ART SHOW COMING UP SOON

CHUGIAK: Local artists are reminded that there is a special prize for those who enter a painting that best depicts the theme of the Chugiak Art Show, scheduled for May 3rd and 4th at Chugiak High School.

The theme of the show is "Coming of Age" in honor of the 21st Anniversary of the formation of the Chugiak Community.

Although paintings are by no means limited to this theme, it is hoped that some artists will enter paintings that qualify for this special prize. Suggested subjects are paintings of early landmarks or events. Local subjects should be featured.

Entry blanks for the show are available at both the Chugiak and Eagle River public libraries and at the Co'or Center, Paint Stores Inc., the Spenard Hobby Shop and at Clark's Paint Store in Anchorage. In Palmer blanks may be found at Betty's dress shop.

Pick up points for the paintings are any of the above mentioned places and also at Chugiak High School. Deadline for pick-up is May 1st. All paintings must be framed or matted and wired for hanging. An entry fee of \$2.50 for adult entries and \$1.00 for students is charged. Artists may offer their paintings for sale. The Chugiak Ladies Club retains 10% of all paintings sold through the show.

Any proceeds from the show are used to defray the cost of the show, and to help purchase one of the paintings to be presented to the High School.

A poster contest advertising the event was conducted among the students, with the prize being ten free servings of food.

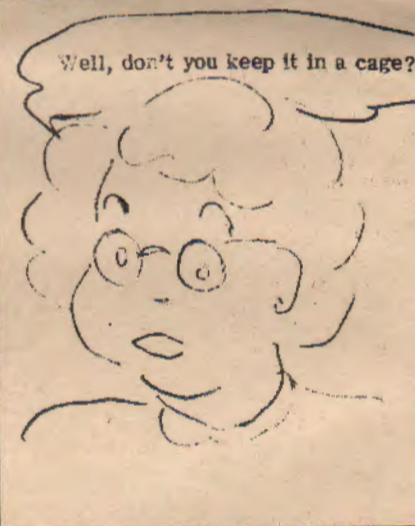

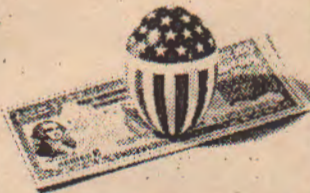

It will be carried by the company throughout their training period. This is the second "All-State" company for the Navy in Alaska, the first being last year's "Alaska Centennial Company."



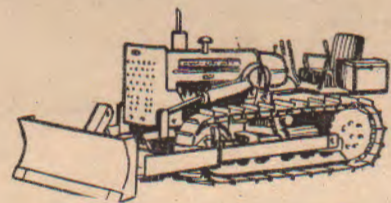

Dear Editor:

I would like to make one small correction to the Financial Report presented to the Eagle River Volunteer Fire Company and published in your April 17th issue. There were eleven fire calls and twenty one rescue ambulance calls during the period.

I wonder if I might also take this opportunity to pass on to the members a few items that make the whole thing worthwhile.

On two of the most recent rescue calls, the use of oxygen was required to sustain the patient until the hospital was reached. In one case mouth to mouth resuscitation was being used when the rescue ambulance arrived. In another instance a patient with a sever cut required constant attention until the rescue ambulance reached the emergency room. The gratitude expressed by most of the people helped by the company can be summed up in what Mrs. Johnson of Eagle River wrote in her thank you note to the Company, "It is very gratifying to just have some to call for help at a time like this, but to have them come so well equipped to help is almost more than you could ask for." Mrs. Johnson also donated a beautiful blanket for use in the rescue ambulance.

The verbal thanks that the crews who make the runs get and the notes that pick up with the mail, all belong to you the members and supporters of the Company.

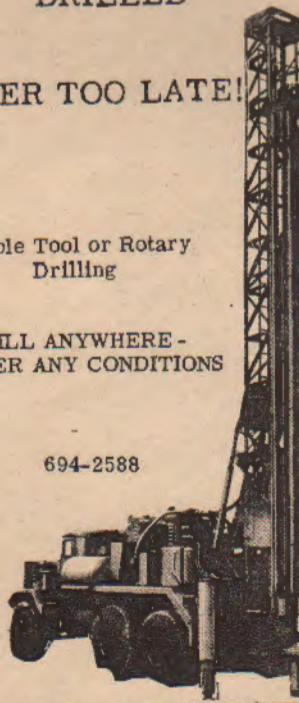

All former members and Club Alumni are urged to drop down and help as all the woman power that can be mustered will be needed.

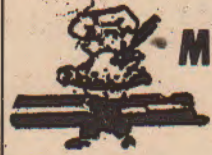

DANGER IN KITE FLYING

If someone tells you to "go fly a kite", be careful where you fly it, warns Dr. Ralph B. Williams, chief of the Alaska Department of Health and Welfare community health branch. He said that even an innocent-looking kite can be the agent of death to the holder of its string if the soaring bright triangle hooks itself to a high tension power line.

A gay kite string woven with metallic threads conveyed death by electrocution to a three-year old Alabama tyke who flew his paper toy into overhead power lines, the U.S. Public Health Service Injury Control Program in Cincinnati, Ohio reported. Just two days before, the report stated, a power outage occurred when a kite became entangled in wires and the power company said the young kite-flyer would have been killed instantly had he not let go of the metallic string.

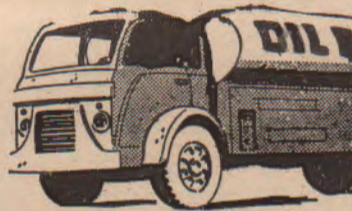

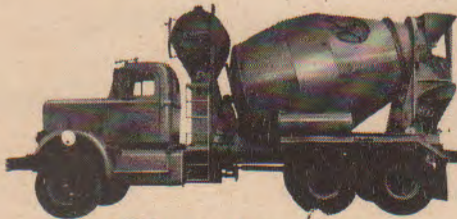
