

ORDINANCE VOTE DELAYED AGAIN



ANCHORAGE: Assembly vote of the Ordinance to elect three Fir Supervisors for the Proposed Chu glak Fire Service Area suffered another delay Monday night whe it was decided to change the Ord inance from an "Emergency" to a "Regular" one.

Since the passage of a Regula Ordinance requires the advertis-ing of Public Hearing a minimum seven days in advance of the of date, the Assembly action was postponed until June 17th. This in turn moves the date of the election to July 23rd, pending the Assembly approval of the Ordinance.

BIRCHWOOD: Mrs Charles Richner, local artist, has presented her painting "High Hopes" to Chugiak High School.


