EAGLE RIVER: The plane crash which took place near mile 15 on May 10th, came within inches of being a real tragedy for an Eagle River family. The term inches is used, because that is all that the plane missed hitting the Edgar Stockton residence in the Eagle River sub-division.

The plane, a Navion, piloted by Skelly Hebert of Ft. Greely, was enroute from Ft. Greely to Anchorage when it experienced an engine failure.

The plane skimmed the roof of the Stockton home in the Debora sub-division, and crashed in a field only 75 feet beyond their house. Mrs. Stockton said that her son Rick, age 14 and a neighbor boy, Gary Bernetti age 12 were in the yard when they saw the plane coming at them. They threw themselves to the ground, and the plane crashed just ten feet beyond them. She said that she is sure that if they hadn't dropped to the earth, they would have been struck by the propeller. She said that she herself had glanced out her kitchen window in time to see the belly and one wheel of the plane as it passed over the house.

The Stocktons rushed out and helped the pilot and his two sons David age 10 and Paul age 13 from the wreckage and brought them to their house. They then notified the State Troopers and called the Eagle River Ambulance. Mr. Hebert was suffering from lacerations of the face and the boys appeared to be in shock. A small dog that was in the plane appeared to be unharmed, and was taken to the home of Mrs. Melba Charles, who promised to care for it. The Hebert's were taken to an Anchorage Hospital for treatment.

It is not known at this time what was the cause of the engine failure. Mr. Hebert told the Stocktons that the plane had been parked unused for quite some time prior to the ill fated flight. Mrs. Stockton said that she believed it might be the same plane which had been parked in the yard of a home across from Merrill Field for over a year.

MENINGITIS VICTIM RECOVERING

EAGLE RIVER: Word was received last night at 6:00pm that a Chugiak High School senior, who was stricken on May 10th with meningitis is responding to medication, and it appears that she will make a complete recovery.

The girl, Laurel Kramer, of Eagle River, was rushed to the Anchorage Community Hospital around noon on Friday. At that time she had lapsed into a coma. She was transported by the Eagle River Volunteer Fire Company Ambulance.

Dr. David Duncan, head of the Anchorage Borough Health District told the Knik Arm Courier, that although meningitis is a highly infectious disease, there is no concern about it spreading unless it might be among people living very closely, such as members of the immediate family. He said that there is very little likelihood of it spreading among student who might have been in the same class with the girl.

However, he did say that parents that noted any unusual symptoms of illness in their children would be wise to check with their family doctor.

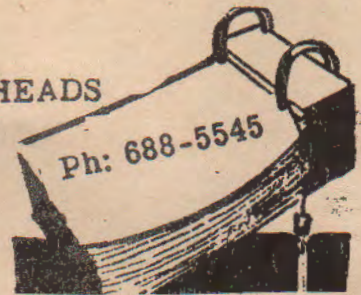
By way of coincidence, it was learned that Mrs. Conley and Mr. Hussey are of the same age and are both from the same home town of Chester Pennsylvania.

When you call the office, 688-5228, Kathy will be happy to assist you with your problems, or refer you to an agency that can help you.

The name, "Pelky", was formed by using the first letter from the names of the four women who worked so hard to form councils, and G.O.A.L., in order to bring you the Basic Education classes,

Head Start, and "Patak", your Service Center which was established in order to present other services to you.

The initials that form "Pelky" stand for: P . . Pat Sherman, E. . Elva Connell, L . . Ludi French, K. . Kathy Walker. The Y stand for YOU, the people in the Greater Chuglak Area.

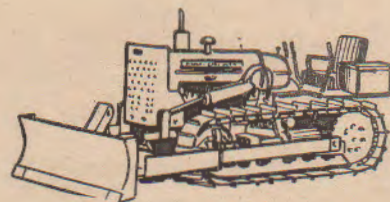

In all three cases the fires had been started by sparks from burning trash or garbage.

On Wednesday, May 8th, a four to five acre area at mile 8.5 Eagle River Road at the D. Robertson residence was involved. Two fire trucks and nine men brought the fire under control in two hours.

On May 10th, a brush fire at the Richard Ruberg residence in the Rolling Hills subdivision was controlled in two hours. One truck and 8 men kept this fire contained to one acre.

Also on May 10th, the Eagle River Volunteers came to the assistance of the Chugiak Fire Company under their mutual aid agreement and stood by at a brush fire at the Ollie Walker residence at mile 17.5 Glenn Highway.

Both Fire Companies repeat their warning that fire conditions are extreme this time of year, and urge householders to be exceptionally careful when even burnign trash.

CAR WRECKED AVOIDING CRASH

EAGLE RIVER: An Eagle River driver sustained \$1,000 worth of damage to his 1964 Volvo sedan by attempting to avoid a collision with another car that he observed careening down the highway at high speed over the center line.

The youth, Keith White, apparently sustained lacerations on his leg and was transported to the Anchorage Community Hospital where he was treated.

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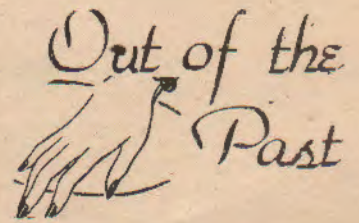
