alaska State Troopers, the boy had gone outside to play and when his parents missed him he had been gone approximately twenty minutes. His father went looking for the child, and found his tracks leading out onto the ice of the lake. The tracks ended at a patch of open water where a creek entered the lake. This was at approximately 6:20pm. The father notified the State Trooper in Palmer, but it was not until 7:10pm that the boy's body was recovered by the trooper. According to the report the body was in approximately ten feet of water. The State Trooper guessed that the boy had slipped and fallen into the open water.

ELECTION PETITIONS IN CIRCULATION

CHUGIAK: Petitions calling for a special election for the purpose of authorizing the Borough to provide tax supported fire services within Chugiak Service Area 8 are now being circulated.

Service area 8 is the one which has been served by the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company. The petitions call for a mill levy not to exceed one half mill during the period 1968 through 1970, and also to amend Ordinance 98, which designated the boundaries of Service District 8.

The amendment would authorize the election of three service area supervisors who are residents of the service area. They would be elected at the same election that the ordinance is submitted to the voters for approval and would be elected for terms of three years. These supervisors would serve without compensation, and would be charged with recommending

According to the State Troopers, one vehicle had crossed over into the lane and struck the other. The case is still being investigated.

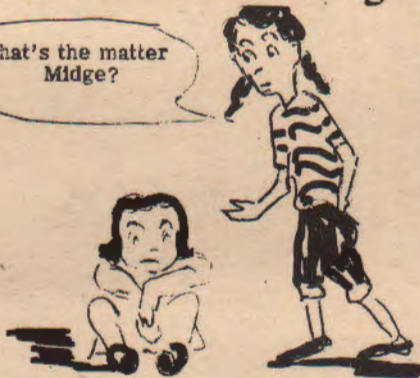
