CAR STOLEN FROM PASTOR

EAGLE RIVER: Someting during the night of July 4th, a car belonging to Rev. John J. Shaffer, Pastor of the United Methodist Church of Chugiak, was stolen from his front yard at the parsonage in Eagle River.

Early on the morning of July 6th, a youth reported the finding of the car to the Alaska State Troopers. The vehicle had apparently been abandoned off Artillery Road in Earle River.

It appeared to be undamaged, although one half tank of gas had been used.

All personal items in the car had been removed. These included some political stickers, some mail that was ready to be put in the post office and a Bible.

Rev. Shaffer stated that the Bible had special signifance to him, and is offering a reward for its return. The Bible is described as having a red cover, with a green paper cover over that. Anyone with information leading to its recovery is asked to call 694-2318, or to come directly to the parsonage.

The proposition calls for the election of three supervisors, who will serve in an advisory capacity to the GAAB in determing the budget of the Fire Service District which will also be voted upon at the July 30th election. These supervisors all will serve with out pay.

The area to be included in the Fire Service District is that presently served by the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company. The Fire Company had voted to disband earlier this spring due to lack of sufficient funds to operate, but has continued to function pending the outcome of this election.

It seems that all eyes in the borough are on the Chugiak Area. The reason for all this attention is the coming election at which time residents of the area served by the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company will decide whether or not they want a tax supported Fire Service District.

This in itself is not reason enough for all this attention; as other areas have made this step long before we have.

In the petition asking that the Fire Service District be voted upon, it was also asked that three supervisors be elected to serve in an advisory capacity in determining the budget of the proposed dista local invention. Even at that, one Borough Assemblyman sought to change his vote and have the matter re-considered a second time. This failed to come about on the advise of the Borough Attorney.
