HEAD START BUS DAMAGED IN COLLISION

OLD CHUGIAK: A School Bus, which was transporting children to the local Head Start program was involved in a collision at mile 18 last Wednesday.

The driver of the 1961 Plymouth station wagon which has been serving as the bus, Mrs. Frances Lavone Jones had been about to turn off the Glenn Highway at mile 18.

According to the Alaska State Troopers, instead of immediately executing the turn, she had stopped on the highway.

A car which had been following behind her, at 1966 International pick-up, driven by Harry A. Mackey of Peters Creek, was unable to stop in time, and crashed into the rear of the Jones vehicle.

Some of the children in the bus sustained minor cuts and bruises and were taken to the Eagle River office of Dr. Green for treatment.

Those injured were; Elizabeth MacAlpin of Aurora Drive in Birchwood, Violet Sease, of Birchwood Road and Joyce Leonard of Mt. Eklutna Drive in Peters Creek.

Damage to the station wagon was estimated at \$500. The Mackey truck was also damaged an estimated \$500. No citations were given.

GIRL HURT IN GYM CLASS

BIRCHWOOD: A seventh grade girl sustained a back injury while attempting to execute a hand stand in the Physical Education class at the Birchwood School last week.

Grace Samuelson, of Peters Creek was taken to the ANS Hospital by the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company Ambulance following the fall.

Original fears that the girl might have suffered a broken back proved to be untrue, according to Mrs. Waneeta Smith, ambulance attendant. The injury appeared at worst to be a bad sprain.

OMICRONS SUPPORT HOPE COTTAGES

ANCHORAGE: Last Sunday, November 24, the Omicron Chapter of Beta Sigma Phi sorority made a contribution of a check and a collection of clothing, linens, and miscellaneous articles to Mrs. Nancy Stewart, director of Hope Cottages, a non-profit, privately operated institution which provides a home atmosphere for the care of the handicapped and retarded children of the state.

The local chapter had selected the providing of assistance to Hope Cottages as this year's service project.

The children are placed at Hope cottages by the Department of Public Welfare, the Bureau of Indian Affairs and by parents with a doctor's referral.

Mrs. Stewart felt that there has been inadequate public facilities in Alaska to care for all these children, and many had to be sent to various institutions in the Lower 48.

There are presently in the Anchorage area two cottages which are caring for seventeen children. Mrs. Stewart's goal is to care for as many Alaskans as possible locally rather than have them sent to other states. She hopes to

ALASKAN PRINCESS SOUGHT

WASHINGTON DC: The Alaska State Society welcomes all Alaskan girls to submit their application for the selection of the 1969 "Alaska Princess" for the Annual Cherry Blossom Festival to be held in Washington, D.C., on March 30th through April 6th.

A principal and two alternates will be selected through a drawing process. The girls must be available in Washington from March 30th through April 6th, 1969, or at least the successful entry should be.

The lucky girl will be invited to all the festival affairs and will be provided with a military escort. One of the 50 princesses will be chosen Cherry Blossom Queen.

The princess from Alaska must be a high school graduate by April 30th, 1969, 19 years of age or have completed 3/4 of one year of college and must not be older than 25 years of age. She must be single, not engaged to be married, nor ever have been married. Alaska must

be her official domicile.

The expenses for the princess' travel to and from Alaska, her stay in Washington, D.C., and her clothes must be borne by the Princess or her parents. 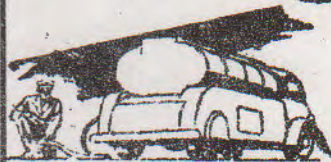

WOMAN HURT IN THREE CAR CRASH

BOTH DRIVERS CITED IN REAR COLLISION

FACTS FOR FATHER ABOUT FEVER

JUNEAU: "Facts for Fathers About Fever" is the title of a new brochure based on a concept of J. Scott McDonald, Commissioner of Health and Welfare, and developed and produced by Mrs. Mildred Hayes, Mental Retardation Coordinator, Mrs. Ruth D. Anderson, Visual Information Specialist, and Dr. Donald K. Freedman, M.D., Director, Division of Public Health, all of the Alaska Department of Health and Welfare.

The leaflet points out the dangers of fever in small children and infants. Prolonged fever may cause brain damage. Copies are available from state public health nurses and health centers. Mental retardation, speech defects or loss of physical functions can result from fever but alert parents may avert tragedy by applying basic knowledge of fever.

Maurice Flagg, Director of Information Services, President's Committee on Mental Retardation, Washington D.C. has commended "Facts for Fathers About Fever."

The pamphlet was produced in part by a Mental Retardation Planning grant, awarded by the Public Health Service, Department of Health and Welfare.

NONE CITED IN REAR END SMASH

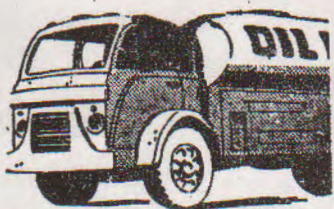
OLD CHUGIAK: There were no citations issued in a rear end collision which took place on November 23rd at mile 17 on the Glenn Highway.
