ANCHORAGE: The petition asking for the formation of a Fire Service District in the area served by the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company was presented to the Anchorage Borough Assembly last Monday at their regular meeting.

The petition, containing over two hundred signatures asked also that a board of three supervisors be elected to help prepare the budget for this area.

The Borough Administration said that before the petition could be voted upon by the Assembly, the ordinance covering the election of these supervisors would have to be drawn up.

The Borough Attorney is to be instructed to meet with the Chugiak committee to draw up this ordinance and then it will be presented to the Assembly.

The date at which the ordinance should be completed should be May 6th, with the target date for the election set at May 28th.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDS

BIRCHWOOD: The Reorganization Evaluation Committee of the Chugiak High School has met and submitted the following recommendation.

That the organization of the schools in this area continue in the 6-6 plan insofar as practicable (that is 6 - 3 - 3 with Junior - Senior High Complex).

The committee, who are as follows: Larry Graham, Chugiak High Principal, Mr. Lee Jordan, Mrs. Phyllis Stewart, Mr. Frank Austin and Mrs. Jane Oakley, met last Wednesday with area Elementary school principals and Mr. Les Wells, District Secondary Curriculum Director.

The committee further recommended that steps be taken as temporary measures to insure quality education be continued under the best possible circumstances until the primary recommendation is possible.

They believe that this can be accomplished by housing all seventh grade students at Birchwood Elementary School under complete departmentalization and in as close proximity to each other as possible to allow close coordination of their entire program.

They further suggest that all possible means be taken to coordinate the programs,

FIRE COMPANY FINANCIAL REPORT

EAGLE RIVER: The Eagle River Volunteer Fire Company has asked that the following financial report for the first quarter of 1968 be published.

Funds on hand as of 1/1/68 totaled \$752,46; Revenues received to 3/31/68 - \$491.50; Total funds available during the period totaled \$1,243.96.

Expenses from 1/1/68 to 3/31/68 were \$603.90; which leaves total funds, less expenses or Funds on hand as of 4/1/68 of \$640.06.

The revenues received were from memberships and payments received for Rescue ambulance service; \$216.50 for eighteen memberships and \$275.00 for eleven Rescue calls. No payments were received for Fire calls, however reimbursement for two Fire calls should be forthcoming when the Insurance claims are settled. During the period the company made eleven fire calls and rescue ambulance runs.

Major expenditures during the first quarter were \$258.90 for insurance for personnel and vehicles responding to calls and \$211.45 for fuel oil for the Coronado Road fire hall.

A survey of records for past years indicate that the eighteen memberships received during the period were

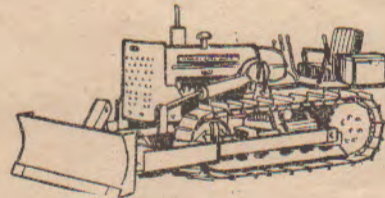
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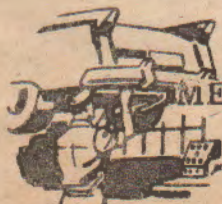
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Tell it to Martha

It simply isn't fair to the other youngsters who obey the law and to the parents who see that they do.

Dear Stumped,

First of all be absolutely sure of your facts. Then go to the office of the Alaska State Police and tell them all you know. Give them the name of the boy, a description of the car he has been driving and the license number if you can find it out.

They then can give this information to the State Trooper

who regularly patrols this area. If he sees this car with the boy driving it, he can stop him and ask to see his drivers license. Since the boys will not have one, then it won't be necessary for any citizen to make a formal charge, the troopers report will be all that is necessary to see that this is stopped.

I am sure that the Police will keep your identity private if you ask them to and tell them your reasons.

These parents may not ever admit it, but you will be doing them a favor. Many times parents convince themselves that their underage son or daughter is a more skillful driver than some adults and therefore there is no harm in allowing them to drive the family car. This may be true, but not only are they teaching the child to disregard the law, but if the youngster should ever be involved in an accident (and these can happen even to the most skillful adult driver) then they could find themselves involved in a very costly legal suit, and of course their insurance would be invalid in such a situation.

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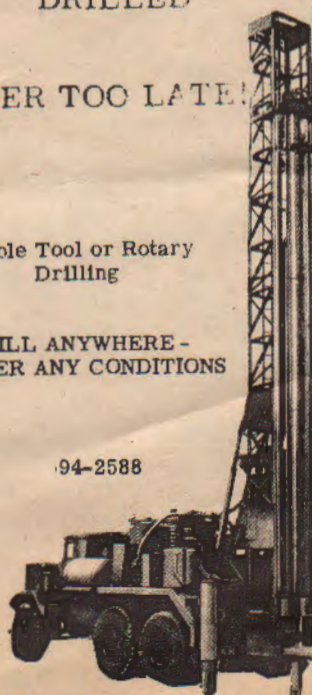
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LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Dear Editor:

Apparently pressure for City-Borough merger legislation this year has been quietly brought to bear on the State Legislature by the Anchorage Chamber of Commerce, and in the closing days of this legislature, an amendment by Sen. Brad Phillips to H.B. 694 -- a piece of merger legislation designed for the Juneau area only -- was passed by the State Senate!

The Phillips amendment was passed so quietly that many of us who thought we had a close eye on the merger legislation did not know it until after passage. This is the same type of legislation we have fought so hard against for the past three years because it does not contain the safeguards many of us feel that are vital.

Telegrams to be heard have been ignored, and no hearings were scheduled.

The followis is a letter sent to all 8th District House members last week. Should this nauseans legislation pass this year, I will report to you how our representative voted.

(Following a cop of the letter sent to all 8th District House Members)
..... "Admittedly it is very difficult to comment in detail on

specific actions being taken in Juneau on a day to day basis due to the distance and effective, inexpensive means of communication. In many cases action is taken on legislation and we learn of it after the fact.

I was particularly stunned at the Senate's action on merger of cities and boroughs, H.B. 694, as amended by Senator Brad Phillips. The Senate version of the bill is completely unacceptable. If this particular version becomes law, and especially without allowing public hearings, it can only be considered as an unwarranted betrayal of a large segment of your constituency. Many of us who are intimately associated with government at the local level consider this of major concern, and any change in the status quo at this time will have to be accompanied with complete explanations to the voters for actions taken.

I wish to remind you that the Greater Anchorage Area Borough Assembly tabled a request for unification of boroughs and cities in second class boroughs until we could consider it adequately at a work session.

No action should be taken until an Assembly request for such legislation, and only after public hearings have been held.

I therefore respectfully urge the defeat of H.B. 694.

Fifth and sixth grade students will be shown these films on the consent of their parents.

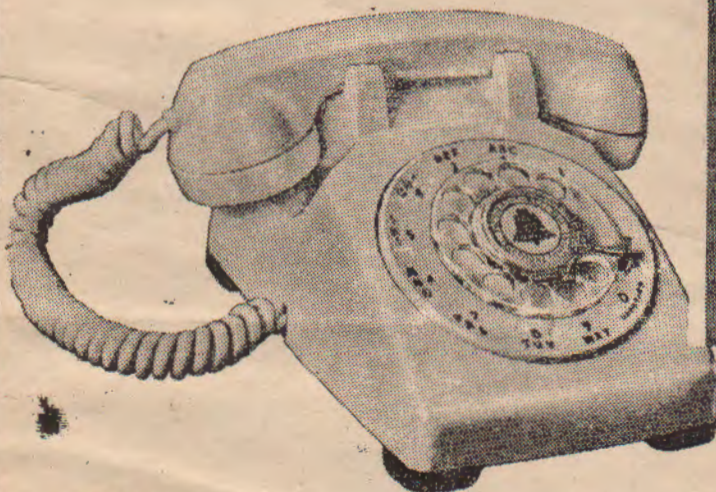
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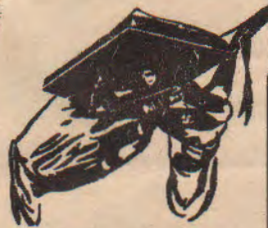
