CHUGIAK: Tuesday, July 16th will be the cut-over date for the telephone exchange which has been installed in the Birchwood Area, and which will be serving all phones with the 688 prefix.

As of the cut-over day, all new phone numbers in the exchange will be in effect.

All subscribers have been informed of their new phone numbers, and supplements to the phone directory listing the new numbers will be sent to all MTA subscribers.

During the cut-over period and for some time thereafter there will be office personnel at the new exchange building who will be able to answer any questions and take trouble calls. The number to call in this instance will be 688-2101.

CAR STOLEN FROM PASTOR

EAGLE RIVER: Something during the night of July 4th, a car belonging to Rev. John J. Shaffer, Pastor of the United Methodist Church of Chugiak, was stolen from his front yard at the parsonage in Eagle River.

Early on the morning of July 6th, a youth reported the finding of the car to the Alaska State Troopers. The vehicle had apparently been abandoned off Artillery Road in Eagle River.

It appeared to be undamaged, although one half tank of gas had been used.

All personal items in the car had been removed. These included some political stickers, some mail that was ready to be put in the post office and a Bible.

Rev. Shaffer stated that the Bible had special significance to him, and is offering a reward for its return. The Bible is described as having a red cover, with a green paper cover over that. 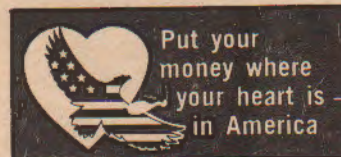
THREE YOUTHS HURT IN HIGH SPEED CRASH

SIX FILE FOR FIRE DISTRICT SUPERVISOR POSTS

CHUGIAK: A total of six candidates have filed for the post of Fire District Supervisor, as the July 10th filing deadline approaches.

Those who have declared their candidacy are, Walter Purcell, of Peters Creek, Art Wallace of Old Chugiak, Jim Samuelson of Birchwood, Mrs. Fred Smith (Waneeta) of Old Chugiak, Marion T. Atkins of Birchwood and Robert Kallenberg of Old Chugiak.

The proposition calls for the election of three supervisors, who will serve in an advisory capacity to the GAAB in determining the budget of the Fire Service District which will also be voted upon at the July 30th election. These supervisors all will serve with out pay.

The area to be included in the Fire Service District is that presently served by the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company. The Fire Company had voted to disband earlier this spring due to lack of sufficient funds to operate, but has continued to function pending the outcome of this election.

Even at that, one Borough Assemblyman sought to change his vote and have the matter re-considered a second time. This failed to come about on the advise of the Borough Attorney.

ARMY CALLS FOR BIDS

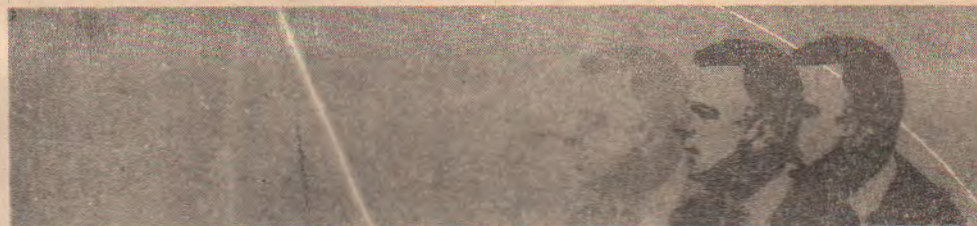

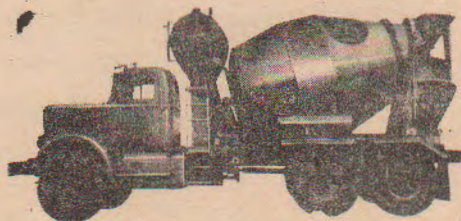
