



FIRE LEAVES FAMILY HOMELESS

TWO HURT IN HIGH SPEED CRASH

EKLUTNA: Two men were injured the car in which they were riding went out of control at high speed at mile 26.3 on the Glenn Highway.

The accident took place at 9:00pm on Monday, June 10.

The car was a 1958 Volkswagen sedan driven by Franz Cervinka of Anchorage. According to the State Troopers, the car skidded for approximately 523 feet before it struck a telephone pole and sheared the pole off and wiped out the sign from the Eklutna Church.

The driver appeared to be suffering from injuries to his shoulder and possible fracture; the passenger, Rolf Gunter Strasser, also of Anchorage, sustained lacerations. Both ambulances from the Chugiak and Eagle River Volunteer Fire Companies responded and transported the injured men to the hospital.

Cervinka was cited for negligent driving.

PUBLIC HEARING ON FIRE DISTRICT SCHEDULED

ANCHORAGE: A public hearing of Ordinance No. 29-68, which would provide for an elected supervisory board for the Service Area No. 8, will be held on June 17th at 8pm in the School District Administration Office on 670 Fireweed Lane in Anchorage.

This is the ordinance which would permit the election of three supervisors in the Fire Protection Service Area which has been proposed for the area currently served by the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company.

The committee which had been elected from this area to circulate a petition asking the formation of this Fire Service Area and also asking the election of the supervisors, drew on the Matanuska Susitna Borough for the idea of the supervisors.

These supervisors have been employed elected in the Fire Service Areas in the Mat-Su Borough and have been very effective there, the chairman of the local committee stated.

Refreshments will be offered for sale and there will be a dance contest. Live music is being planned. Any person in baseball uniform will be admitted free.

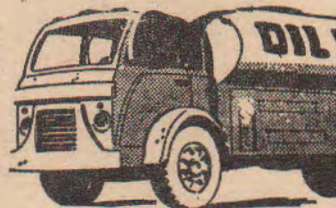

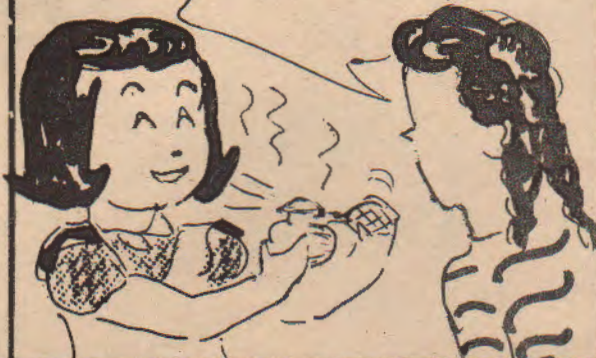

BABE RUTH TEAM ENDS FIRST ROUND

PETERS CREEK: The Chuglak Babe Ruth team completes its first six-game round tonight when it meets the Bachner Apartments team from City View at the local park on Oberg Road. Game time is 6:30pm.

The 1968 season opened locally with a doubleheader on Memorial day. Impressive opening ceremonies were held during which the team members were introduced, "The Star Spangled Banner" was played by Steve Jordan, and Assemblyman Ed Willis tossed in the first ball.

Rabbit Creek Inn downed Bachner Apartments 8-3, as rain started to fall in the late innings.

Excellent pitching by left-hander Kip Lewis and continued rain combined to dampen the spirits in the second game as the Chuglak team went down to a 6-0 loss. Lewis gave up no hits. Monte Doyle took the loss for the Bankers.

On Saturday, June 1, in a game postponed from Friday night due to wet grounds, the Eagle River Branch First National Bank met the Pepsi East team from City View and shut out their rivals from prior seasons 8-0. Kim Watsjold gave up 4 hits while Banker pitcher Fred Olson allowed Pepsi only two hits.

Second week action saw the First National Bank romp over Teams Local 959 of Mt. View, 21-6 behind the pitching of Monte Doyle. Home runs were hit by Bankers Ron Tyson in the 3rd inning and Steve Jordan in the 7th. Both round-trippers came with no one on base.

Wednesday, June 5, found the Bankers continuing in their winning mood as Ron Tyson pitched them to a 12-2 victory over C.R. Lewis of Mt. View. Losing pitcher Don Brooks homered for Mt. View in the 4th.

After a long weekend, the Bankers returned Monday, June 10 when Fred Olson gained his second shutout, down-

ing Rabbit Creek Inn, 10-0. Banker catcher Jordan homered in the 3rd.

Lee Jordan, manager of the First National team, commented that the season promises to be a tough one. "Lottsfeldt and Kyzer has good boys and excellent pitching, as does Pepsi East. C.R. Lewis is a well-coached team with heavy hitters. We haven't been up against Bachner yet, but they look promising. The other two teams got off to a slow start but will give us a run for our money next time around."

Batting practice apparently was in order for the Bankers after going hitless in the opening game. The team has collected 4, 18, 8 and 9 hits in each of their next four games.

Umpires for the local games have been John Hett and Bill Watkins. Elsie Oberg is official scorekeeper. Orville Tyson is team coach. Barbara Jordan and Sherry Shepard operate the concession stand. Fannie Underwood canvassed the area for advertising for the league's program and donations for use on the field.

Two local youths, David Haynes and Frankie Martin have been hired under the Youth Opportunity program to maintain the Chuglak Babe Ruth field. They will devote approximately 10 hours weekly to erection of a second dugout, fencing, grasscutting and marking the field prior to the games.

Similar programs are in effect for the 9th and B and Lake Otis fields.

The establishment will be henceforth known as the Crabpot, Eagle River Branch, and will feature wholesale and retail sales of seafood, with emphasis on fresh razor clams, oysters, halibut, king salmon, shrimp, and king and dungeness crab.

The program will run concurrent with the school library program, and those participating in it may take advantage of the transportation offered by the library bus.

The bus follows a sched-

ule published in last week's issue of the Knik Arm Courier, and arrives at the school at 1:00pm, and departs at 3:00pm. Sortore stated that the recreation program is limited at present to students who are in grades 1 through 6.

He also stated that he has recommended that Mr. Wendell Lane, who was in charge of a similar program last year for Chugiak Elementary PTA be retained on a part time basis for consultation.

Several times she has seen my cat come over to her yard and catch a bird while it was at the feeder. She has threatened me that if I don't keep my cat away from her birds she will call the dog catcher and have him picked up.

Martha, how do you keep a cat home? I have a fence around my yard, and so does shee, but you know there has never been a fence made that will keep a cat in. I can't chain him up or keep him locked up in the house all the time. What solution do you suggest for this problem?

Dear Cat Lover,

To begin with, your neighbor should be informed that the dog catcher will not come to pick up a cat. The animal control law is limited to dogs, and not cats. While the pound will take unwanted cats that people bring in, they are not permitted by law to go out and pick up stray cats.

Your neighbor is creating the problem by attracting all those birds to her house, (and incidently where does she get off calling them "her birds"). In a populated community she should realize that there will be a number of families with cats who will be attracted to her birds. She should build her feeders in

such a manner that cats are unable to surprise the birds while they are eating. One way would be to place them on a pole and have metal bands on the pole to prevent the cats from climbing them.

One thing you should be aware of, however, is that if she should happen to catch your cat in her yard and take a shot at him, there is little you could do about it.

Why not try putting up a few feeders of your own so your cat doesn't have to go out to eat.
