

# FIRE PROTECTION VOTED IN

## CHUGIAK FOUR STAR IN BABE RUTH TOURNEY

ANCHORAGE: Four Chugiak Area players played a prominent part in winning the State Championship in the Babe Ruth tournament completed this past weekend at Mucahy Park in Anchorage.

Ron Tyson, of Chugiak pitched two of the East Anchorage package of four straight wins, beating Ketchikan 10-3 and West Anchorage 2-0 in the final championship game last Saturday. Tyson struck out 12 in the first contest and 15 in the second to match a tournament record set by teammate Kim Watsjold.

Catcher Steve Jordan, of Chugiak had an impressive 6 hits for 12 official at-bats for an average of .500 in the tournament, and gained bases safely three additional times when fielders errored his slams. He scored seven of East's 23 total runs.

Fred Olson, playing first base, collected three hits in the three games he played, driving in two more East tallies.

David Haynes, centerfielder from Chugiak, also was credited with driving in a run after a sacrifice fly to right field allowed an Eastsider to out run the throw to the plate.

In the Friday afternoon tilt with Elmendorf AFB, defending State Champions, all East hits were gained by the four local players.

The State Champions defeated Ketchikan on Monday opener, 10-3; Midnight Sun 6-1, on Wednesday; Elmendorf 5-1 on Friday; and the 2-0 clincher against West Anchorage on Saturday to wrap up the tournament.

Each team member received a personal trophy to commemorate his participation on the winning team. Team personnel were treated to a steak dinner by League President Bob Rude following the win and were hosted last night by the Petroleum Club at the Anchorage Westward.

East will participate in a raising doubleheader against the American Legion East and West All-Stars on Thursday at Mulcahy Park. The first game, against the East Legion nine, starts at 6:30pm with the game against West following at approximately 8:30.

The team will depart for the Babe Ruth Regional Tournament at The Dalles, Oregon, on Saturday, to commence their battle for the Regional

## KNIK ALL-STARS TAKE FIRST IN TOURNAMENT

CHUGIAK: The victorious Knik Little League All Stars left for Juneau yesterday afternoon to compete in the State Championship, after winning the Division A tournament last week in Palmer.

The Knik team is made up of players from the four Little League teams in the Greater Chugiak Area; the Eagles, the Angels, the Yankees and the Panthers.

The local All-Stars came through the tournament with flying colors. The first game, in July 25th, the Knik team played the City of Anchorage, defeating them 5-1. On July 26th, they defeated the Kodiak team 9-0. In the final game, played Saturday July 27 they met the undefeated Elmendorf team and won with a score of 6-5.

Coaching the team was Mr. Frank Carlock and manager was Mr. Don Zimmerman.

It was said that a point of interest was that it was stated that neither the coach or the manager had ever played baseball themselves and this was their first year to coach and manage a team.

The team will play their first game in the State tournament this afternoon at 4pm.

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## MEA NAMES NEW MANAGER

PALMER: Willard H. Johnson MEA's chief engineer who has served as acting manager of the electric co-op since late in February, has been named General Manager of the Matanuska Electric Association.

The board of directors made the appointment at a special meeting on Thursday, July 18th.

"Since Feb. 27, Mr. Johnson has been handling both jobs - engineering head and the acting managership - and we feel that he is the best-qualified person for the position," said Dick Miller, president of the board of directors.

Johnson replaces Mason LaZelle, who was killed in the crash of the MEA plane along with Phil McRae superintendent of electrical operations and Alex Fuller, electrician. The wreckage of the plane in which the trio died was found only last week where it had crashed in a canyon near Simpson Pass last February 27th.

Lazelle, who had been MEA Manager since 1960, and the other two men had been on a flight to Nulato and Unalakleet at the time of the crash.

The new manager announced that Dick Anderson has been named to the position of superintendent of electrical operations.

CHUGIAK: The proposition to create a Fire Protection Service District in the Area served by the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company passed by a landslide vote at a special election held here July 30th.

Despite a relatively light turnout of voters, the trend was overwhelmingly in favor of the service district with 203 of the total votes cast "Yes" as opposed to 29 "No".

Elected to the Board of Supervisors were, Robert Kallenberg, Walter Purcell and Art Wallace.

The total vote cast was 232, with the breakdown by precinct as follows:

BIRCHWOOD: Yes 87, No 5  
CHUGIAK - FIRE LAKE: Yes 67 No 17

PETERS CREEK: Yes 49 No 7

Total vote for the Board of Supervisors was: Atkins, 44; Kallenberg 163; Purcell, 112; Samuelson, 77; Smith, 89; and Wallace 167.

Vote for supervisors by precinct was:

BIRCHWOOD: Atkins 25; Kallenberg, 67; Purcell, 40; Samuelson, 34; Smith, 36; and Wallace, 56.

CHUGIAK - FIRE LAKE: Atkins 10; Kallenberg, 54; Purcell 38; Samuelson 24; Smith, 40 and Wallace 65.

PETERS CREEK: Atkins, 9; Kallenberg, 42; Purcell 34; Samuelson 19; Smith 13; and Wallace 46.

The trend was a complete reversal of the votetwo years ago when a similar proposition to create a Fire Service District was defeated by a vote of 247 against to 99 in favor. The proposition at that time called for a 2 mill tax assessment. The proposition on last Tuesday's ballot called for only 1/2 mill through 1970.

The locally elected Board of Supervisors is to serve in an Advisory capacity in helping determine the budget of the newly formed Service District.

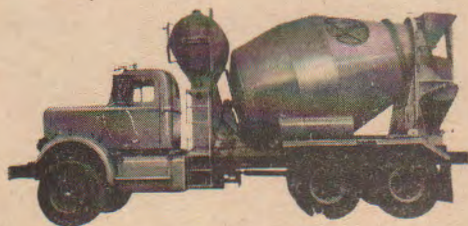
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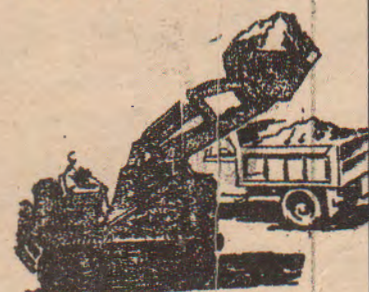
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## VANDALISM IN BIRCHWOOD

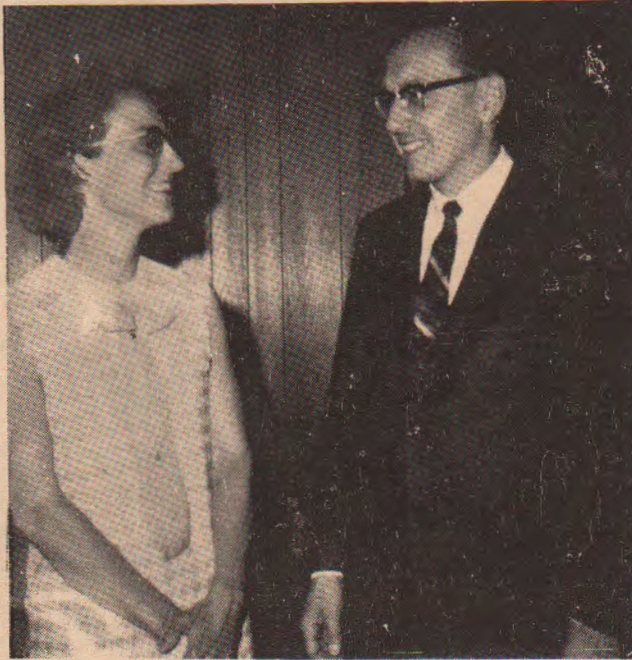
**BIRCHWOOD:** Several acts of vandalism have been reported in the Birchwood area this past week.

## NONE HURT IN COLLISION

**OLD CHUGIAK:** There were no injuries in a two car collision which took place at Mile 20 on Wednesday July 24th at 7:00am.

According to the Alaska State Troopers, a 1963 Ford sedan, driven by Linda J. Later of Birchwood apparently pulled out of a driveway and into the path of a 1964 Ford station wagon, driven by Helmut Cotini of Palmer.

Damage to the sedan was estimated at \$50,00, to the station wagon, \$150.

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## CURE FOR SICK CARS

Many car owners know little and care less about what goes on under the hood of their car. Today's motorist has faith that his car won't let him down and usually relies on his gas station to discover all ailments before they become serious.

However, cars do fail and mechanics do miss things. Often, only you as the driver can detect the symptoms of safety

ailments—if you know what the danger signs are.

Here are a few tips from the Allstate Motor Club that will help you to become a car diagnostician.

Brake pedal goes down too far. Brakes need adjusting. This goes for self-adjusting brakes too, because sometimes they don't self-adjust.

Car rocks or rolls at highway speed. Wheel balance and tire care are important to safety. If there is vibration in your car at any speed, have the front end and drive chain carefully checked. Test the shock absorbers, too.

Car pulls to one side when stopping. Brakes need equalizing. Or if there's brake fluid or wheel bearing grease on the linings, the brakes must be re-lined.

Tire squeals on turns. Too soft or under-inflated tires cave in at the tread and ride on the shoulders. Result: squealing turns, mushy steering, increased gas consumption, flexing sidewalls that generate heat and cut tire life.

Play in the steering wheel. Steering wheel loose, too much play. If so, have a mechanic check the entire system out.

Are the steering wheel spokes straight across when the wheels are straight? If not, the steering tie rods may be bent or loose. Bent rods also pull front wheels out of line, causing excessive tire wear.

Turn signal won't work. A turn signal indicator that lights, but doesn't blink means a burned out taillight or parking light. If the indicator doesn't light at all, the flasher unit is burned out. It's simple to replace. Look under the dash — it's a small aluminum can that pulls out and plugs in like a radio tube or clips into a holder.

Col. Marston will be present to supplement the story narrated in the picture, and discuss any part of the film of particular interest to the audience.

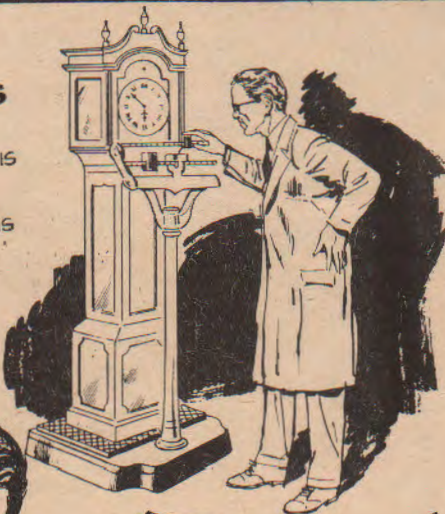
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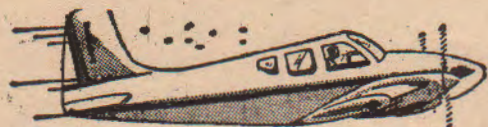

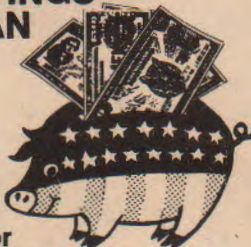
Suffering a sprained ankle was Donna T. Lavevette and James L. Smith also a passenger in the pick-up sustained a bump on his head.

## BANKERS TIED FOR FIRST

**CHUGIAK:** The Eagle River Branch, First National Bank of Anchorage Babe Ruth baseball team has ended its season in a tie for first place with a record of 15 wins against three losses.

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## BARTLETT URGES FEDERAL AID

Sen. E. L. (Bob) Bartlett has urged Gov. Walter J. Hickel to file a formal application for participation in the federal urban mass transportation program to secure federal support for the Alaska state ferry.

Bartlett simultaneously requested the Department of Transportation to prepare legislation to adapt the Urban Mass Transportation Act to Alaska's unique marine highway system.

Bartlett's action was taken as a result of a series of contacts beginning early this year with officials of the Departments of Transportation and Housing and Urban Development to find ways and means of getting federal support for Alaska's ferry system.

In requesting the Governor to formally apply under the program, even though the terms of the act appear to exclude Alaska's ferries, Bartlett said:

"This application, with its supporting documents, will make clear to all the importance, the need, and the substantial reasons for federal assistance to the Alaska ferry system.

"I believe this application and its supporting documents will be helpful not only to the department but to the Congress as it considers the extension of the Urban Mass Transportation Act," Bartlett said.

According to top department officials, the Urban Mass Transportation Act presently "does not authorize the granting of funds for projects which involve inter-city transportation operations."

"It is for this reason I have asked the department to prepare the necessary legislation

to bring the Alaska ferry system under the act," Bartlett said.

Four ferries for metropolitan commuter service in the Seattle area and a ferry passenger terminal for the Puerto Rico Ports Authority have been partially financed under the federal urban mass transit program.

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## SEA OTTER TRANSPLANT

Gov. Walter J. Hickel's office has reported that 135 sea otter have been transplanted to Southeastern Alaska from the Aleutian Islands to date, and another 40 of the animals are to be airlifted to Southeastern next week.

The Alaska Department of Fish and Game, working with the U. S. Atomic Energy Commission, plans to transplant about 300 sea otter to new range this summer. The animals will come mostly from Amchitka Island in the Aleutians, where herds are in need of thinning.

The latest airlift of otter, the third this year, was released in the Barrier Islands, located off the southwestern tip of Prince of Wales Island. Two previous shipments were released near Sitka.

The sea otter to be transplanted will be taken to the southwestern shore of Prince of Wales Island.

The AEC is cooperating in the transplant program as a result of cooperative efforts to insure the Amchitka's sea otter population, in addition to being thinned to numbers supportable by the available range, will be protected from any harm which might result from a series of underground nuclear tests planned on the island.

## NOT SO TERRA FIRMA

The earth is not "terra firma." It only looks that way. These measurements have been made for half a century

In Alaska, for instance, after the great 1964 earthquake, it was found that the earth had settled 1.7 feet at Matanuska, 5.6 feet at Portage, and 3.3 feet at Seward, when compared to measurements made in 1923.

Measurements show there is considerable vertical movement of the earth's surface

Much of this movement is downward. It is due in part to natural forces in the earth's crust which, over the ages, change the contour of the land.

These natural forces include earthquakes, frost action, and varying soil moisture content. Slow vertical movements may occur at weaknesses in the earth's crust known as fault lines.

But man himself is apparently responsible for changes that can be measured within decades or even shorter periods.

These measurements have been made for half a century by the Coast and Geodetic Survey, an agency of the Environmental Science Services Administration, U.S. Department of Commerce.

Studies revealed that in some areas there is a definite correlation between surface subsidence and the removal of underground material, such as water, oil and gas. In Texas, for example, in the Texas area, there was heavy withdrawal before 1954, and this region showed a maximum settlement of almost three feet. But after the Texas City withdrawal slackened the subsidence also decreased. In Pasadena, Calif. oil fields there was heavy withdrawal before 1959 and this area showed a maximum settlement of almost

four feet.

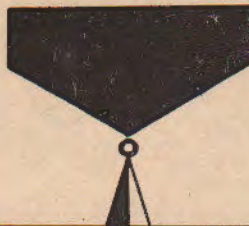
