

In another instance a patient with a sever cut required constant attention until the rescue ambnlance reached the emergency room. The gratitude expressed by most of the people helped by the company can be summed up in what Mrs. Johnson of Eagle River wrote in her thank you note to the Company, "It is very gratifying to just have some to call for help at a time like this, but to have them come so well equiped to help is almost more than you could ask for." Mrs. Johnson also donated a beautiful blanket for use in the rescue ambulance.

The verbal thanks that the crews who make the runs get and the notes that pick up with the mail, all belong to you the members and supporters of the Company.

DANGER IN KITE FLYING

If someone tells you to "go fly a kite", be careful where you fly it, warns Dr. Ralph B. Williams, chief of the Alaska Department of Health and Welare community health branch. He said that even an innocentlooking kite can be the agent of death to the holder of its string if the soaring bright triangle hooks itself to a high tension power line.

A gay kite string woven with metallic threads conveyed death by electrocution to a three-year old Alabama tyke who flew his paper toy into overhead power lines, the U.S. Public Health Service Injury Control Program in Cincinnati, Ohio reported. Just two days before, the report stated, a power outage occurred when a kite became entangled in wires and the power company. in wires and the power company said the young kite-flyer would have been killed instantly had he not let go of the metalli etring.


