The original ordinance treated garbage burning as a health hazard, he stated. The ammended ordinance takes it out of the health area and places it as a Fire District problem. "I feel that the proper place for this matter is to classify it as a nuisance and to relegate it to Zoning, where it can be administered on a permissive basis by those

willis said that he also feels that the definition of "gar-bage" should be changed. He said that he thinks of garbage as household wastes, subject to decomposition. The present ordinance classifies everything, from paper to plas-tic, metal and wood as garb-

age. "I have had more people contact me on this ordinance than on any other matter that has come up before the As-sembly," Willis said. "I hope that some of you people will come down to the hearing and make your views and suggestions known. This is the last opportunity we will have to be heard on the sub ject."

The Loopers are currently conducting a membership drive, and any ladies living in the Birchwood area are invited to attend the meeting.



The bride was Phyllis Stewart of Eagle River, who ex-changed vows with Floyd Smith, of Anchorage.




