## MIRROR LAKE PARK TO OPEN JULY 4th

PETERS CREEK: The Mirror Lake Picnic Wayside, which has been under construction since last summer is scheduled for completion by July 4th of 1968, it was learned

today. The area will consist of 12 acres and will have park-ing, boat launching and pic-nic areas, one for a large group and the other with a capacity of eight seperate family groups.


endent on whether the Borough Assembly will approve an am-mendment to the ordinance which designates Service Area 8 to allow the election of three local supervisors. A resolution had appeared on the agenda of the May 6 Borough Assembly Meeting to call for the election, but this did not contain the provision for the election of sup-ervisors. When it was point-ed out by the representative of the local committee that

the petition signed by over 200 Chugiak Area residents specifically asked that the supervisors be elected a motion to amend the resolution was introduced and was coted upon and carried 7 to 4.

The Borough attorney will now draft an emergency am-mendment to the ordinance, which will be brought before the Borough Assembly for their approval at the May 13th meeting. If it is approv-ed the June 18 election will be scheduled.

No other service area in the borough has the fire supervisor system, although it is used in the Matanuska Susitna Borough and is allowed under the Borough law.

Two one act plays, "The Ugly Duckling" and "Maria" were presented during 5th and 6th hours on May 2nd.



Since they will be preparing a lunch menu, which will be quite filling, the girls are aked to be prepared to stay longer.


Mrs. Kallenberg said that they would add to the luncheon menu and eit for supper.


The decorations consisted of self portraits by each of the boys and a beautiful ban-ner which had been made by Mrs. Grace Marquiss.

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bon monoxide death of a man in Jackson, Michigan, who was living in a cabin equipped with the kind of heater that we are seeking " seeking.

seeking." During the past month, the Public Health Service's National Center for Urban and Industrial health in Cincinnati has been assisting Sears, Roebuck and Company and the American Gas Association of Cleveland in a search for the potentially dan-

gerous heaters. The suspected heater was manufactured by the now de-funct Samuel Stamping and Enameling Company of Chattanoga, Tennessee. At the request of the United

States Public Health Service, Sears conducted an intensive investigation of some of the 6,000 Vestigation of some of the 0,000 such heaters sold under the trade name Homart. Sears vol-untarily instituted a campaign to recall and replace the heat-ers they sold and has located more than 1,000 of the heaters which are being replaced free of charge of charge.

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
