CHUGIAK: Last Sunday was not a day of rest for either the stork or Dr. Tom Green of Eagle River. The local population explosion started just after midnight, and by 8:45pm, Dr. Green had assisted in bringing three little girls to grace three happy homes in the Greater Chugiak Area.

The first to arrive, at 12:58am, Sunday June 30th at the Anchorage Community Hospital, was little Renate Rene Zelinka, whose proud parents are Mr. and Mrs. Jack Zelinka, of Birchwood. At 1:24pm, Anna Katrina Hercha arrived at Providence Hospital. Her parents are Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Hercha of Upper Fire Lake. The last to make the scene was Pamela Sue Baumer, who checked in at Providence Hospital at 8:45pm. Mr. and Mrs. Patrick Baumer are the happy parents. The Baumers live on Eagle River Road.

All three ladies had been attended by Dr. Green during their entire pregnancy. Dr. Green indicated that there have been two other new arrivals in the local area within the past few days, bringing the week's total to five new citizens. The details on the other two babies (both boys) were not immediately available.

NEW PASTOR ASSIGNED HERE

OLD CHUGIAK: Their assignment to the Chugiak Chapel will probably seem like a sojourn to the tropics to Rev. Eric Pahl and his wife Gloria, as they come here after a four year mission at the village of Wainwright on the Arctic Coast.

Wainwright is a remote Eskimo village of 350 residents, with the missionaries and school teacher being the only white people there.

Both Rev. and Mrs. Pahl are Canadians. He a native of Edmonton Alberta and she of Regina Saskatchewan. They met in the town of Yellow Knife in the Northwest Territory, where he was working in the gold mines, and she was just passing through while engaged in missionary work.

The both attended Northwest Bible College in Edmonton Alberta, from which Rev. Pahl graduated in 1962 and Mrs. Pahl in 1963. They were married after her graduation.

All Rev. Pahl's assignments prior to coming to Chugiak have been in remote areas. He was at Reindeer Station in Northwest Territory, and then at Ft. Simpson, also in the Northwest Territory. This is a Slavi Indian Village located on an island at the confluence of the McKenzie and the Liard Rivers. He said that the island was 3 miles long by 3/4 miles wide and connected by a bridge to the mainland. Shortly after his

The meeting will take place at the home of Mrs. Kemper Johnston on Spruce Lane in Birchwood.



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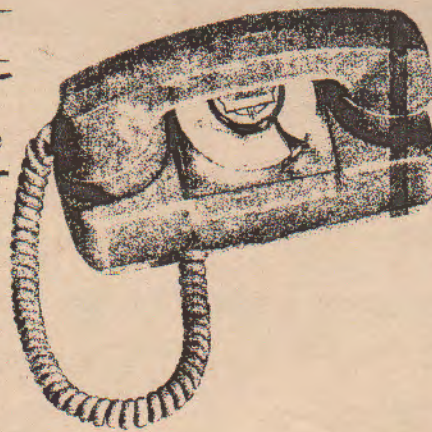

Working with the Boys Club of Alaska, Inc. are Chet Gordon, Steve Ondeck and Terry Martin.

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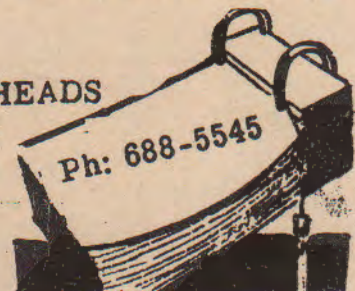

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GRANT OFFERED AT U OF A

Two talent grants for students majoring in the fine arts are being offered by the University of Alaska's Department of Art.

The grants total \$1,400 for Alaskan residents and \$1,700 for non-residents, including room, board and university fees for an academic year.

Selection of candidates to receive the grants will be made by Aug. 15, 1968.

The grants are being awarded to promote excellence in Alaska's fine arts through recruiting, development and support of students in such creative areas as sculpture, painting, printmaking and drawing.

ORNITHOLOGISTS MEET IN ALASKA

Members of the American Ornithologists' Union ended their 96th annual meeting last Friday at the University of Alaska campus and began a series of field trips that will take the bird watchers to Nome, St. Lawrence Island, Mt. McKinley National Park and Eagle Summit on the Steese Highway.

The 221 participants who registered for the three-day meeting represented 36 states, the Canal Zone, four Canadian provinces and the Northwest Territories, and England and Japan.

Dr. Alexander Wetmore, past president of the Union, was senior member at the meeting. A resident of Washington, D. C., he joined the AOU in 1909.

At a business session, Dr. Brina Kessel was named to the AOU Council. She will be the first woman to serve on the governing body since the AOU was founded in 1883.

STATEHOOD BONFIRE!

When the news of the signing of the Statehood for Alaska Bill by the Senate of the United States came over the radio, a high pile of tires and scrap lumber began to grow on an open piece of ground at Moose horn. By 8:00pm, 150 people had gathered and added more fuel so that when the pile was lit a high column of black smoke rose to the sky and could be seen for miles.

RALPH ANDERSON CATCHES THIEF:

Tuesday night at about 10:30pm Ralph Anderson of mile 18 returned home to find two men prowling through the used cars at his place. He went on foot to his nearest neighbor, Paul Fretwell and borrowed a gun. He, Fretwell and his visitor returned and Anderson's dog flushed out the thief. When Anderson ordered him to stop he did not a shot was fired in the air. This still did stop the culprit so Anderson fired a shot at his foot and hit him. An accomplice was waiting in a nearby car and was cornered by Gib Reid, Ralph Doyle and Mr. Laws. The Chugiak Fire Company Rescue truck took the wounded boy to the 5040th Hospital and Anderson and the accomplice went to the Territorial Police office to make reports.

150 ACRES DESTROYED: A careless camper left a fire at Beach Lake in the Birchwood area yesterday which was fanned by a stiff breeze and traveled by leaps and bounds. It was estimated

by the Bureau of Land Management that 150 acres of land would be destroyed by the fire.

THREE HURT IN EKLUTNA WRECK

EKLUTNA: Three were taken to the Palmer Hospital following a two car collision which took place on the Eklutna Flats at mile 27 last Saturday.

BID AWARDED FOR COMMUNITY COLLEGE

President William R. Wood of the University of Alaska has signed a contract awarding the \$3,237,000 Anchorage Community College building project to the Howard S. Lease Construction Co. of Redmond, Wash.

The contract calls for the firm to provide general, mechanical, electrical and earth work for the five-building complex that totals about 113,000 square feet in floor space.

Construction began this week on a site near Wendler Junior High school and bounded by Northern Lights Boulevard, Lake Otis Road and Providence Avenue. Completion is set for August, 1969.

The complex includes a two-story administration and classroom building, two-story classroom building, one-story library and classroom building, one-story industrial training shop and classroom building and one-story food service and student center building.

The facility was designed by the Anchorage architectural firm of McEntire and Pendergrast. It will be the largest permanent facility off the university's main campus in Fairbanks.

Construction of the first permanent community college facility in the university's history began earlier this spring in Ketchikan where a \$484,000 contract was awarded to McGillvray Brothers, a Ketchikan contractor. The facility will be a two-story administration and classroom building. Completion is expected in September.

Bids were to be opened late last week for a third project, a permanent facility for the Juneau-Douglas Community College.

Temporary facilities are used by the university's community colleges of Matanuska-Susitna, Kenai Peninsula, Kodiak and Sitka.

On the university's main campus, two major construction

contracts were let and work begun earlier this spring. Largest project is a \$8,470,171 contract to Burgess Construction of Fairbanks for a library, humanities and fine arts complex.

Also under construction is a 322-unit dormitory, being erected by Modern Construction of Fairbanks on a contract totaling \$2,328,000.

Three other buildings are planned for the main campus. Bids were opened June 21 for a new Geophysical Institute facility. A social sciences building and campus activities center are in the early planning stages.

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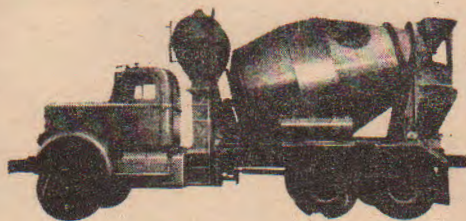
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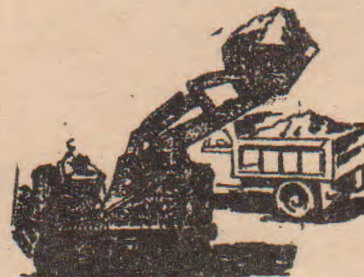
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
