EKLUTNA LAKE: A Ft. Richardson soldier fell to his death while hiking above the old dam near Lake Eklutna this weekend.

The victim was Sylvester M. Romel Jr., age 21.

A companion, notified the State Police that Romel had slipped and fallen approximately 150 feet into the river from the cliff where they had been climbing. The companion said he was able to climb down the cliff and pull his friend from the water, but that he was apparently dead at the time.

An Army rescue team had to be summoned to recover the body.

## TENTATIVE DATE FOR ELECTION JUNE 18th

ANCHORAGE: A tentative date of June 18th has been set for a special election to form a Fire Service District in the area served by the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Co.

The election is now dependent on whether the Borough Assembly will approve an amendment to the ordinance which designates Service Area 8 to allow the election of three local supervisors.

A resolution had appeared on the agenda of the May 6 Borough Assembly Meeting to call for the election, but this did not contain the provision for the election of supervisors. When it was pointed out by the representative of the local committee that the petition signed by over 200 Chugiak Area residents specifically asked that the supervisors be elected a motion to amend the resolution was introduced and was voted upon and carried 7 to 4.

The Borough attorney will now draft an emergency amendment to the ordinance, which will be brought before the Borough Assembly for their approval at the May 13th meeting. If it is approved the June 18 election will be scheduled.

No other service area in the borough has the fire supervisor system, although it is used in the Matanuska Susitna Borough and is allowed under the Borough law.

Dr. Richard Marland, Chief of the Public Health Service's Injury Control Program, stated: "There has already been a car-

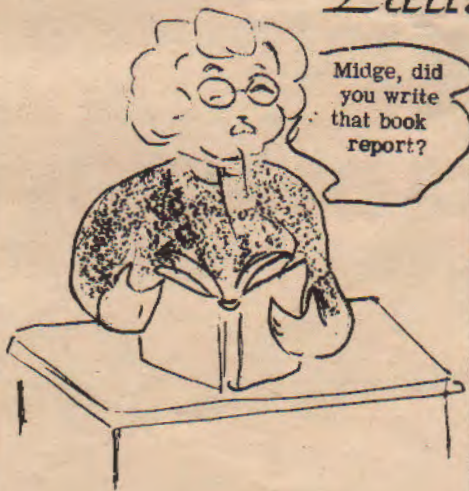

Each of the ten dens in the pack spent at least 45 minutes in the booth working on crafts.

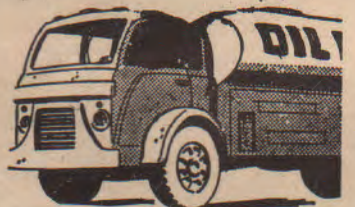
