

ORDINANCE PASSES - ELECTION DATE SET

ANCHORAGE: Borough Ordinance 29-68 was passed by a narrow 6 to 5 vote when it was brought up for re-consideration last Monday night.

This ordinance deals with the election of three fire district supervisors to a proposed fire service area to be formed in the part of the Chugiak community now served by the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company.

The ordinance had come before the assembly on June 17, but had been turned down due to the absence of two assemblymen making the 5-4 vote in favor of the ordinance count as not being a majority of the eleven assemblymembers. The matter was scheduled for re-consideration this last Monday at the request of an Assemblyman who had voted against it.

For a time on Tuesday, the victory appeared to be short lived, when assemblyman James Noreen apparently saw matter differently in the cold light of the morning and asked to have the matter again brought up for reconsideration at the next assembly meeting. However, the verdict of the Borough attorney was that it could be brought up for re-consideration only one time, making everything "go" for the July 30th election.

Since the ordinance will permit the election of three supervisors, the next item to be considered will be the nomination of candidates to be elected to these offices. Nomination to the office of supervisor will be by petition of ten registered voters, resident in Service Area 8 (Area presently served by the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Co.) Petition forms are available at the office of the Borough Clerk, 104 Northern Lights Blvd, in Anchorage.

Nominations will close on July 10th, 1968; and all petitions must be filed with the clerk by 5:00pm of that day in order to be valid.

The election will be held on July 30th, with one central location for all three polling places within the district. The Chugiak, Birchwood and Peters Creek precincts will each have their separate set of polls located at the Chugiak Elementary School. Election headquarters will also be located at this school for this election only.

LOCAL AIR SERVICE OPENS

BIRCHWOOD: A free fly-in or drive-in picnic will celebrate the opening of the first commercial aviation facility at the Birchwood Airstrip.

Ralpy Doyle, operator of Chugiak Aviation, invites everyone to come to the Grand Opening of his new facility, located at the north end of the Birchwood Airstrip.

The welcome mat is out this coming Sunday, from 11am to 3pm. In addition to free food and beverages, Chugiak Aviation will offer demonstration rides for a nominal fee, and a drawing for three door prizes will be held. These prizes will be one hour of flying time to be taken at the convenience of the winner. This can either be a pleasure ride, or may be applied to flight instruction.

Chugiak Aviation will specialize in fully insured charter service for the entire State of Alaska, will offer ground and flight instruction from private ticket through instrument instruction with two well qualified instructors, Ralph Doyle and Wiley Haggard. An aerobatic course will be offered

THREE HURT IN 3 CAR SMASH

Ft. RICHARDSON: Two members of an Eagle River family were injured in separate cars in a freak accident which took place on Friday, June 21st at mile 12.

Mrs. Bernice Ruth Schmidt, of Mile 1/4 Eagle River Road was driving a 1960 Ford Galaxy, while Mary Lou Schmidt was following in a 1961 Ford.

Both cars had stopped to allow another car to turn off the road, when a third car, driven by Dennis Lloyd Morris of Mile 22 1/2, rounded a curve, and not seeing the two cars in time to stop, crashed into the rear one, causing it to smash into the car ahead.

According to the State Troopers, Bernice Schmidt appeared to be suffering from shock and numerous cuts. Mary Lou Schmidt may have sustained a broken neck. Morris also sustained cuts.

Damage to the Galaxy was estimated at \$500, the 1961 Ford, \$300. The Chevrolet was judged a total loss.

Morris was cited for falling to keep a safe distance.

MID-JULY NEV. PHONE CUT-OVER DATE

PALMER: The new telephone exchange in Chugiak will not be cut in until some time in mid-July, according to Max Clement, manager of the Matanuska Telephone Association.

However, he declined to name a cut-over date. He said that the cut-over would be announced well in advance both by written notices to all subscribers, as well as notices in the newspaper.

He said that all subscribers would receive a supplement to their phone directory listing all the new phone numbers.

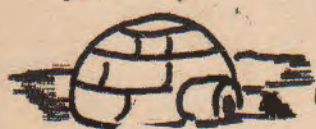
An open house at the new exchange building will be held sometime after the cut-over date, he concluded.

Mrs. Heagle brought an unfinished baby blanket to the meeting so that the ladies could share in the fun of finishing it, then presenting it to Lenore Landreth.

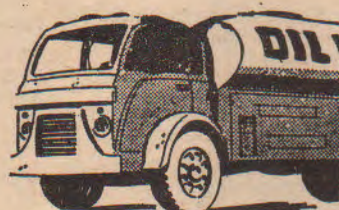

The reasons vary, but I am sure that most of those don't either think themselves to important, nor are they necessarily hiding from bill collectors.

A great many people have unlisted numbers simply to keep their business life from following them home. I know of one school teacher who had to get an unlisted number to give her some time for her own family, and away from parents who would call her up at home to discuss their children's problems.

I will admit that it does make it complicated when you are trying to make contacts by phone, but if your reasons for calling these people are legitimate church work, I am sure that you should be able to get the unlisted numbers from your pastor.

Out of the Past

BOY HURT IN BICYCLE ACCIDENT: Ryan "Stabby" Straight, 8 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Jesse Straight, suffered bruises, abrasions and a concussion yesterday evening when a wheel broke from his bicycle on Fish Hatchery Road.

STOCKHAUSEN AND HALVERSON ARE WED: In the first Chuglak wedding this year, Darlene Stockhausen became the bride of Peter Halverson. The wedding took place Tuesday at Fire Lake Lodge.

LOCAL RESIDENT ENDANGERED BY FIREWORKS: Ralph Long of Mile 22 1/2 narrowly escaped serious injury when a giant firecracker thrown from a speeding car landing in the gravel at his feet as he was waiting to cross the road in front of his home.

DRUNKEN INTRUDER BOTHERS LOCAL FAMILY: When Walter Pippel and his family returned from a drive last Saturday, they found a strange man in their bathroom. The intruder, a soldier, was too drunk and incoherent to explain his presence so the Pippels called the Territorial Police. After about an hour when the T.P. had still not arrived, the man seemed to have regained some of his senses and asked to be allowed to leave. He said that his pick-up was parked in front of the Town House Bar where he had been drinking. He left and drove off in a pickup which the Pippels recognized as belong-

LOCAL BABE RUTH ACTION

PETERS CREEK: Reversals were the order of the day for the Chuglak Babe Ruth team as they gained first place in Anchorage Babe Ruth League action for the course of a weekend, lost it to Pepsi East, then gained a three-way tie when Pepsi fell to Lottsfeldt and Kyzer Construction on Monday.

Friday, June 14, First National Bank of Anchorage, Eagle River Branch, avenged its first loss of the season by downing Lottsfeldt and Kyzer 4-1, in a well-pitched game at 9th and B in Anchorage. Tonight Chuglak meets Rabbit Creek Inn and faces Bachner Apartments of City View on Friday. Both games are at Chuglak, starting at 6:30.

A big week is in store starting Monday, when First National meets L&K at Chuglak. The postponed game with C.R. Lewis of Mt. View will be played Tuesday at Lake Otis Park and on Wednesday the Bankers face Pepsi at Chuglak. Friday, Chuglak travels to Mulcahy for a game with Teamsters.

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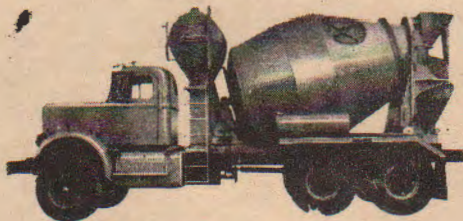
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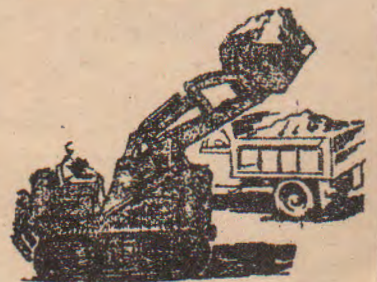

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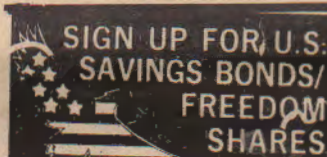
