



BIRCHWOOD MAN FOUND DEAD

BIRCHWOOD: A Birchwood man was found dead in his trailer home on Friday, November 15th, the victim of an apparent heart attack.

Herman Albert Weber, who lived alone on Birchwood Loop road had apparently been dead for some hours when his body was discovered by his son-in-law, Jack R. Hill of Anchorage.

Weber, who up until the time of his death had been employed as a custodian at the Chugiak Elementary School had been a 23 year resident of Alaska. He was born on October 29th, 1908, in Litchfield Ill. He is survived by a son, Harold of Anchorage, two daughters, Mrs. Jack Hill of Anchorage and Mrs. Joseph Crusoe of Miami Florida, a sister, Miss Emma Weber of St. Louis Mo. and a brother, Edward of Mexico Mo.

Funeral services were held today, Wednesday, November 20th at the Evergreen Memorial Chapel in Anchorage with Rev. Pat McMahon of the Church of Christ officiating. Burial was at the Moose Garden at Anchorage Memorial Park, with graveside ceremonies conducted by the Loyal Order of Moose, Anchorage Lodge 1534.

PRE-SCHOOL HEARING CLINIC SCHEDULED

CHUGIAK: What is hoped will be the first annual hearing testing clinic for four year olds has been scheduled for Monday and Tuesday, November 25th and 26th, at the Chugiak Community Center in the basement of the Chugiak Methodist Church at mile 18 Glenn Highway.

This will be a part of a program sponsored jointly by the Alaska Crippled Children's Association, and the GAAB Department of Health.

The ACCA is hoping that these tests will help uncover previously undetected impairment of hearing in pre-schoolers, and prevent problems which would result in school as a result of this.

The tests will be conducted by Dr. Helen Blewett of Alaska Methodist University, assisted by volunteers from the local Chapter of ACCA.

The testing will be done with the use of a Vasc Hearing Tester, a machine designed for children of the four year old level.

PUBLIC HEARING ON LANDS CALLED

ANCHORAGE: A formal public hearing, as required by PL-607 (the classification and multiple use act) is scheduled by the Bureau of Land Management concerning the proposed multiple use classifications of nearly 23 million acres in the Copper River Basin. This announcement was made by Burt Silcock, State Director for the BLM in Alaska.

The hearing will be conducted by Jim Scott, Anchorage District Manager, and held November 29, 1968 at 2:00pm in the Glenallen High School in Glennallen.

Anyone who is interested in this proposed classification may submit comments at the scheduled hearing. Comments may be in person or written, and all comments will be entered into the record, which will remain open until December 13, 1968.

People who are unable to attend the hearing and desiring to comment on this pro-

FIRST PHASE OF ROAD WORK NEAR COMPLETE

CHUGIAK: The first phase of construction of the road which will by-pass the present Glenn Highway between Eagle River and Peters Creek will be completed within two weeks, according to John Stoddard, Project Engineer for the Department of Highways.

The initial phase has consisted of clearing trees and brush, the removal of topsoil and the removal of some structures which were to be moved by the contractor.

Stoddard said that the first priority when construction begins next spring will be an access road from the Glenn Highway at mile 21 to the point where the new highway will meet the present Birchwood Road.

This point would be 150 West of the Eklutna Powerline Crossing on Birchwood Road. When this is completed the section of road which now is used between that point and the present entrance to Birchwood Loop will be abandoned.

Also high on priority will be the new bridge which will cross Peters Creek. This bridge will be 41 feet 4 inches in width, 168 feet long, and will have a deck height of 24 feet above the surface of the creek. A cut of 44 feet at the point where the former Birchwood Dump was located will be made to bring the level of the new road to the above bridge specifications.

Three access roads from the present Glenn Highway to the new road are planned; one at the Mile 21 Birchwood Loop entrance, one at the Mile 17 Birchwood Loop entrance and the third at a point South of Artillery Road in Eagle River. Other access roads from residential sections along the new highway are also planned.

Stoddard said that although the completion date for the project is in 1970, the contractor has hopes of finishing by the fall of 1969.

JEEP DRIVER INVOLVED IN ACCIDENT

OLD CHUGIAK: The driver of a military jeep was cited for basic speed when he lost control of his vehicle and skidded into another car at Mile 19 on November 10th.

Ronald Terry Linville, of Ft. Richardson had gotten the wheel of his jeep off on the shoulder of the road, and in attempting to pull back onto the pavement, overcontrolled and swerved to far to the left striking a 1961 Ford Station Wagon driven by Elmer Lubner of Elmeudorf.

Damage to the jeep was estimated at \$150, to the Ford, \$500. There were no injuries.

WITNESSES SEE PROGRESS

ANCHORAGE: Progress and growth are well known factors in Alaska. Last week's convention of Jehovah's Witnesses at Each Anchorage High School auditorium bore out this fact.

A peak attendance of 872 met to receive advanced training in Bible teaching activity at the semi-annual circuit convention of the Witnesses. This sizable group contrasts with about 70 delegates who met in 1951 at one of the Witnesses' first Alaskan assemblies conducted in the basement of the then new Carpenter's Hall at Fourth and Denali.

Saturday night, William C. Bower who directs the Chugiak group of Witnesses, released figures showing that in Alaska Circuit Number 1 there are 500 active ministers regularly engaged in Bible preaching work. South-eastern has over 200 active Witnesses. Bower said that every feature of activity showed increases from 12% to 23%. There were no decreases. As a whole, he pointed out, Alaska shows an attendance of 100% to 119% at the various meetings of the Witnesses in their local congregations. James A. Miller, branch manager for the Witnesses, commended the delegates for their good work and encouraged them to continue to reach out to give every person in the state the opportunity to study and learn the Bible.

Saturday afternoon 21 newly dedicated Witnesses were baptized.

Convention officials noted that the internationally known Watchtower magazine, now published in 72 languages, has a circulation of 5,450,000.

The companion magazine, "Awake" published in 26 languages, has a circulation of 5,200,000.

The next Witness convention is scheduled for Fairbanks in the spring.

TWO HURT IN EAGLE RIVER ACCIDENT

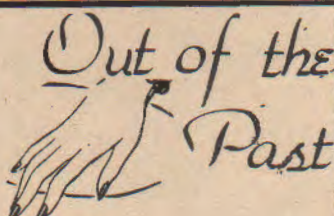
EAGLE RIVER: Two local men were injured when their cars collided on the Eagle River Road, November 7th.

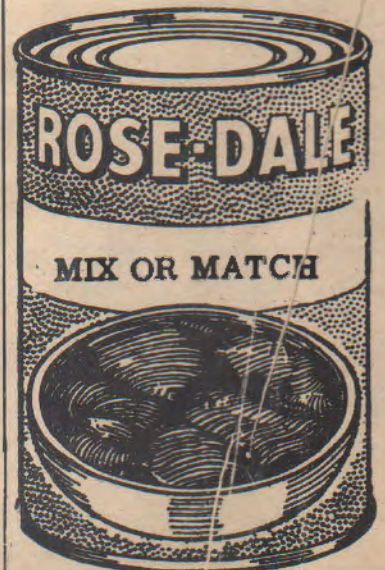
