

PHONES OUT IN WIDESPREAD AREA

PUBLIC HEARS ABOUT SEWERS

EAGLE RIVER: A public meeting was held at the Eagle River School at 8:00pm on November 7th to discuss the proposed Eagle River Sanitary Sewer System.

Approximately 75 interested local residents were in attendance. Among those present from the Borough were Eud Saylor, Administrative Assistant to the Borough Chairman, Mr. Bob Borriss, Sewer Director, Mr. Cliff Judkins, Sanitarian and Mr. Daryl Bohman, Farm Home Administration, Mr. Dan Renshaw, Consulting Engineer, Mr. Stan Nickerson, representing the Eagle River Businessmen's Group, and Borough Assemblyman Ed Willis.

A presentation was made by Mr. Nickerson and Mr. Renshaw at which time Mr. Nickerson pointed out that while originally sanitary sewer service was sought for the Eagle River business area only, it became apparent that many residents living in close proximity desired to be included.

In discussion the need for such a facility, Mr. Judkins had submitted information from the Borough Health Department which indicated that 9 out of 24 well water samples taken in the Eagle River area during a period between July 1 and December 31, 1965 were contaminated as indicated by the presence of coliform organisms. During the period from January 1 to October 1, 1966, coliform organisms were noted in 9 out of 31 samples. He felt that this was apparent that continuing development in this area will increase the occurrence of contaminated wells and in-operative sewage disposal systems.

The possibility of starting the sewer program locally through private efforts, later to be acquired for operation by the Borough through an improvement district, as opposed to the concept of the Borough implementing the program from the beginning was discussed by Mr. Morris.

He stated that the present approach through the Farm Home Administration offers the advantages of an agency which is readily available to assist in funding and at lower interest rates. A Borough program would involve a bond election areawide at a later date, with risks of defeat at the polls, he pointed out; and should it pass, the bonds would

CHUGIAK: A major phone outage, which affected the entire Peters Creek Area, as well as phones north of F&L Service in Birchwood took place on Sunday around noon.

The outage was caused when a contractor who was operating a bulldozer and clearing right of way for the Matanuska Electric Association sliced through the buried cable.

The break was located directly behind the Brittain residence on the Eklutna Power right of way.

James Ekstedt, of the Matanuska Telephone Association stated that repair crews went to work immediately, and with the help of a light plant and heater loaned by Fire Lake Service, were able to work around the clock and get the phones back into service by Monday night.

Ekstedt said that the repair would be a permanent one and the cable re-buried.

(Editors note:) Approximately one hour after the conversation with Ekstedt the phone at the Knik Arm Courier went out of order, and as of press time was still not working. It is therefore not possible at this time to learn whether this outage has any connection with the cut cable or was the result of some other cause.)

be sold at higher interest rates dictated by present and anticipated market conditions. In any case, he stated the public interest would be fully protected.

Mr. Renshaw, Consulting Engineer, stated that consolidated answers covering the proposed service area will be submitted to F.H.A. as soon as possible. The result of these submittals will be a project feasibility evaluation final desicion of F.H.A. as to whether or not to proceed with the project.

Assemblyman Willis announced that when F.H.A. makes their final decision if favorable, and the amount of federal assistance becomes known and cost estimates can more accurately be prorated on a square foot basis to the individual property owner within the proposed sewer district boundaries, another public meeting will be announced.

A map of the proposed district was available for public inspection and public.

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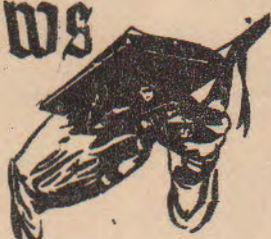

FIRE CO. TO RECRUIT WOMEN

CHUGIAK: The Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company has decided on a unique way to solve the problem of not enough volunteer firemen, particularly during the daytime.

Taking the example of the Rabbit Creek Volunteer Fire Company, Chugiak has decided to recruit women as volunteer firefighters.

This has been very successful at Rabbit Creek, with the ladies doing an excellent job of answering the calls, handling the pumps and driving the equipment.

The Fire Marshall's office would set up a training class for the women, and they would be instructed in all the aspects of fire fighting.

Robert Kallenburg, Chairman of the local Board of Supervisors for the local Service District, pointed out that even though the people of this area voted for tax-supported fire protection, the cost can only be kept to 1/2 mill if a Volunteer Fire Company is active. He said that it would cost \$14,000 a year to pay only one professional fireman for fulltime duty. At 1/2 mill the area tax base brings in only \$3500 per year to the Service

District. It is only if this money is spent on material items, and the labor voluntary that the tax can be kept at 1/2 mill.

Kallenburg said that while men volunteers are available at night, most work out of the community during the day, and the logical solution was to recruit women. He said that these would not be Fire Company Auziliaries, but full-fledged members of the Fire Company.

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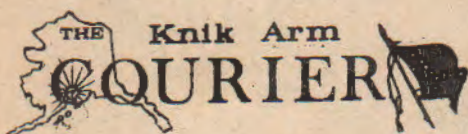

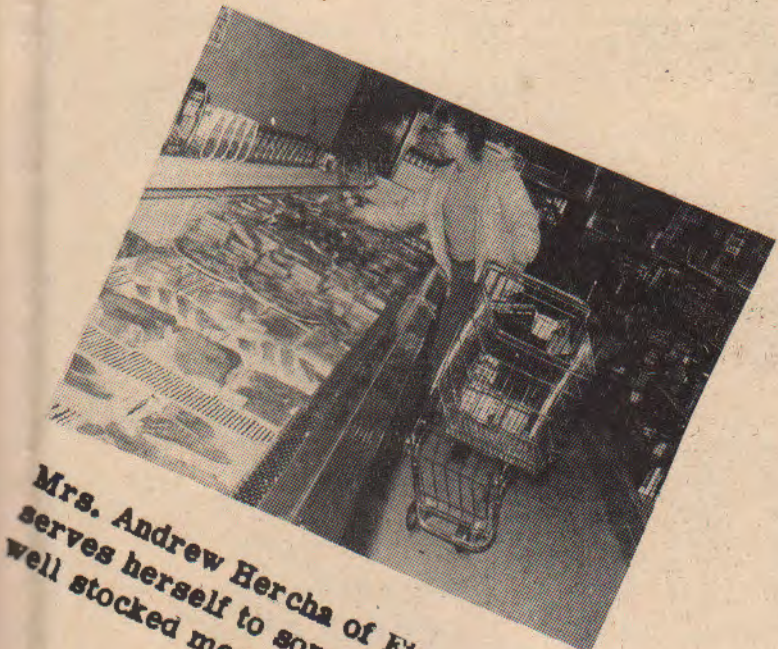

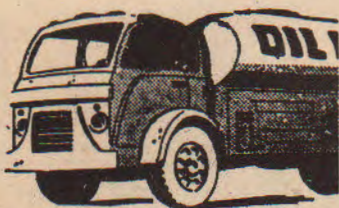
Free coffee and cookies, as well as demonstrations of food products are planned for the three day event.
