old Chugiak: Their assignment to the Chugiak Chapel will probably seem like a sojourn to the tropics to Rev. Eric Pahl and his wife Gloria, as they come here after a four year mission at the village of Wainwright on the Arctic Coast.

Wainwright is a remote Eskimo village of 350 residents, with the missionaries and school teacher being the only white people there.

Both Rev. and Mrs. Pahl are Canadians. He a native of Edminton Alberta and she of Regina Saskatchewan. They met in the town of Yellow Knife in the Northwest Territory, where he was working in the gold mines, and she was just passing through while engaged in missionary work.

The both attended Northwest Bible College in Edminton Alberta, from which Rev. Pahi graduated in 1962 and Mrs. Pahl in 1963. They were married after her graduation.

All Rev. Pahl's assignments prior to coming to Chugtak have been in remote areas. He was at Reindeer Static in Northwest Territory, and len at Ft. Simpson, also in the Northwest Territory. This is a Slavi Indian Village located on an island at the confluence of the McKenzie and the Liard Rivers. 

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



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STATEHOOD BONFIRE!:

BID AWARDED FOR COMMUNITY COLLEGE

President William R. Wood of the University of Alaska has signed a contract a warding the \$3,237,000 Anchorage Community College building project to the Howard S. Lease Construction Co. of Redmond, Wash.

The contract calls for the firm to provide general, mechanical, electrical and earth work for the five-building complex that totals about 113,000 square feet in floor space.

Construction began this week on a site near Wendler Junior High school and bounded by Northern Lights Boulevard, Lake Otis Road and Providence Avenue. Completion is set for August, 1969.

The complex includes a twostory administration and classroom building, two-story classroom building, one-story library and classroom building, onestory industrial training s h o p and classroom building and onetory food service and student center building.

enter building.

The facility was designed by he Anchorage architectural irm of McEntire and Pendergrast. It will be the largest pernanent facility off the university's main campus in Fairbanks.

Construction of the first permanent community college facility in the university's history began earlier this spring in Ketchikan where a \$484,000 contract was awarded to McGillvray Brothers, a Ketchikan contractor. The facility will be a two-story administration and classroom building. Completion is expected in September.

Bids were to be opened late last week for a third project, a permanent facility for the Juneau-Douglas Community College

lege.
Temporary facilities are used by the university's community colleges of Matanuska-Susitna, Kenai Peninsula, Kodiak and Citka.

'n the university's main cam-, two major construction

contracts were let and work begun earlier this spring. Largest, project is a \$8,470,171 contract to Burgess Construction of Fairbanks for a library, humanities and fine arts complex.


