CHUGIAK MAN PICKED FOR COMMITTEE

ANCHORAGE: Robert Kallenberg, of Old Chugiak was named as a member of the Anchorage Area Fish and Game Advisory Committee at a meeting of that group last Wednesday.

Kallenberg, who is a long time resident of Alaska was at one time a member of the Territorial Game Commission. He is presently a science teacher at Chugiak High School. He is also a member of the Board of the Sportsman's Game Preservation Association.

Kallenberg's appointment brings to three the number of Chugiak Area residents serving on the Committee. Ed Bellringer, of Peters Creek, Secretary of the Organization, represents the military, and Mike Alex of Eklutna represents the native interests.

FRANK CAHILL NAMED CANDIDATE

CHUGIAK: Frank Cahill, a senior at Chugiak High School has been named by the Chugiak Ladies Club as their candidate for the Mildred Herman Scholarship.

This scholarship, in the amount of \$250, is offered each year by the Alaska Federation of Women's Clubs to a candidate nominated by one of the affiliate organization.

Each application is judged along with applications submitted by each of the twelve affiliate clubs, and the one deemed by the judges to be the most outstanding is awarded the scholarship.

The winner will be announced at the B-annual convention to be held in Anchorage the third week in May.

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CHUGIAK: Robert Kallenberg, Chairman of the Committee which has been circulating petitions asking that a Fire District be established in the Area served by the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company, reports that the petitions have been gathered up, and have presented to the Borough Chairman.

Kallenberg said that a few copies of the petition are still out, but those turned in represented 156 signatures. The Borough Chairman felt that these expressed sufficient interest to justify calling for a special election.

The petitions will be presented to the Borough Assembly at the April 16th meeting, and it will be asked that the petitions calling for the Fire District, and the amendments listed therein be put before the voters of the area for their acceptance.

Kallenberg urged that any interested residents of this area attend the meeting. This is held at the school administration building on Fireweed Lane in Anchorage.

WHO WAS DRIVING

FIRE LAKE: The State Troopers were unable to issue a citation in a rear end collision last week, as no one was able to agree who was driving one of the vehicles involved.

Both cars in question were southbound on the Glenn Highway, when a 1962 Volvo sedan, driven by Jesse Wooten Jr. of Eagle River slowed down to turn into Lower Fire Lake Road.

The rear car, owned by Gracie Karels of Anchorage was unable to stop in time and struck the Volvo in the rear inflicting \$400 damage.

The police were unable to learn whether the owner of the car or her passenger Ella B. Ede, also of Anchorage was driving. Wooten claimed that one of the women was the driver, while they insisted that it was the other.

None of the persons involved were injured.

NAMES STUDENTS**

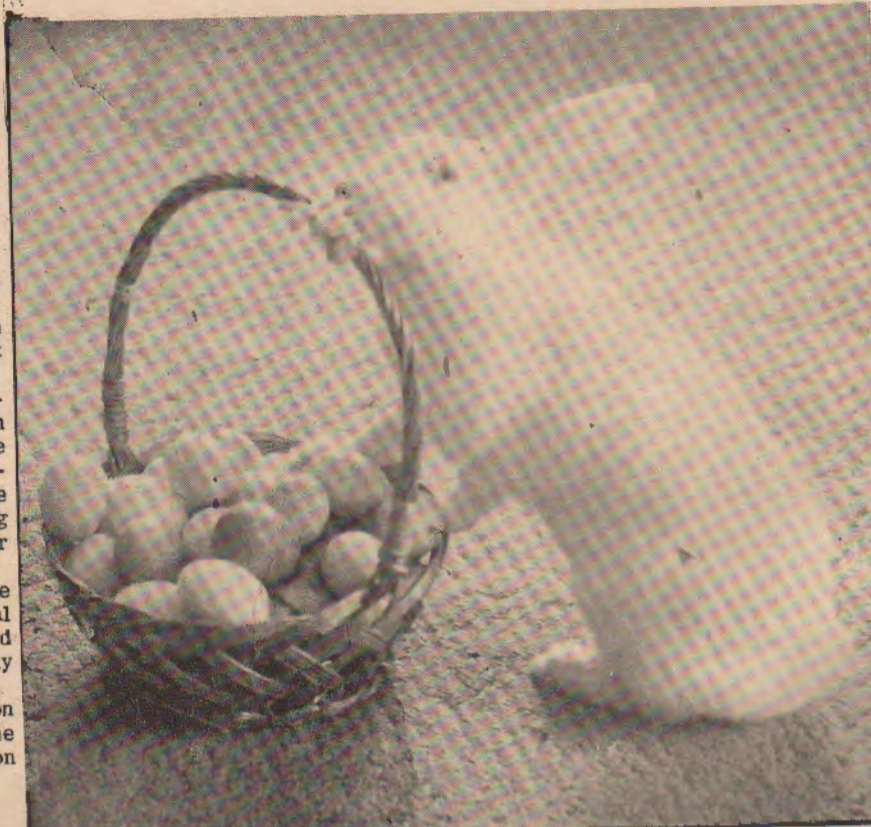

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LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

OPEN LETTER:

Are the Greater Chuglak Area residents going to be provided an opportunity to discuss at a local public hearing the proposed Greater Anchorage Borough budget before final approval by the Borough Assembly?

At the joint meeting of the Assembly and School Board held Monday night the Assembly approved a 1968-69 school program cost Borough property owners \$12,640,000, an increase of \$1,530,000 or 12% over the 1967-68 program. With costs fixed by the new programs included in this budget the Borough Assessment and Collection Department warns taxpayers that they can look forward to similar or greater tax increases each succeeding year for the

foreseeable future -- coming from property tax. The budget for general government operation will be reviewed and considered by the Assembly Wednesday, April 10th with the final action on the total 1968-69 mill rate to be taken by April 16th. An increase in the budget for general government is proposed including an increase of \$13,200.00 in salaries of Assemblymen approved by the Assembly.

It was known a month ago that such a boost in tax would be required. We haven't the local tax payer been given a chance long ago to discuss in local forum the various programs and costs attached thereto of the 1968-69 school and general borough budgets?

MRS. LAMAY OUT OF HOSPITAL

EAGLE RIVER: Word has been received that Mrs. Clarence LaMay Sr. who was recently hospitalized with a heart attack has been released.

Mrs. LaMay is presently recovering at her home in Eagle River.

PATRICIA MAY WALK SOMEDAY

ANCHORAGE: Doctors call it "congenital pseudoarthrosis of the tibia", but to three year old Patricia Beavers it's a crooked leg which makes walking nearly impossible.

Hopes are high at Alaska Native Medical Center, now, however, that meticulous bone graft surgery performed on Patricia will alleviate the rare condition for which there is no known cure.

Using a new technic developed in the Netherlands, U.S. Public Health orthopedic surgeons in Anchorage took little plates of bone from Patricia's mother's leg and also some from the child's own hip. These, varying in length from .2 to 6 centimeters, were placed about a metal rod to shape a strong support in the shin area of the child's leg. Because growth occurs at top and bottom of a bone, this is a feasible strengthening method.

Patricia, a granddaughter of the late state Senator William E. Beltz, will be in a cast for many months and may even need more surgery. But considering that the old treatment for such a disease was amputation, Patricia's parents, Carol and Lewis Beavers of Anchorage, feel it is indeed worth the present discomfort. Mrs. Beaver is an aide at Alaska Psychiatric

Institute and she feels her work there has given her insight on how to help Patricia deal with her long hospitalization.

Only 200 cases of this disease are reported in the world's medical literature. The malady affects the leg bone in such a way that it seems unable to heal and a false joint is formed. Bone in the shin region resorbs and disappears, making the leg bend at an odd angle. Doctors have tried two other measures to get Patricia's bone to heal, but these were unsuccessful.

It is not yet known what causes the condition, but it is not limited to any ethnic or geographical group. In Patricia's case, a familial condition known as Recklinghausen's disease (neofibromatosis) from her father's family may contribute to the child's particular problem. Congenital anomalies tend to occur in clusters, according to the doctors.

WAY CLEARED FOR OEO GRANT

JUNEAU — Gov. Walter J. Hickel has signed the papers which clear the way for a \$229,220 grant from the U.S. Office of Economic Opportunity to implement a rural electrification program in 69 rural Alaska communities.

The grant is the first step in a federal-state cooperative funding program aimed at bringing electric power to many of the state's villages presently without adequate - or any - electric service.

Under the OEO Act of 1964, the Governor is authorized to disapprove or approve receipt of grants for OEO programs in Alaska.

Rural residents will be trained to operate and maintain electric utility plants under provisions of a grant approved earlier by the U.S. Department of Labor. That grant was for \$660,000.

The Rural Electrification Administration will loan about \$4 million to Alaska Village Electrification Cooperative, Inc. for purchase and installation of equipment and materials.

NEW LOOK FOR 4H GIRLS

A "new look" is coming for the official 4-H dress.

A major introduction of the dress, comments Harlem I Sandberg, state 4-H & youth program leader, University of Alaska, is scheduled for National 4-H Conference in Washington, D.C., April 21-26.

The style is a basic A-line skimmer. The dress features jewel neckline with either short set-in sleeves or sleeveless design and back zipper closing. The optional jacket has matching collar, three-button closing and wrist-length sleeves. The design is formed by side seams and side back seaming. Flaps add a decorative touch.

The fabric is striped chambray in a clover green and white stripe. It is 50 percent Kodol polyester and 50 percent combed cotton. The fabric has permanent press and soil release finish. The cording is slightly raised on the stripe and add dimension.

"The new official dress," explains Sandberg, "will blend with the present dress for several years at 4-H events. No girl should feel outdated as she wears the two-piece green cord dress."

The pattern is shown in the May-dated fashion books, which are placed on pattern counters early in March.

The National 4-H Conference in Washington, D.C., district fairs and local happenings, are some of the events at which 4-H girls wear the official dress.
