

FIRE LEAVES FAMILY HOMELESS

TWO HURT IN HIGH SPEED CRASH

ERLUTNA: Two men were injured the car in which they were riding went out of control at high speed at mile 26.3 on the Glenn Highway.

The accident took place at 9:00pm on Monday, June 10. The car was a 1958 Volks-

wagon sedan driven by Franz Cervinka of Anchorage. Ac-cording to the State Troopers, the car skidded for approximately 523 feet before it struck a telephone pole and sheared the pole off and wiped out the sign from the Eklutna

Church. The driver appeared to be suffering from injuries to his supering from injuries to ins shoulder and possible frac-ture; the passenger, Rolf Gunter Strasser, also of An-chorage, sustained lacerat-ions. Both ambulances from the Churche and Facle Binor the Chugiak and Eagle River Volunteer Fire Companies responded and transported the innured men to the hospital.

Cervinka was cited for negligent driving.

PUBLIC HEARING ON FIRE DISTRICT SCHEDULED

ANCHORAGE: A public hear-ing of Ordinance No. 29-68, which would provide for an elected supervisory board for the Service Ares No. 8, will be held on June 17th at 8pm in the School District Admin-istration Office on 670 Fireweed Lane in Anchorage.

This is the ordinance which would pormit the election of three supervisors in the Fire Protection Service Area which has been proposed for the area currently served by the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company.

The committee which had been elected from this area to circulate a petition asking to circulate a periton asking the formation of this Fire Service Area and also ask-ing the election of the sup-ervisors, drew on the Mat-anuska Susitna Borough for the idea of the supervisors. These supervisors have been

employed elected in the Fire Service Areas in the Mat-Su Borough and have been very effective there, the chairman of the local committee stated.

ll:00am until 5:00pm. The location will be the Chugiak El-ementary School.


A wide range of activities are being planned for children of almost every grade and age from first through 8th. The center will offer a sports program and an arts and crafts program. In conjunction with the above



My next door neighbor is a bird lover. She has birdfeeders and birdhouses, baths all over her year.

This of course attracts hundreds of birds. This is fine, because I like birds too. . The trouble is I also like cats and my cat likes birds.

Several times she has seen my cat come over to her yard and catch a bird while it was at the feeder. She has threat-ened me that if I don't keep my cat away from her birds she will call the dog catcher and have him picked up.

Martha, how do you keep a cat home? I have a fance around my yard, and so does shee, but you know there has never been a fence made that will keep a cat in. I can't chain him up or keep him locked up in the house all the time. What solution do you suggest for this problem?

Cat Lover

Dear Cat Lover, To begin with, your neigh-bor should be informed that the dog catcher will not come to pick up a cat. The animal control law is limited to dogs, and not cats. While the pound will take unwanted cats that people bring in, they are not permitted by law to go out and pick up stray cats,

Your neighbor is creating the problem by attracting all those birds to her house, (and incidently where does she get off calling them "her birds"). In a populated community she should realize that there will be a number of families with cats who will be attracted to her birds. She should build her feeders in



such a manner that cats are unable to surprise the birds while they are eating. One way would be to place them on a pole and have metal bands on the pole to prevent the cats from climbing them, One thing you should be

aware of, however, is that if she should happen to catch your cat in her yard and take a shot at him, there is little you could do about it.

Why not try putting up a few feeders of your own so your cat doesn't have to go out to eat.
