PETERS CREEK: The individual who broke into the liquor store at the Peters Creek Shopping Center, did it in a big way, early last Monday morning.

Steve Prokepuff, who is a tenant at one of the cabins at the rear of the store heard a loud crash at approximately 1:00am that morning. By the time he was able to get some clothing on and go out to investigate, all he saw was a pickup truck driving away, and the front of the liquor store caved in.

Since Walter Purcell, the proprietor of the store at the time was out of town, Prokepuff contacted one of the employees who summoned the State Police.

Upon his return, Purcell estimated that approximately \$125 dollars worth of liquor had been taken. Nothing in the grocery portion of the store had apparently been disturbed.

Purcell stated that he did not think that the driver had deliberately crashed his truck into the front of the building, but had been an opportunist enough to take advantage of the situation after accidentally skidding into the store.

State Police are investigating.

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HALLOWEEN CAN BE TRAGIC

Halloween is supposed to be a happy and joyful time for children and parents too, but all too often it can end in tragedy.

This is because of two special hazards related to the celebration of the Halloween festivities. First of all, it is the practice for children to wear all kinds of elaborate costumes. Secondly, it is still common practice, and very unfortunately so, to use lighted candles in real or imitation pumpkins. This combination of flimsy clothing which can be highly flammable, and the ready source of ignition provided by the burning jack-o-lanterns, has resulted in several tragic accidents.

Every effort should be made to discourage the use of lighted candles in Jack-O-Lanterns. It is well to remember that regardless of the

degree of flammability of clothing (or anything else for that matter), there is no possibility of fire without a source of ignition.

Parents should be cautioned regarding the possible high flammability of Halloween costumes. Probably the majority of manufactured Halloween costumes are now factory processed for flame resistance and should be reasonably safe for their intended use. However, these would almost invariably be treated with water soluble chemicals, which would be removed by any wetting or washing, and could gradually lose their effectiveness over a period of years even though they were never subject to washing.

names.

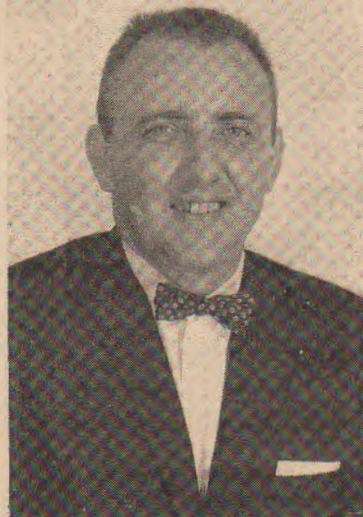
Following this, Mrs. Rode-

and close at 8:00pm.
In addition to the candidates for State offices, the U.S. Congress and the Presidency, voters will be asked to vote on eight bonding propositions, a judicial issue and a referendum.

Bond issues are, \$2,000,000 for Pioneer Home Construction; 2. \$11,200,000 for Highway construction; 3. \$1,200,000 for Hospital Construction; 4. \$8,800,000 for Airport construction; 5. \$10,000,000 for School Construction; 6. \$8,500,000 for University construction; 7. \$18,000,000 for Ferry construction; 8. \$3,000,000 for Fish Hatchery construction.

On the Judicial issue, the voters will be asked whether Justice Jay A. Rabinowitz shall be retained.

The referendum concerns the pre-registration of voter in the State of Alaska.

The book is published by the Chugiak Ladies Club, who use the proceeds to offer a college scholarship to a graduate from Chugiak High School each year.

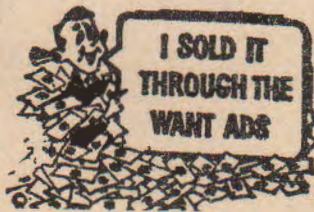
OMICRONS HAVE HALLOWEEN FETE

TAX DEADLINE FOR EMPLOYERS

Employers have an important tax deadline on Oct. 31, 1968, according to Lewis J. Conrad, district director of Internal Revenue Service in Alaska.

This is the due date for reporting and paying both withheld income and social security taxes for the quarter ending Sept. 30, 1968.

Employers should report these taxes on the preaddressed Form 941 furnished them. Employers have until Nov. 10, 1968, to file their return provided that their quarterly tax liability has been fully and timely paid to the Federal Reserve Bank or authorized commercial bank.

The completed Form 941 and any tax payment due should be mailed to "Internal Revenue Service, 1160 W. 12th South Ogden, Utah 84405." Further information can be obtained by employers by writing for "Employer's Tax Guide," Publication No. 15. Requests should be mailed to District Director, Internal Revenue Service in Anchorage, Alaska.

HISTORICAL SOCIETY TO MEET

"Save the Past and Serve the Present" will be the theme of the State Historical Society annual meeting on Nov. 15, 16, 17. The meetings will be held in the new Fine Arts Museum in Anchorage and a variety of topics will be discussed in sessions to be held on Saturday.

These will include such topics as Alaska's Public Records and Private Papers, Preservation of Alaska's Historic Sites, Exhibiting Museum Objects, and Discovering Alaskan Libraries. For the people who are interested in the more active history fields, one section will talk about publishing Alaskan history and another the oral interpretation through pageant and drama.

The annual banquet will hear a talk by the renowned historian, Dr. Earl Pomeroy, of the University of Oregon, whose work on the Pacific Slope History makes him unusually well qualified for this task.

Registration for the meetings will be on Friday afternoon, Nov. 15, at the Fine Arts Museum.

U OF A PROF. TOURING STATE

President William R. Wood of the University of Alaska is visiting Anchorage and five southeastern cities this week to explain the university's upcoming \$8.5-million bond proposition.

From Monday through tomorrow, Jr. Wood was to speak in Ketchikan, Wrangell, Petersburg, Juneau, Sitka and Anchorage.

The university bond proposition, which will be on the ballot in the Nov. 5 general election, calls for funds to provide improvements to UA fire protection, a general classroom and office building, a dining complex, and a dormitory.

The improvements and facilities would serve the university's main campus here where this year's fall enrollment climbed to a record 2,140 students, up 21.5 per cent from the previous year. UA's main campus enrollment is increasing at more than three times the average national rate.

More than 75 per cent of the students here are Alaska residents.

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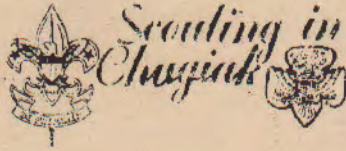

NOV. 1 IS THE DEADLINE FOR ABSENTEES

ANCHORAGE: Friday, November 1st, is the deadline for applying by mail for absentee ballots.

Applications for absentee ballots must be mailed in writing to the Secretary of State, Pouch AA, Juneau Alaska, 99801, and be postmarked not later than November 1st.

The application must state that the writer is a qualified voter in the State of Alaska, and will be absent from his or her precinct on election day.

In the case of husband and wife, both must sign the application.

Persons who are unable to apply for absentee ballots before the November 1st deadline may vote absentee in person any day up to and including Saturday, November 2nd, and Monday, November 4th at the District Recorder's office at 941 Fifth Avenue in Anchorage.

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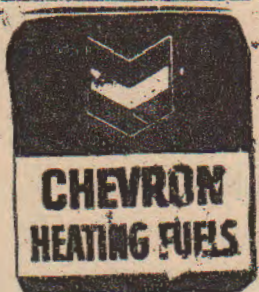

OPEN LETTER:

Calls received following publication of "Letter to the Editor" last week explaining Chugiak Benefit Association's (CBA) sanitary fill operation concerned two questions. One, why isn't the sanitary Borough, and two, how come a privately operated sewage disposal pit on the land fill property.

To my knowledge the Borough has never offered to assume responsibility of operation of the Eagle River land fill but in fact has strongly indicated such a takeover would not be considered except under boroughwide powers.

As has been pointed out many times in this media our sanitary fill can be maintained at the least possible cost as a community controlled facility.

It is essential to the welfare of the community that a sewage disposal pit be available locally pending installation of modern sewer system in the area.

To keep his business in operation the owner of the Eagle River Laundrimat operated a pit on private land with approval of the Borough Health Department until last

spring when it was condemned by the Department.

An area near the land fill site was approved for use as a temporary pit operation by the Department of Health, the Bureau of Land Management and CBA. Under a lease agreement with CBA, the owner of the Laundrimat assumes all costs of constructing and of maintenance of the pit in accordance with Health Department requirements, and pays to CBA an annual fee for its use.

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RETURN OF HARVEST TICKETS ASKED

Each year at this time, Fish and Game department Biologists responsible for research and management of Dall sheep, anxiously await the return of all harvest report cards (harvest tickets) so that the results of the recent sheep hunting season can be analyzed. These analyses rely heavily on the use of computers.

Regulations require that harvest report cards be filled out and mailed within 15 days if the hunter kills a sheep, or within 30 days after close of season if he does not hunt, or hunted but was unsuccessful. The 30 days from the close of season is up on October 20, 1968, and those of you who still have harvest tickets in wallets, shirt pockets, and dresser drawers please fill in the requested information and put them in the mail now. An expensive system of mailing reminder letters to each individual who does not send in his harvest report could be avoided if all hunters would remember to get their harvest reports in the mail.

The department provided a one-page summary of last year's harvest results to each hunter who picked up a harvest ticket. They are still available on request from the Anchorage Game Division office. This summary provides information hunters find useful in planning their hunts since it indicates the distribution of hunting pressure,

average size of sheep taken in various mountain ranges, average length of time required to bag a ram in various mountain ranges, etc. A summary of the '68 season will be provided next year's hunters also.

Successful moose hunters and those who don't intend to hunt again are also reminded to send in their tickets now. Caribou harvest tickets are valid until March 31, 1969. However, all hunters who have killed 3 caribou must return their harvest reports within 15 days after the last animal is taken.

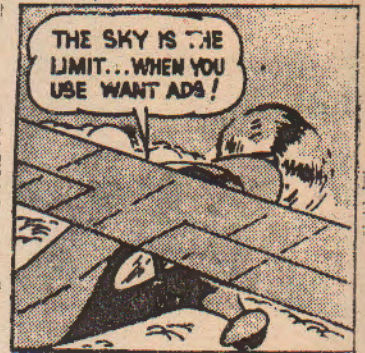

CORDOVA BRIDGE CONSTRUCTION TOLD OF

CORDOVA — Construction of a new highway bridge across the Copper River at Chitina— which will open up hundreds of miles of prime mining and recreation country, has been scheduled for a definite start next spring. Cosby Steen, State Commissioner of highways, said that bids will also be called for this winter for further construction work on the road from Chitina north. Lack of a bridge at Chitina is the main bottleneck to connecting up nearly a hundred miles of roadway along the route of the old Copper River and North-western Railroad from Chitina into McCarthy and Kennecott and out to various creeks in the area. The new highway link is expected to be a spur for possible growth of mining activity in the area. There are several small mining companies present yactive there developing prospects, but it is not feasible to go into production until a road is available for hauling out the mined ore.
