

7th GRADE GOES TO BIRCHWOOD

BIRCHWOOD: Seventh grade students from the Greater Chugiak Area will attend classes at the Birchwood Elementary School, parents learned last Thursday evening at a public meeting held at Chugiak High School.

Larry Graham, Chugiak High Principal, and chairman of the committee which has been studying the problem of what to do with the seventh grade students, explained the reasons for the committee's recommendations.

He said that the committee felt it was best to keep the seventh graders together and offer them a strong academic program with departmentalized classes and as close to the High School as possible.

The Birchwood school is the only one which fitted these requirements, and is also the only one of the three area grade schools which would have enough classrooms available to house the seventh graders.

Graham listed the student projections for 1968-69 as 694 for grades 7 through 12, and said that there would be 569 students attending Chugiak High without the seventh grades.

He listed the enrollment for next year at Birchwood to be 263 without the seventh grade and 388 with the seventh grade. In 1969-70 Chugiak High would have 747 students with the seventh graders included or 628 without the 7th grade. During this same year, Birchwood would have 300 students without the 7th grade or 419 with the seventh grade.

During the next year, the Birchwood school would have from 3 to 5 classroom available to take care of the seventh grade.

Graham said that it was hoped to be able to continue some of the programs which were initiated for the seventh grade this year, such as the use of students teaching aides or the sharing of the High School P.E. teachers. He hoped that the 7th graders would be able to compete in borough athletic meets and take part in intermural wrestling, and junior high hockey.

He pointed out that the move to Birchwood was the only one possible, as there would be only one empty classroom at the Chugiak School, and none at Eagle River next year.

FIRE COMPANY SUB-STATION

EAGLE RIVER: Members of the Eagle River Volunteer Fire Company recently approved a plan designating the Far North Service Station as a sub-station of the Eagle River Fire Company.

The approval came after Chief Tom Take explained the details of an agreement worked out with Tom Slanker owner of the Far North Service Station.

Under the agreement, one fire truck will be parked at the Far North Service. This will enable the crews to respond more expeditiously to calls during regular working hours, as the staff from Far North serves as the nucleus of the crews that operate the equipment during these hours.

Mr. Slanker has indicated that during periods of severe weather in the winter he will attempt to park the truck in one of his heated stalls whenever possible. One truck has always had to be parked outside of the Coronado Road main station due to lack of space inside.

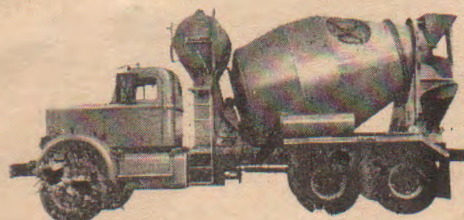

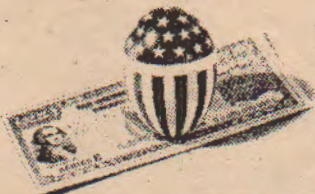

They will be held in all elementary schools throughout the boroung during the month of May.

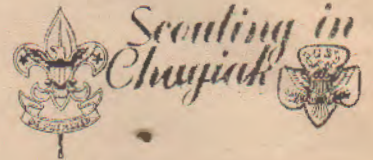

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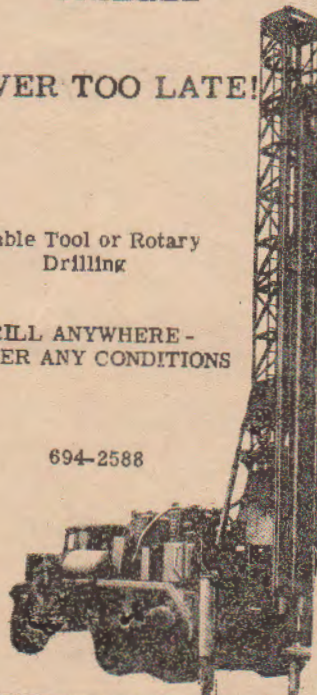
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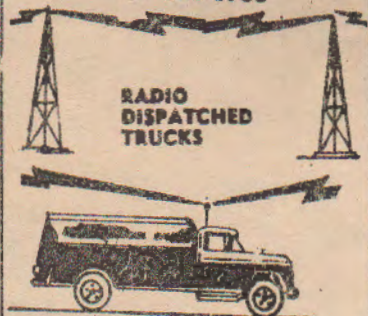
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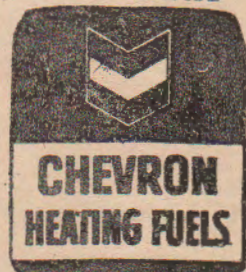


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OBEDIENCE CLUB HOLDS CONTEST

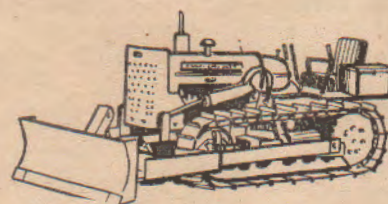

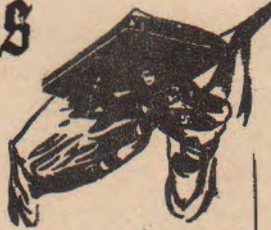
