THREE HURT IN 3 CAR SMASH

Damage to the Galaxy was estimated at \$500, the 1961 ford, \$300. The Chevrolet was judged a total loss. Morris was cited for falling

MID-JULY NEW PHONE CUT-OVER DATE

PALMER: The new telephone exchange in Chugiak will not be cut in until some time in mid-July, according to Max Clement, manager of the Matanuska Telephone Association.

The cut-over date, originally announced as June 1, and later set ahead to July 1, has now been moved up another few weeks.

Clement stated that there are crews at work in the new exchange building on Birchwood Road, and that there should be no further delays following this latest one. ANCHORAGE: Borough Ordinance 29-68 was passed by a narrow 6 to 5 vote when it was brought up for re-consideration last Monday night.

This ordinance deals with the election of three fire district supervisors to a proposed fire service area to be formed in the part of the Chugiak community now served by the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company. The ordinance had come be-


The ordinance had come befor the assembly on June 17, but had been turned down due to the absence of two assemblymen making the 5-4 vote in favor of the ordinance count as not being a majority of the eleven assemblymembers. The matter was scheduled for re-consideration this last Monday at the request of an Assemblyman who had voted against it.

who had voted against it. For a time on Tuesday, the victory appeared to be short lived, when assemblyman James Noreen apparently saw matterr differently in the cold light of the morning and asked to have the matter again brought up for reconsideration at the next assembly meeting. However, the verdict of the Borough attorney vas that it could be brought up for re-consideration only one time, making everything "go" for the July 30th election.

Since the ordinance will permit the election of three supervisors, the next item to be considered will be the nomination of candidates to be elected to these offices. Nomination to the office of supervisor will be by petition of ten registered voters, resident in Service Area 8 (Area presently served by the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Co.) Petition forms are available at the office of the Borough Clerk, 104 Northern Lights Blvd. in Anchorage. Nominations will close on

Nominations will close on July 10th, 1968; and all petitions must be filed with the clerk by 5:001m of that day in order to be valid.

The election will be held on July 30th, with one central location for all three polling places within the district. The Chugiak, Birchwood and Peters Creek precincts will each have their seperate set of polls located at the Chugiak Elementary School. Election headwuarters will also be located at this school for this election only.







The reasons vary, but I am sure that most of those don't either think themselves to important, nor are they nec-essarily hiding from bill collectors.

A great many people have unlisted numbers simply to keep their business life from following them home. I know of one school teacher who had to get an unlisted number to give her some time for her own family, and away from parents who would call her up at home to discuss their children's problems.

I will admit that it does make it complicated when you are trying to make contacts by phone, but if your reasons for calling these people are legitimate church work, I am sure that you should be able to get the unlisted numbers from your pastor.
