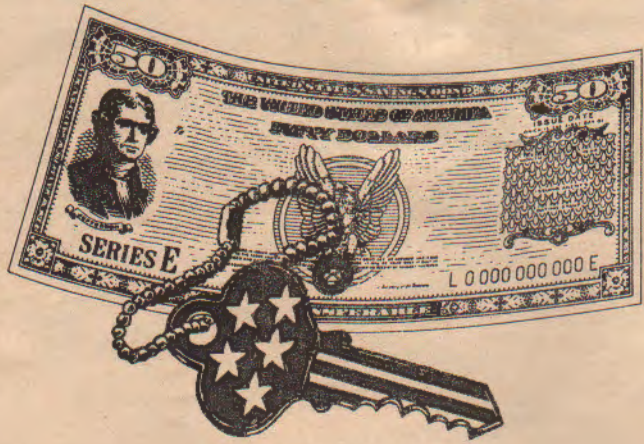

CHUGIAK: The Chugiak TOPS Pound Pushers may form an evening group if there is sufficient interest.

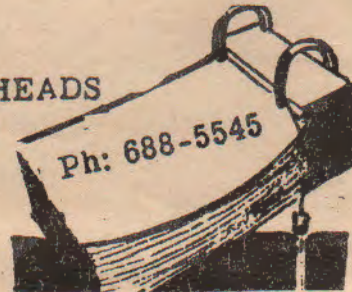

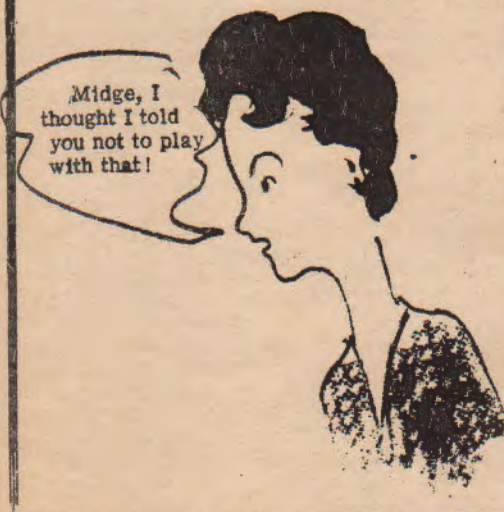

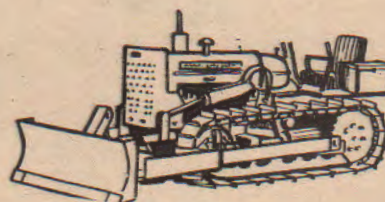

The Ladies Club presented a gift to Mrs. Pearce, a hand made birch napkin holder from Alaska Woodcraft in Eagle River.

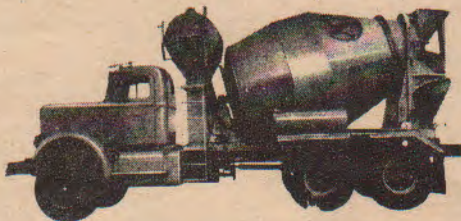
