### FIRE COMPANY SAVES GARAGE

BIRCHWOOD: Prompt response by the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company limited damage by fire to the residence of Mrs. Christa Burg of Birchwod Road.

The fire apparently had started at an outside wall of the garage last Friday night. A lean-to shed had been constructed against that wall, and hay and straw was stored there.

The only one at home at the time the fire broke out was Mrs. Burg's 16 year old son Richard. The boy immediately called the Fire Company, who responded

mediately called the Fire Company, who responded within minutes, and succeeded in extinguishing the fire with damage to only the wall and the roof of the building.

Mrs. Burg said that five of her dogs had been locked in the garage at the time of the fire. None of the animals appeared to be harmed. Mrs. Burg operated the Birchwood Kennels at that location.

Damage was estimated at \$4,000. The loss was covered by insurance.

Local Assemblyman Ed Willis stated that he voted in favor of the ammendment which would exclude the rural areas, but was the one opposing vote in the 10-1 final tally which passed the ammended ordinance.

He explained his opposition was to give time for the Borough Health Board to review the Ammended Ordinance. He said that a request had been received by the Assembly from the Health Board asking

from the Health Board asking that passage be delayed until they had an opportunity to review the new ordinance. Willis explained that the Assembly had given the Health Board the original Ordinance

### SCHOOL PLANS TO BE DRAWN

ANCHORAGE: The GAAB School Board, has approved a memorandum commissioning the architectual firm of Crittenden, Cassetta, Windows and Camon to prepare the plans for the new instructional materials center and vocational training department to be built at Chugiak High School. This is the firm which originally designed the school.

The board also commissioned the firm of Manley and Mayer to prepare plans and specifications for the six room addition to Birchwood Elementary School.

Local Assemblyman Ed Willis sald that both these projects should be ready to be put out for bid by next March, and hopefully the new additions would be ready for use by the start of the school year of 1969.

EAGLE RIVER: A plan to establish a sewer service area in Eagle Riveris being proposed, the Knik Arm Courier learned this week.

Glenn Briggs, an Eagle River business man, stated that during the past week, a house to house survey of the property owners within the area bounded by the Eagle River Loop road on the North, upper Grady Phillips subdivision on the East, Monte Road on the South and extending West to include the populated section of the Artillery Road was made to determine the property owners' interest in forming the sewer service area. Approximately 300 pieces of property were said to have been involved. According to Briggs, it appeared that 75% of the ownership of the area, with the exception of the Sunny Slopes subdivision, tentatively approved such a service area.

such a service area.

Eriggs pointed out that in 1964-65 a sewer study and plan was made for the Greater Anchorage Area by the engineering firm of Tryck, Nyman and Haynes, and Stephens and Thompson of Anchorage and Portland under a federal grant from the Department of Housing and Urban Development. The study was extended in 1965-66 to include the Greater Chugiak Area.

Briggs said that as far back as 1965, property owners in the vicinity of the Eagle River School and Shopping Center became award of an imminent need for removing the accumulating sewage from the area. He also said that with the approval of the Anchorage Borough Administration last April, five business owners of Eagle River engaged the engineering firm of Thiel and Renshaw to get the initial stages of the Eagle River portion of the Tryck and Nyman study under construction. This project was accepted by the Farmers Home Administration last in September, who requested a preliminary engineering report by October 25th.

Briggs reported that on the basis of the tentative expression by the above property owners, such a preliminary engineering report of the area outlined (excluding the Sunny Slopes Subdivision) is being prepared by Thiel and Renshaw for submission to the Farmers Home Administration.

Briggs explained that only rural areas with populations under 5000 people can qualify for programs under Farm Home Administration, Accepted programs under FHA

can be financed by up to a fifty percent grant and the balance on twenty year loans at three to four percent interest.

The system as proposed by Tryck and Nyman and approved by the Borough Administration and State Department of Health, is described by Briggs, as an areated lagoon or lagoons, located on the Military Reservation due west of the shopping center, and a trunk system capable of meeting the ultimage needs of the entire Eagle River ares. The boundaries of the initial Service Area would be expanded in the future as needs and demands require.

and demands require.

Briggs sald that he hoped a commitment from Farm Home Administration can be obtained by January. During the interim, he said, more specific information on total costs of the proposed project, more accurate estimates of the costs to the property owner and procedure for formally creating the service area will be made available to the community for public study and

discussion. Final decision on the formation of the sewer area will be made by the property owners at an election after all information has been made available to them.

Briggs said that he is also hopeful that the system could be in operation before winter of 1969.

He went on to say that Tryck and Nyman have developed a Master Plan in their sewer study for the ultimate needs of the Greater Chugiak Area, phased in as needed, by four trunk lines; Valley South Trunk line to serve the area south of Eagle River, and Valley North Trunk, to serve the area between Eagle River and Fire Lake with areated lagoon treatment facilities on the Military Reservation; the Old Chugiak and Peters Creek



Briggs said, "The people of our Greater Chugiak Area are going to determine by locality when they need to take advantage of the sewer study and Federal funds which hopefully will be available in the future".

Briggs concluded by saying that copies of the Eagle River nd Chugiak Area Sewage tudy are available in limited quantities to the general public.



FIRE COMPANY **GETS NEW** EQUIPMENT

CHUGIAK: New equipment, repairs to present vehicles, improvements to the Fire Hall..., all these were revealed in a report by the Board of Supervisors to the newly formed Chugiak Fire Ser-vice District this week, According to Bob Kallen-

berg, Chairman of the Board of Supervisors, the Chugial Voluneer Fire Company has fallen heir to some of the eqquipmnt, and has been able to purchase others at surplus prices.

Presented to the Fire Company, at no cost to the tax payers of this area was a Ford pumper-tanker, which had been the property of the Rabbit Creek Fire District.

This is the same model as the one the Chugiak Company now owns, and plans are to can-abalize it and make one good machine out of the two. Also

a new engine has been acquir-

ed for the big tanker, and this will be installed within a week.

The rescue department of the Fire Company will have doubled usefulness with the purchase of a surplus four wheel drive Dodge Power Wagon. This had been used as a military ambulance, and will be out "" d as a crash truck for use in highway accidents where victims may have to be extricated from wrecked cars, and will ac-company the fire trucks on calls. It will also be available for stand-by in the case that the present Cadillac ambulance is out of commission

or out on a call.

Kallenberg also stated that work is underway to insulate the Fire Hall at mile181/2 and prepare it for winter.

A surplus furnace has been purchased and will be install-ed in the building, and the ambulance shed will also be insulated, "This is being done at minimum expense," Kal-lenberg stated, "This was lenberg stated. "This was never meant to be more than a temporary building, and a new one will have to be built next year."

Kallenberg also pointed out that the Fire Company is in need of more volunteers. "Too few men are trying to do too much", he said. "We need more men, particularly some who would be available for call during the daytime."

He concluded by saying that

anyone interested in becoming a volunteer would be welcome to call him for additional information.
