REV. JOHN SHAFER

CHUGIAK: John J. Shaffer, pastor of the United Methodist Church of Chugiak, has filed as a Republican candidate for the State house of Representatives.

Mr. Shaffer is a six year resident of Alaska, having lived in Moose Pass, Kenal and now Eagle River. He has been the pastor of the local United Methodist Church for the past three years. In addition, he is the Superintendent of Birchwood Camp and Secretary of the Alaska Mission of the United Methodist Church. During the past year, he has been a member of the Board of Directors at the Jesse Lee Home in Anchorage and held the office of Treasurer for the Greater Anchorage Area Community Action Agency, as a representative of the Greater Anchorage Council of Churches.

Mr. Shaffer has been concerned over some of the "special interest" legislation that has been pushed by some members of the legislature during past sessions and will work for honesty in government at all levels. He has a special concern for development of human resources and meeting human needs in our state.

Other positions held by Mr. Shaffer include: strict anti-pollution laws, wise protection and use of natural resources, Section 26 Boards wherever possible, elected attorney general and fiscal responsibility at all levels of government.

Mr. Shaffer and his wife, Barbara, originally came from the Midwest, but have developed a great interest in the potential of Alaska and her people. If elected, Mr. Shaffer pledges to help inform local residents of legislation which will affect the rural life in the Anchorage borough.

G.O.A.L. SPONSORS SUMMER FUN

CHUGIAK: The G.O.A.L. Community Council is sponsoring project "Summer Fun." The program will consist mainly of field trips and outings in town and the Matanuska Valley for local youngsters. There will be approximately four age groups for these trips and afternoon art and crafts sessions at the Chugiak Elementary School.

Bob Mielke, a local student at AMU will be working as the Head Start teachers aide in the morning and supervise the crafts sessions in the afternoon. Bob and his aide have been invited to attend a special course in crafts June 7, 8, 10 and 11 being conducted by the City Parks and Recreation Department.

The Summer Fun field trips will be to take local children, especially those from low income families to see places like City Hall, the Fire Department, fossil hunting, the Experimental Farm, Dairy etc.

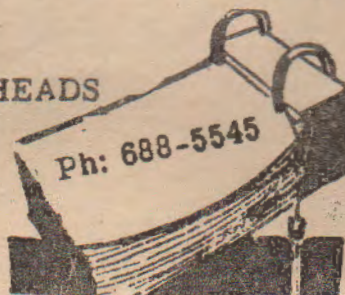
Kathy also attended a Community Action Executive Board meeting to present the winter Head Start program which was approved and accepted.

We hope to have plans for the summer Youth Program for the Greater Chugiak Area

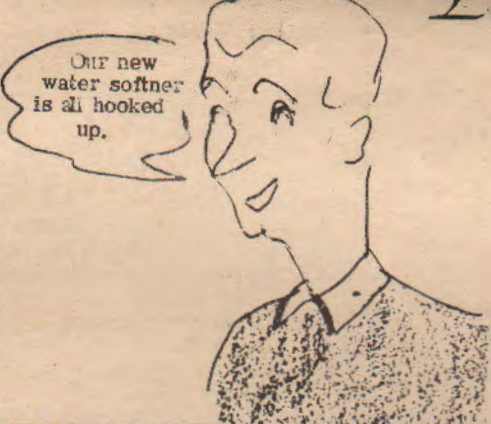
