

OLD CHUGIAK: Tuesday, July 30th is the day of the Special Election at which time residents of the area presently served by the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company will have the opportunity to vote wether or not they want a tax supported fire service district.

At this same time, they will be asked to elect three Supervisors who will serve without pay in an advisory capacity to assist the Borough Assembly in determining the budget for the Service District.

The polling place for all three voting precincts within the area will be at the Chugiak Elementary School, but there will be three seperate sets of polls at the school, with each precinct represented by three election officials.

Voters will cast their ballots at the polls for their own election precinct. The school will also be the official election headquarters.

Election officials will be for Precinct No. 149 (Chuglak - Fire Lake) Noretta Kamholz, Roberta Abrams and Dale Becwith. For Precinct No. 150 (Birchwood) Emma Powers, Lois Brewer and Delores Kohring. For Precinct No. 151 Margaret Halverson, Rose Kutzner and Cleda Stephens.

#### ALL OR NOTHING

Next Tuesday residents of the Area presently served by the Chuglak Volunteer Fire Company will be offered a choice of six candidates of which they may vote for three to serve as Supervisors to a proposed Fire Service Area.

They will also be offered a choice that is not so clearly defined on the ballot. This is the choice between a tax supported, adequately equipped Fire Department.....or no fire protection at all.

Last spring the Chuglak

Last spring the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company, weary of struggling for years with run down equipment due to the lack of funds, served notice that they planned to disband.

It was the result of this notice that a group of local citizens, alarmed by the thought that the community would be without fire protection as well as losing their emergency ambulance, met and started the ball rolling toward calling this special

election. The Chugiak Volunteers were persuaded to keep operating until this election would take place.

The members of the committee elected to ask for this special election, wishing to see that the local residents could maintain some sort of control on the financial side of this company, held out for the election of the three supevisor board to serve in an advisory capacity on matters of the budget. This was to assure that the mill rate would be kept down to a level acceptable to the local residents.

The Board of Supervisors is something new to the Anchorage Borough, and it was a long tough fight to get the assembly to agree to it. It would be a shame to see this victory which was won at the Borough level lost on the local front. If the voters of the area reject the Fire Service then not only will the efforts of this group be for nothing, but the Churiak Volunteer

Fire Company will proceed with their plans to disband, the property owners will be without any fire protection of any kind.

The 1/2 mill asked in the election will in most cases be no more than the \$10 subscription fee which the Fire Company asked from householders, and in some cases even less. These are factors that the voters must bear in mind when they go to the polls next Tuesday.

Open Letter:

In the Borough election to be held October 1, the voters will be asked to approve a 15 million bond issue for schools which if passed will result in a 4 millincrease in real property taxes in 1969 and approximately the same increase in 1970 unless the proposed boroughwide 3% sales tax is passed in October.

At the public hearing on the Sales tax issue held by the Borough Assembly last night a preponderance of the witnesses favored the sales tax IF the revenue derived from it was earmarked for schools and/or other poronghwide services and IF it would sub-stantially reduce the tax on real property.

Representatives of organized labor gave some indication that labor might support a sales tax if relief was given

to the real property owner.
IN SPITE OF THE FACT
that 64.2% of the voters of Section 1 (Peters Creek, Eagle River, Chugiak) voting in the 1965 borough election favored a sales tax if revenues were earmarked for schools and property taxes were reduced and IN SPITE OF THE FACT that all assemblymen inside and outside the City Assemblyman \*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*

Willis favor placing the sales tax issue on the ballot. As-semblyman Willis supposedly representing the majority wishes of the area he repre-sents is fighting to keep the issue off the ballot this October in hopes that it can some

how be killed by the delay.
Wha' Mr. Willis apparently
does not realize is that there is a distinct possibility that the 15 million school bond issued will be defeated in October unless property owners get some guarantee that they will get tax relief on

real property in 1969.
A special meeting of the Bobongh Assembly will be held 8p.m. Monday July 29th for the final decision whether or not to place the sales tax issue on the ballot of the October first Borough election.




