ELEMENTARY REGISTRATION

CHUGIAK: Registration of pupils at all three of the local Elementary schools began last Monday, and will continue daily until school begins.

It does not specify whether this limit was proposed for that locality, area, region, or Alaska as a whole.

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

The grouse and ptarmigan seasons opened Aug. 10 in Game Management Units 7 and 9 through 26 and on Aug. 1 in Units 1 through 6, according to Sterling Eide, game management biologist for the Alaska department of fish and game.

"It looks like it is going to be a good year for upland bird hunting. Reproduction is good," said Eide.

Hunters should keep the gen eral habitats in mind if they wish to hunt one of the three species of grouse in the South-central Region. Ruffed grouse are generally found in the decidous (leaved) forests, sharptailed grouse are mixed brush and grassland inhabitants, and spruce grouse are spruce-birch forest dwellers, Eide said.

spruce grouse are spruce-birch forest dwellers, Eide said. "The three species of ptarmigan are found in the treeless areas of Alaska," he added.

The daily bag limit is 15 grouse and 20 ptarmigan in all units except Units 1 through 6, where the bag limit on grouse is 5 per day. The possession limits are twice the daily bag limits. There is no open season on grouse in Unit 8.

LONG DISTANCE RATES TO BE CUT

Toll rates or long-distance telephone and private line channel services in Alaska will be reduced to an estimated \$2 million a year effective Oct. 1, the Air Force announced this week.

The rate reductions are the largest in the 68-year history of the Air Force - owned Alaska Communications System. The changes include:

(1 Reduction of rates on all long-distance calls within the state of Alaska. The reduction averages 14 per cent with the larger percentage reductions reflected in the longer distance type calls.

(2) Reduction of rates on station-to-station calls at night and on Saturday and Sunday between Alaska and the 48 states. The overall percentage of reductions is 17.7 per cent.

(3) Reduction of rates or

(3) Reduction of rates or leased line service for voice and teletypewriter services for an overall reduction of 19.1 per cent.

(4) Creations of new evening rate schedule for station to station calls with the state. The rates will be less than the regular day rates and slightly higher than the night period calls.
