CHUGIAK: Chugiak High's hopes for a successful basketball season received a staggering blow last Saturday night with the injury of their 6 foot seven inch Center Jim Kohring.

Kohring apparently suffered a dislocated finger during the last minutes of the second quarter in the game against East Anchorage.

Chugiak basketball coach Don Sanders said that Kohring was attempting to pass the ball between two East players when he appeared to have caught his finger on one of the other boy's jerseys and bent it back. Kohring was rushed to the hospital where Sanders said, minor surgery was required to correct the dislocation. The coach feared that it would be at least six weeks before Kohring would be able to play again.

Sanders said that he is considering Vince Coan and Ken Trotter to replace Kohring as Center while the latter is out of the game.

This weekend the Mustangs play the Seard Seahawks. The Friday game to be played in Seward and the Saturday night game here in Chugiak.

No admission will be charged.

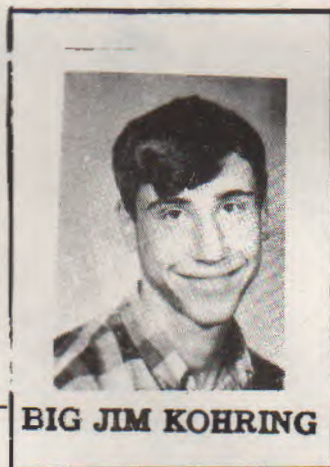
PETERS CREEK FAMILY IN WRECK

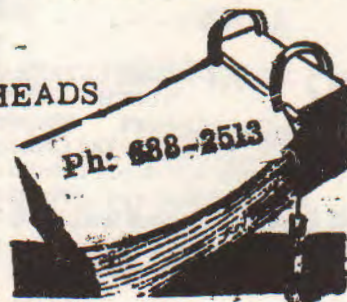

MUSTANGS BEAT FACULTY

Chugiak High Mustangs played their first pre-season basketball game against the CHS faculty on November 27.

GUN LAW EFFECTIVE NEXT MONDAY

ANCHORAGE: Sales of guns and ammunition will be controlled under the new Federal gun law which takes effect December 16th.

Lewis J. Conrad, District Director of Internal Revenue for Alaska said IRS is preparing material to help gun dealers, gun buyers and collectors with the new Gun Control Act which was enacted by Congress in October.

Mr. Conrad said the new law should not place any reasonable restrictions on reasonable restrictions on the purchase or ownership of ordinary guns used for hunting, target shooting or other lawful purposes.

Persons under 21 will be prohibited from purchasing pistols, revolvers, and ammunition for such weapons and persons under 18 will not be permitted to purchase any firearms or ammunition. permitted to out-of-state residents, Mr. Conrad, said, although a person from an adjoining state can buy a rifle or shotgun by complying with certain provisions of the new Act. Sales to residents of state will be prohibited if possession of the firearm is not allowed by local ordinance.

Summaries of pertinent local laws are being compiled in a booklet to be mailed by IRS to Federally licensed gun dealers. The booklet "Ordinances Firearms" should be in the hands of dealers before December 16th, to enable them to check on the gun laws of a locality before selling a gun.

HISTORICAL NEWSPAPERS DONATED

JUNEAU: A valuable file of the Juneau newspaper "Alaska News", 1893-1897, was donated to the Alaska Historical Library by Felix and Gordon Grey.

The "Alaska News", a weekly newspaper, took over the printing press of the "Alaska Journal" and operated until 1897 when it merged into the "Alaska Miner", according to Phyllis Nottmahan, librarian for the Alaska Historical Library.

Among the material donated is an album of some photographs taken by Doobs in early 1900. A ledger from the Levy Cohen store at Dena 1881-1901 was also placed in the archives.

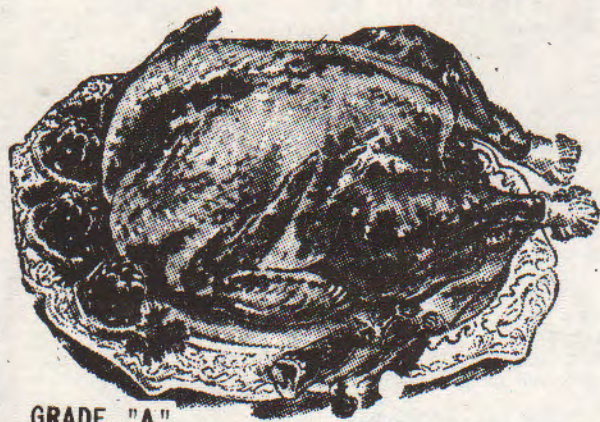
