

ORDINANCE VOTE DELAYED AGAIN



THE GRADUATING CLASS OF 1968 STANDS AND PREPARES TO COME FORWARD AND RECEIVE THEIR DIPLOMAS.

ANCHORAGE: Assembly vote of the Ordinance to elect three Fire Supervisors for the Proposed Chugiak Fire Service Area suffered another delay Monday night when it was decided to change the Ordinance from an "Emergency" to a "Regular" one.

Since the passage of a Regular Ordinance requires the advertising of Public Hearing a minimum of seven days in advance of the date, the Assembly action was postponed until June 17th. This in turn moves the date of the election to July 23rd, pending the Assembly approval of the Ordinance.

PHONE SWITCH OVER DELAYED

CHUGIAK: The switch over to the new Chugiak Telephone exchange, scheduled to go into effect June 1st, has been delayed, according to a spokesman from the Matanuska Telephone Assoc.

The new exchange will not go into operation for at least one month, it was reported.

There will be announcements in the Knik Arm Courier prior to the switch over, and a supplement to the MTA phone directory listing the new numbers will be mailed to all subscribers in both the local exchanges.

Some of the ladies who attended last Friday's Patak get together were not able to stay for the entire meeting. However, most of them were able to see some of the craft ideas presented during their visit.

Bobbie Westoby demonstrated the art of making bead strips on a small loom. Various designs are woven into strips of beading, creating colorful bands.

One lady told us that she had been quoted a price of \$25.00 for a similar set made up for decorating an Alaskan Parka.

Bobbie also showed the ladies how to make in-expensive household items from articles found around the house. Some of the projects shown were, a very attractive tiled can which has many uses, a magazine holder made from a detergent box, a gadget holder constructed of match boxes, a storage holder for slide pictures, and some very unusual place mats which can be made from materials native to Alaska.

She also supplied materials and instructed the ladies in the art of Origami. This is the oriental craft of folding paper to form objects such as birds, balls and hats. During this portion of the program, the ladies learned to

fold paper to create birds that flap their wings.

Anyone who wishes to learn knitting should attend the meetings to take advantage of the free lessons given by Gini Barber. She has been very faithful in coming to each meeting with her teaching supplies, novel ideas and wearing one of her own knitted creations to show us what can be done with a pair of needles.

One week she wore a lovely beaded sweater that stands out in our memory. To create the garment Gini had knitted pearl beads throughout the entire sweater to create a very unusual effect.

Mrs. Heagle brought her beautiful project to share with us. She was doing embroidery work on a piece of padded satin in a way that made each design stand out as though it had been padded separately.

She was selected to receive the gift of Chief Chugiak's silver and

black earrings presented during the meeting.

Kathy Walker took applications for the Head Start class while the meeting was being held.

It was reported that she also used the Origami art to form a bird which she insists could fly, even though it was a very sad example of the art.

Last week Kathy Walker and Pat Sherman drove to Sutton to visit the Basic Education class at the Adult Conservation Camp. This very interesting trip included a delicious luncheon prepared and served by the men. We hope to make a more thorough report on this visit at a later date.

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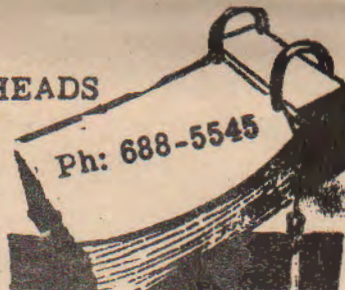

SCHEDULED**

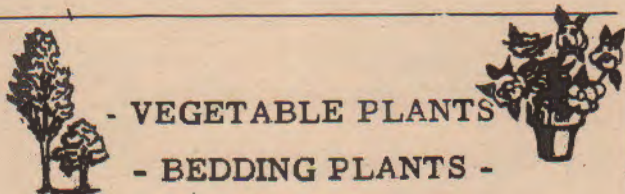

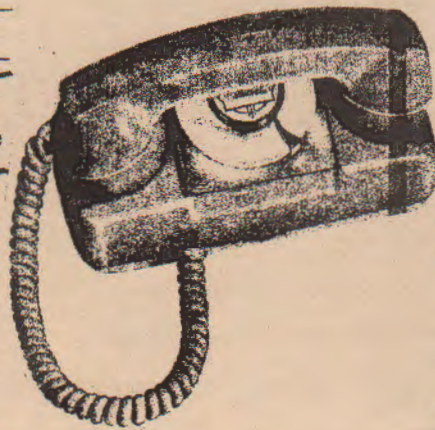


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Tell it to Martha

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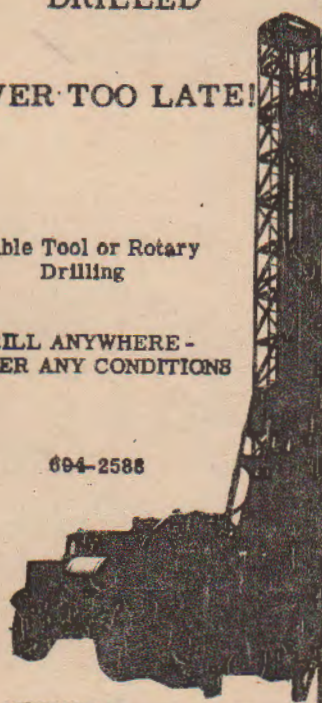
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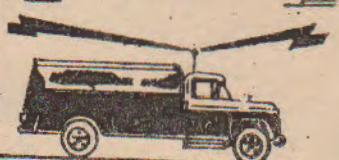
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TIPS FOR MILADY

LET'S LEARN TRUCKERS LINGO

Ever hear of a "bed bug hauler," a "cackle crate" or a "pajama wagon?"

How about a "horse" or a "boll weevil?"

If this all sounds a bit unusual, the translation can be found in the just-released "Truck Drivers Dictionary and Glossary" published by American Trucking Associations.

This handy glove compartment-sized lexicon defines a "bed bug hauler" as a moving van driver, a "cackle crate" as a truck that hauls live poultry, and a "pajama wagon" as a truck cab with a sleeping berth. "Horse" is industry jargon for a truck tractor. A "boll weevil" is a novice truck driver.

The glossary takes much of the mystery from the special vocabulary of the truck jockey and gives motorists, perhaps while they're stopped at a roadside cafe for some "hundred mile coffee," a chance to understand what they're hearing.

With the dictionary, for instance, the motorist can eavesdrop on - and understand - truck driver gossip about the "cowboy" who got caught by the "big hats." Translated, that means a reckless driver was stopped by state troopers.

Among the glossary's entries are these further highway terms:

Aviator - Speeding driver.
Bible - The "Golden Rule" safe driving book.

Double Bottom - Unit consisting of tractor, semitrailer and full trailer. Also called "twin trailers" or "doubles."

Gum Ball Machine - Rotating warning light on top of an emergency vehicle.

Rags - Bad tires.
Sheep Herder - Driver with questionable ability.

Yardbird - Driver who connects and disconnects the tractor-semitrailer combinations and moves vehicles around the terminal yard.

Zypher Haul - Shipment of lightweight cargo.
