The committe further recommended that steps be taken as temporary measures to in-sure quality education be contiqued under the best possible circumstances until the primary recommendation is possible.

They believe that this can be accomplished by housing all seventh grade students at Birchwood Elementary School under complete department-alization and in as close proximity to each other as possible to allow close coordination of their entire program.

### FIRE COMPANY FINANCIAL REPORT

EAGLE RIVER: The Eagle River Volunteer Fire Company has asked that the followfinancial report for the first quarter of 1968 be pub-

Funds on hand as of 1/1/68 totaled \$752,46; Revenues re-ceived to 3/31/68 - \$491.50; Total funds available during

the period totaled \$1,243.96. Expenses from 1/1/68 to 3/31/68 were \$603.90; which leaves total funds, les ex-penses or Funds on hand as of 4/1/68 of \$640.06.

The revenues received were from memberships and payments received for Rescue ambulance service; \$216.50 for eighteen memberships and for eighteen memberships and \$275.00 for eleven Rescue calls. No payments were received for Fire calls, however reimbursement for two Fire calls should be forthcoming when the Insurance claims are settled, During the period the company made eleven fire calls and rescue ambulance runs. ambulance runs.

Major expenditures during the first quarter were \$258.90 for insurance for personnel and vehicles responding to calls and \$211.45 for fuel oil for the Coronado Road fire hall.





These parents parents may not ever admit it, but you will be doing them a favor. Many times parents convince themselves that their underage son or daughter is a more skill-ful driver than some adults and therefore there is no harm in allowing them to drive the family car. 
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
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Dear Editor:

Apparently pressure for City-Borough merger legis-lation this year has been quietly brought to bear on the State Legislature by the Anchorage Chamber of Commerce, and in the closing days of this legislature, an amendment by Sen. Brad Phillips to H.B. 694 -- a piece of merger legislation designed for the Juneau area only -- was passed by the State Senagel

The Phillips amendment was passed so quietly that many of us who thought we had a close eye on the merger legislation did not know it until after passage. This is the same type of legislation we have fought so hard against for the past these years because it does not contain the safeguards many of us feel thate are vital.

Telegrams to e heard have been ignored, and no hearings were scheduled.

The followis is a letter sent to all 8th District House members last week. Should this nauseans legislation pass this year, I will report to you how our representative voted.

.... "Admittedly it is very difficult to comment in detail on specific actions being taken in Juneau on a day to day basis due to the distance and effective, inexpensive means of communication. In may cases action is taken on legislation and we learn of it after the fact.

I was particularly stunned at the Senate's action on merger of cities and boroughs, H.B. 694, as amended by Senator Brad Phillips. The Senate version of the bill is completely unacceptable. If this perticular version becomes law, and especially without allowing public hearings, it can only be considered as an unwarranted betrayal of alarge segment of your constituency. Many of us who are intimately associated with government at the local level consider this of major concern, and any change in the status quo at this time will have to be accompanied with complete explanations to the voters for actions taken.

actions taken.

I wish to remind you that the Greater Anchorage Area Borough Assembly tabled a request for unification of beroughs and cities in second class boroughs until we could consider it adqeuately at a work session.

No action should be taken until an Assembly request for such legislation, and only after public hearings have been held.

I therefore respectfully urge the defeat of H.B. 694.


