CHUGIAK: The Chugiak Benenefit Association announced this week that beginning October 1st, they were once again assuming responsibility for the operation of the Eagle River Sanitary Fill, and that Anchorage Refuse Inc., would no longer have

Inc., would no longer have jurisdiction. Dale Briggs, President of CBA Board of Directors, said that for the past year Anchorage Refuse has been operating the dump for CBA and collecting dumping fees on a verbal agreement only. Briggs said that CBA had repeatedly tried to get Anchorage Refuse to enter into a written contract with them, but they (Anchor-age Refsue) had kept "stall-ing" for one reason or another. He said that CBA finally named October 1st as the deadline for signing the contract. When Anchorage Refuse still declined, the ag-reement was terminated.

Briggs said that CBA will now be responsible for the operation of th dump. Gene Ammon, of Eagle River, who had been acting as the Dump Master for Anchorage Refuse will continue in that capacity. Dump hours will re-main the same, and dump fees will be unchanged.

Briggs went on to say that another facility has been installed at the dump, namely a disposal system for cesspool pumpings. This was const-ructed to comply with stan-dards of the Borough Department of Health. CBA enter-ed into a contract with Clar-ence LaMay Sr. of Eagle River, and LeMay constructed the facility and has jurisdiction over it. Individuals wishing to use the sewage disposal pit must make their dealings with LeMay as it is a sep-erate facility from the fill.





PLEASE TURN IN MOOSE JAWS

Julius Reynolds, moose re-search biologist in Anchorage, requests that successful moose hunters turn in lower jaws from their moose to the Department f Fish and Game in Anchorige.

The Department uses the teeth for determining the age of the moose. If teeth from sufficient numbers of moose are collected, the Department can determine the effects of hunting on various moose herds within Alaska.

Hunters cooperating in this project will be notified of the age of his moose if he leaves his age of his mose in the reaves his name and address along with the date and location of kill and sex of the moose at the Fish and Game office. Moose aging will be done in mid-winter and hunt-

ers notified shortly thereafter. Some moose in the Matanus-ka and Lower Susitna Valleys

play was no good. East moved 51 yards to make the last points of the game in six plays. Lonie Edwards foiled the extra point attempt with an interception.





The ceremony will be held at 7:30pm in the National Guard Armory, 4902 Jewel Lake Road, Anchorage.

Physically located in the Anchorage National Guard Armory, the new Naval Reserve Training Facility will share the Armory's classroom and drill hall facilities. This type of a Training Fac-

This type of a Training Facility is required before a Surface Division can be activitated. The combination of Training Facility and Surface Division provides a maximum training program for Naval Reservists.

While the Anchorage Naval Reserve Training Facility will start operation with a staff of only two full-time, active duty Navy petty officers, Surface Division 17-1 will begin with about 12 officers and 20 enlisted Ready Reservists.

Prior Naval Reserve activity in Alaska was restricted to a very limited "Composite Company" program. Recent changes in Department of Defense reserve policies terminated this program on June 3rd.


